
STRUCTURAL STEELWORK Analysis and Design

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There are a number of excellent books available which deal with the design of structural steel elements but, in the author's view, they lack certain important features. The design of structural steel members requires many checks in a systematic, structured manner: this book has been written to provide a step-by-step approach to this task with a view to achieving completeness of the design process in all respects.

This highly prescriptive approach provides a comprehensive book which is at the same time user friendly. The task of quality assurance becomes less arduous and the output of a design office becomes fully standardised if the approach in this book is strictly followed. For students, too, the book should prove to be invaluable because the essential elements of the theory of structures and analysis are discussed, followed by a structured approach to the design of all elements in a building, including connections. The numerous worked examples will be very useful to practitioners, students and lecturers alike.

The design principles are illustrated at each stage by sketeches. The extensive use of illustrations is a particular feature of the book and is intended to clarify ambiguities in the codes of practice.

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
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# Chapter 1 Strength of Materials

### 1.1 BENDING STRESS IN BEAMS



SK 1/1 Beam in pure bending.


A beam is in pure bending where shear force is zero and hence bending moment is constant over a length of the beam. A plane section is assumed to remain plane before and after bending. When shear force is present, the plane section is warped. But for all practical purposes this warping due to shear force may be ignored and the theory of pure bending may be extended to cover the cases of bending where the bending moment is not constant.

### 1.1.1 Assumptions

- (1) Plane section remains plane.
- (2) Material is homogeneous and isotropic.
- (3) Lateral strains (anticlastic curvature) are neglected.

### SK 1/2 Bending strains and stresses.

- (4) Local effects under loads are neglected.
- (5) Beam bends in a circular arc of radius R.
- (6) The radius of curvature is large compared to the cross-sectional dimension of the beam.
- (7) Modulus of elasticity, E, has the same value in compression and tension.

The neutral axis, where stress is zero, is denoted on the circular arc by NA. The stress  $\sigma_{AB}$  at a distance y from the neutral axis is on the circular arc AB.

### 1.1.2 Position of neutral axis

dA is an element of area at a distance y from NA. Net normal force on the cross-section must be zero for pure bending.


If the moment about an axis perpendicular to the axis about which M is applied is zero, then that axis is called the principal axis of the section.

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The axes about which the product of inertia  $\int xy \, dA$  is zero are called the principal axes. An axis of symmetry in a section is a principal axis.

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

SK 1/4 Rectangular element product inertia.



For sections which are asymmetrical, the orthogonal applied moments  $M_x$  and  $M_y$  about any set of X-X and Y-Y axes should be resolved about the principal axes U-U and V-V of the section to obtain bending stresses in the section due to the applied moments.

### Bending stresses in an angular section

Find principal axes U-U and V-V of the section and resolve bending moments  $M_X$  and  $M_Y$  about the principal axes.

where  $\sigma$  is the bending stress at any point on the angle section and u and v are co-ordinates of the point along the principal axes U-U and V-V. Always observe a sign convention which is consistent throughout.

### Sign convention

Bending moments producing compression in the positive zone are taken as positive.

Positive  $M_x$  produces compressive stresses in the zone where y is positive, and similarly, positive  $M_y$  produces compressive stresses in the zone where x is positive.

x and u are co-ordinates which are positive to the right of the origin along the X and U axes respectively.

y and v are co-ordinates along the Y and V axes respectively, with positive values in the same direction as x and u but at an angle of 90 degrees in the anticlockwise direction from the X and U axes respectively.

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 $\theta$  = angle between X-X and U-U axes measured anticlockwise from the X-X axis

 $M_x$  = applied moment on the section about X-X axis



### 1.2 SHEAR STRESS IN BEAMS



SK 1/7 Shear stresses in beam section.

The concept of transverse vertical shear stress in a section of a beam with complementary horizontal shear stress in layers of the beam parallel to the neutral plane is illustrated in SK 1/7 by the use of a rectangular cross-section.

Consider an elemental length dx of a beam. The shear stress in the transverse plane will give rise to a complementary shear stress in the longitudinal plane. The bending moments at two transverse sections spaced dx apart are M and M + dM. The corresponding shear forces are V and V + dV. The shear stress on a plane bounded

by b and dx is  $\tau$ . The normal stresses on an elemental area dA are  $\sigma$  and  $\sigma + d\sigma$ , corresponding to M and M + dM. For longitudinal force equilibrium:

$$\tau b\,dx = \int d\sigma\,dA$$

Substituting  $\sigma = My/I$  and  $d\sigma = dMy/I$ :









#### 1.3.1 Torsion of thin rectangular members

Maximum shear stress in the rectangular section is assumed to be  $\tau$  along the long edge and  $\tau'$  along the short edge. The variation of the



Assume that each rectangular section carries a part of the total applied torsion T in proportion to the stiffness factor  $dt^2$  of the rectangle and that  $\tau_1$  and  $\tau_2$  are torsional shear stresses in each rectangle.


#### Strain energy in axial load


For a load gradually applied, P, to produce deflection x, the strain energy stored in the system is the work done by the load.

Strain energy = U = 0.5Px

which is the area of the load-displacement curve.



Assume that over a very short length dx of a beam the bending moment M remains constant.  $\sigma$  is the bending stress on an element of area dA at a distance y from the neutral axis. The strain energy in the beam of length dx subjected to a moment M is dU.






SK 1/14 Strain energy due to shear.



values. The shear stress is equal to  $2\tau x/t$  acting on an elemental area  $dx \cdot d$ . The volume of the elemental bar is equal to  $d \cdot l \cdot dx$ .



## Chapter 2 Theory of Structures

#### 2.1 POLYGON OF FORCES

Several forces acting in a plane at a point O can be reduced to one single force, which is called their resultant. Forces can be represented by vectors. Vectors have magnitude and direction. If two forces  $P_1$ and  $P_2$  are represented by their vectors  $\overline{OA}$  and  $\overline{OB}$ , then their resultant is  $\overline{OC}$ , which can be found using the triangle of forces. In the triangle of forces  $\overline{AB}$  represents  $P_1$  in direction and magnitude,  $\overline{BC}$  represents  $P_2$  in direction and magnitude and  $\overline{AC}$  is the closing side of the triangle representing the resultant R. When this resultant vanishes, the forces are said to be in equilibrium.

Similarly, any number of forces acting at a point can be represented by vectors and the resultant R of these forces can be found using the polygon of forces. When several forces acting at a point are in equilibrium, the polygon of forces will close, meaning the resultant is zero.




SK 2/1 Polygon of forces.

Any force can be resolved into two forces acting at right angles to each other parallel to a chosen orthogonal axis system X-X and Y-Y. The force P can be resolved into  $P\cos\theta$  and  $P\sin\theta$  parallel to the X-X and Y-Y axes respectively. If a system of forces acting at point O is in equilibrium, then:

 $\sum X =$  summation of all resolved forces in the X-X direction = 0


 $\sum Y =$  summation of all resolved forces in the Y-Y direction = 0

#### 2.2 EQUATIONS OF EQUILIBRIUM

A system of coplanar forces may not all intersect at a point. If the forces do not intersect at one point, they may reduce to a resultant force, a resultant couple or be in equilibrium. A couple is a set of equal and opposite forces separated by a distance. The polygon of forces will close, indicating that there is no resultant force in the system, but a resultant couple may remain.




SK 2/3 Coplanar system of forces.

The following equations of equilibrium must be satisfied for a system of coplanar forces to be in equilibrium:

 $\sum X =$  summation of all resolved forces in the X-X direction = 0

 $\sum Y =$  summation of all resolved forces in the Y-Y direction = 0

 $\sum M =$  summation of all moments of the forces (or the resolved forces) about any point in the system = 0

For a simple truss the reactions at the supports can be determined as follows. Assuming that there is no frictional resistance at the rollers at support B, the horizontal reaction at that support is zero. For equilibrium the equations are:


Knowing the geometry of the truss and the loading directions and magnitudes, the unknown reactions  $R_A$ ,  $R_B$  and  $H_A$  can be found from the three equations of equilibrium.

 $R_{\rm A}$  = vertical reaction at end A $R_{\rm B}$  = vertical reaction at end B $H_{\rm A}$  = horizontal reaction at end A

#### 2.3 INTERNAL FORCES

The truss in SK 2/5 has nodes marked 1, 2, 3, 4 etc. Members are numbered as follows: member 1 is between nodes 1 and 2, member 2 is between nodes 2 and 3 etc. The internal forces in members are  $N_1$ ,  $N_2$ , etc., corresponding to the number of members.

At any node in the truss two equations of equilibrium can be written taking into account the internal and external forces at that node. Unknown internal forces in the two members of the truss joining at that node can be found from the two equations.



#### SK 2/5 Internal forces in a truss.

The first step is to find the end reactions of the truss at supports A and B using the methods described in Section 2.2. The joint A is in equilibrium under the action of  $H_A$ ,  $R_A$ ,  $N_1$  and  $N_5$ . Applying equations of equilibrium:

$$\sum H =$$
 summation of all the forces in the horizontal direction = 0

or  $H_A + N_1 \cos \theta - N_5 \cos \theta_1 - P_1 \sin \theta = 0$ 

 $\sum V =$  summation of all the forces in the vertical direction = 0

or  $R_A - N_1 \sin \theta + N_5 \sin \theta_1 - P_1 \cos \theta = 0$ 

where  $H_A =$  horizontal reaction at end A

 $N_i = internal$  force in member *i* 

 $R_A$  = vertical reaction at end A

 $R_{\rm B} =$  vertical reaction at end B

Knowing  $H_A$ ,  $R_A$  and  $\theta$ , the unknown internal forces  $N_1$  and  $N_5$  can be found from the two equations of equilibrium. Having found  $N_1$ , at node 2 there are two unknown member forces,  $N_2$  and  $N_4$ . They can be found by the two equations of equilibrium at node 2. Similarly, progressing a node at a time, the internal forces in the rest of the members can be found.

For a determinate truss the relationship between the number of members m and the number of joints j is given by:

m = 2j - 3


where m = number of members in a truss j = number of joints in a truss

The truss becomes indeterminate if the number of members exceeds that given by the above equation. For indeterminate trusses, considerations of deformations and strain energy have to be made to solve the internal forces. If the number of members is less than that given by the equation, then the truss is not a rigid structure and becomes a mechanism. For a cantilever truss, however, the joints fixing the truss to the foundation are not taken into consideration, and the equation for a determinate cantilever truss reduces to:

$$m = 2j$$

#### 2.3.1 Compound trusses: the method of section

A compound truss may be defined as a truss where all joints cannot be solved by the equations of equilibrium at the joints, because the number of unknown member forces at a joint is more than two. The truss is divided by a section and a convenient moment centre helps to determine unknown member forces.



SK 2/6 Determination of internal member forces by section.


Take a section x-x through the truss as shown in SK 2/6. Consider the equilibrium of the right side of the truss acted on by applied external loads, the vertical reaction  $R_B$  and the internal forces  $N_5$ ,  $N_{12}$  and  $N_{16}$  in members 5, 12 and 16 respectively acting along the line of the members. Select node 5 as the centre of moment which eliminates internal forces  $N_5$  and  $N_{16}$  because the line of action of these two forces meets at that point. Taking moments about node 5 and equating to zero for equilibrium of the truss on the right side of the section:

$$R_{\rm B} \frac{1}{2} - N_{12}h - P_1a\cos\alpha + P_2a - P_32a\cos\alpha + P_42a$$
$$- P_53a\cos\alpha + P_63a - P_74a\cos\alpha + P_84a = 0$$

From this equation the only unknown member force,  $N_{12}$ , can be found. Having determined  $N_{12}$  the rest of the member forces can be found by the two equations of equilibrium at every joint. P is the applied external force.

#### 2.3.2 Maxwell diagram for simple trusses

Solving for all the joints in a truss with numerous members can be very tedious using the equations of equilibrium at every joint. A graphical method of solution of internal forces in the truss could be easier – this method is called the Maxwell diagram.

The roof truss is supported and loaded as shown in SK 2/7. The polygon of applied known forces  $P_1$  to  $P_5$  is drawn in direction and magnitude as a straight line from 1 to 6 with 1-2 representing  $P_1$ , 2-3 representing  $P_2$  etc. A pole O is selected and rays from the pole are drawn to the points 1, 2, 3 etc. on the polygon of forces. Effectively the force  $P_1$  is replaced by two forces 1O and O2, and  $P_2$  is replaced by two forces 2O and O3 etc. Starting at support A, the line of action of the reaction  $R_A$  must pass through the fixed point A. The funicular polygon is started from this fixed point A by drawing a line parallel to the ray O2 in the force diagram. This ray meets the line of action of load  $P_2$  at point 2' on the funicular polygon. The ray O1 for load  $P_1$  is not taken into account because it passes through the fixed point A. From point 2' a line is drawn parallel to the ray O3 and it meets the line of action of load  $P_3$  at 3'. By using the same process the line parallel to the ray O6 from point 5' meets the line of action of reaction  $R_{\rm B}$  at B. The line of action of reaction  $R_{\rm B}$  is vertical because of the roller supports. The direction of the closing

line AB in the funicular polygon should be parallel to a ray in the force polygon which is common between reactions  $R_A$  and  $R_B$ . A line parallel to this closing line is drawn from the pole O to meet a vertical line from point 6 at point 7 on the force polygon. The magnitude and direction of the reaction at B is the vector 6–7. Similarly, the vector 7–1 represents the reaction at support A in magnitude and direction.

Having found the reactions  $R_A$  and  $R_B$ , the internal member forces in the simple truss can be found by the solution of the polygon of forces in equilibrium graphically at the joints in a progressive manner. The triangular spaces inside the truss are marked 8 to 14 as shown. This helps to create the force diagram. The members of the truss are at the boundary between two spaces. For example, the member 13-7 is the central tie. Starting at joint B a line is drawn from point 7 parallel to member 7-8, which is horizontal, and another line parallel to member 8-6 is drawn from point 6 in the force diagram. These two lines meet at point 8. The magnitude of internal forces in members 7-8 and 8-6 can be determined by measurement from the force diagram. At each joint a clockwise direction of designation of member forces through the space numbers in the truss will give the actual directions of applied forces at the joint. Similarly, all the joints in the simple truss can be solved for internal forces. The points in the force diagram are determined in a progressive manner from 8 to 14. The force in a member acting towards a joint means that the member is in compression. If the member force acts away from the joint, then the member is in tension.


#### 2.3.3 The method of section by Maxwell diagram

A compound truss may be defined as a truss where all joints cannot be solved by the equations of equilibrium at the joints because the number of unknown member forces at a joint is more than two. In these cases a method of section has to be applied. The method of section can be applied graphically by the use of Maxwell diagrams.


The joints are numbered from 1 to 11 in the truss in SK 2/8. The members are designated by the number of joints at the two ends.

The force diagram can be constructed for joint 1 only, because beyond that joint, at joints 2 and 8, there are more than two unknown member forces. If the section m-n is taken through members 4-5, 4-11 and 8-10, as shown in SK 2/8, the internal forces in these members along with the external forces  $P_5$ ,  $P_6$ ,  $P_7$  and  $R_B$  on the right-hand side of the section must be in equilibrium.

The two rays parallel to O9 and O5 in the funicular polygon meet at a point r where a vertical force R establishes equilibrium on the right-hand side of the section m-n. The line of action of the internal force in member 8–10 meets the vertical line of action of the force Rat r'. The resultant of the remaining two internal member forces in 4–5 and 4–11 must pass through this point r' for equilibrium to exist. Hence the line of action of the resultant of internal forces in

members 4-5 and 4-11 must be on the line 4-r'. Draw a line in the polygon of forces diagram from point 5 parallel to the direction 4-r'. Draw another line from point 9 parallel to the direction of the member force in 8-10. These two lines meet at point e in the force diagram. The internal force in the member 8-10 is e-9 in the force diagram. Having solved for joint 8, the rest of the joints can be easily solved by using the force diagram because at all other joints there are no more than two unknown member forces.

Consider another example which is not a compound truss. The principle of section is explained again by using the funicular polygon and Maxwell diagram. The diagrams in SK 2/9 are self-explanatory.

#### 2.3.4 Deflection of pin-jointed structures

Castigliano's second theorem states that a partial derivative of the strain energy of a loaded elastic system with respect to a force in the system is the deflection of the structure at the point of application of that force in the direction of that force.

Suppose an elastic structure is acted on by forces  $P_1$  to  $P_n$ . If  $P_n$  is increased slightly by an amount  $\Delta P_n$ , then the strain energy of the elastic system increases by an amount  $\Delta U$ .

$$\Delta U = \frac{\partial U}{\partial P_{\rm n}} \, \Delta P_{\rm n}$$

where U = initial strain energy of system

 $\Delta U =$  increment of strain energy

 $\Delta P_{\rm n} =$  increment of external applied load

The increased strain energy becomes:

$$U + \Delta U = U + \frac{\partial U}{\partial P_{\rm n}} \,\Delta P_{\rm n}$$


Suppose  $\Delta P_n$  is applied first to the structure at the point of application of load  $P_n$ . The deflection produced by this very small load may be ignored. Forces  $P_1$  to  $P_n$  are then applied to the elastic structure. The deflection at the point of application of  $P_n$  in the direction of the force becomes  $\delta_n$ . The initially applied force  $\Delta P_n$  goes through a deflection of  $\delta_n$ , and the work done by this load is  $\Delta P_n \delta_n$ . Then the strain energy of the structure may be written as  $U + \Delta P_n \delta_n$ . Equating the previous expression of increased strain energy with this expression:

$$U + \frac{\partial U}{\partial P_{\rm n}} \,\Delta P_{\rm n} = U + \Delta P_{\rm n} \delta_{\rm n}$$

or  $\delta_n = \frac{\partial U}{\partial P_n}$  which is the proof of Castigliano's second theorem

 $\delta_n$  = deflection at the point of application of  $P_n$  in the direction of the force

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SK 2/10 Deflection of a pin-jointed structure.

The deflection under the load  $P_3$  in the truss in SK 2/10 is given by:

$$\delta_3 = \frac{\partial U}{\partial P_3} = \sum \frac{N_i l_i}{A_i E} \frac{\partial N_i}{\partial P_3}$$

where  $\partial N_i/\partial P_3$  is the internal force in each member of the truss due to unit load at the point of application and in the direction of  $P_3$ . This is a dimensionless quantity and is a pure number. The expression  $N_i l_i/A_i E$  is the elongation of each member of the truss due to the internal force as a result of the external loading  $P_1$  to  $P_5$ . A consistent system of sign convention must be adhered to for the computation of deflections. Compressive internal forces in the members of the pinjointed structures may be designated as negative forces.

The unit load can be applied in any direction at any joint and the deflection of the pin-jointed structure due to a system of applied external loads can be found in the direction of the unit load at the joint by summation of the product of the individual member extensions due to the application of the external system of loads and the internal forces in the members due to the unit load.



#### 2.4.1 Simply supported beams

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
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• • • A simply supported beam of span length l is loaded with uniformly distributed load w per unit length. The total load on the beam is wl. The reaction at each support is wl/2. The bending moment at a distance x from A is given by:

$$M_{x} = R_{A}x - wx \frac{x}{2} = \frac{wlx}{2} - \frac{wx^{2}}{2} = \frac{wx}{2} (l - x)$$
  
Shear force =  $V_{x} = \frac{wl}{2} - wx = \frac{w}{2} (l - 2x)$ 

#### 2.4.2 Slope-deflection equations



SK 2/12 Shape of a deflected beam.

Neglecting shear deformation, the curvature of the beam in SK 2/12 may be written as:

$$\frac{1}{R} = \frac{M}{EI}$$
 (see Section 1.1.2)

where M = bending moment

EI = flexural rigidity of section

I =moment of inertia of section


R = radius of curvature of beam

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Assume  $d\theta$  is the angle subtended at the centre of curvature for a length dx of the beam:

$$\therefore \quad d\theta = \frac{dx}{R} = \frac{M\,dx}{EI}$$

Change of slope between two points C and D in the beam is given by:



SK 2/13 Shape of a deflected beam.

Assume R is the radius of curvature at a point on the beam between sections P and Q. The angle between the tangents at the ends of a short length dx is  $d\theta$ , where  $dx = R d\theta$ . The intercept of these tangents on the orthogonal Y-axis is  $d\Delta$ , where  $d\Delta = x d\theta$ , because  $d\theta$  is very small.

$$d\Delta = x \, d\theta = \frac{x \, dx}{R} = \frac{Mx \, dx}{EI}$$
$$\Delta = \int_{Q}^{P} \frac{Mx \, dx}{EI} = \frac{A\bar{x}}{EI}$$

where EI is constant. Otherwise, EI is expressed as a function of x and the integration is carried out either mathematically or numerically.


A =area of bending moment diagram between P and Q $\bar{x} =$ distance of centre of gravity of bending moment diagram from origin of x

#### 2.4.3 Area moment theorems

The area moment theorems follow from the slope-deflection equations.

**Theorem 1:** The change in slope in a beam between any two points is the area of the bending moment diagram divided by *EI* between those two points.

Theorem 2: The intercept on the orthogonal Y-axis of the tangents to the deflected shape of the beam between any two points is the moment taken about the Y-axis of the bending moment diagram between those two points divided by EI.



SK 2/14 Simply supported beam with an arbitrary loading.

The bending moment diagram of the simply supported beam with an arbitrary loading has an area equal to A and the centre of gravity of this area is at  $\bar{x}$  from support A. The second area moment theorem for small angles of  $\theta_A$  and  $\theta_B$  gives:

$$-\theta_{\rm B}l = \Delta_{\rm A} = \frac{A\bar{x}}{EI} = \int_0^l \frac{Mx\,dx}{EI}$$
$$\theta_{\rm A}l = \Delta_{\rm B} = \frac{A(l-\bar{x})}{EI} = \int_0^l \frac{M(l-x)\,dx}{EI}$$
or  $\theta_{\rm A} = \int_0^l \frac{l-x}{l} \frac{M\,dx}{EI}$ and  $\theta_{\rm B} = -\int_0^l \frac{x}{l} \frac{M\,dx}{EI}$ 

Angles measured in the clockwise direction from the beam are assumed to be positive.

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From the above expressions it is clear that if a fictitious loading on the beam is assumed to be the bending moment diagram of the beam, then the end slopes are the shearing forces at the supports due to the fictitious loading divided by *EI*, where *EI* remains constant.

For a uniformly distributed loading of intensity w on the beam the bending moment diagram is a parabola with area equal to  $wl^3/12$  and  $\bar{x}$  equal to l/2.

$$\therefore \quad \theta_{\rm A} = -\theta_{\rm B} = \frac{A\bar{x}}{EIl} = \frac{wl^3}{24EI}$$

where  $\theta_A =$  slope of beam at end A


 $\theta_{\rm B} =$  slope of beam at end B


w = intensity of uniformly distributed load on beam

l = span of beam

E =modulus of elasticity

For the case of a simply supported beam with a concentrated load P at a distance a from the right-hand support B, the angles of rotations at A and B are given by:

$$\theta_{\rm A} = \frac{Pa(l^2 - a^2)}{6lEI}$$
$$\theta_{\rm B} = -\frac{Pa(l-a)(2l-a)}{6lEI}$$

## 2.4.4 Generalised slope-deflection equations

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
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SK 2/16 Beam with applied moment at one end.

Consider a beam AB of length l subjected to an applied moment  $M_{ab}$  at A when the bending moment is zero at B. The flexural rigidity EI is assumed constant.

 $A = \text{area of bending moment diagram} = \frac{M_{ab}l}{2}$ 

The centre of gravity of the area  $A = \bar{x} = \frac{1}{3}l$ 

$$\theta_{\rm A} = \frac{A(l-\bar{x})}{EIl} = \frac{M_{\rm ab}l}{3EI}$$

$$\theta_{\rm B} = -\frac{M_{\rm ab}l}{6EI}$$

When both  $M_{ab}$  and  $M_{ba}$  (clockwise positive at both ends of the beam) are acting together, then the end rotations are given by:

$$\theta_{\rm A} = \frac{M_{\rm ab}l}{3EI} - \frac{M_{\rm ba}l}{6EI}$$
$$\theta_{\rm B} = \frac{M_{\rm ba}l}{3EI} - \frac{M_{\rm ab}l}{6EI}$$

Expressing the end moments in terms of the end rotations gives:

$$M_{ab} = \frac{2EI}{l} (2\theta_{A} + \theta_{B})$$
$$M_{ba} = \frac{2EI}{l} (2\theta_{B} + \theta_{A})$$

If an arbitrary loading is applied to this beam which produces a free span bending moment diagram of area A with a centre of gravity at  $\bar{x}$  from the left-hand support A, then the end rotations are given by:


$$\theta_{\rm A} = \frac{M_{\rm ab}l}{3EI} - \frac{M_{\rm ba}l}{6EI} + \frac{A(l-\bar{x})}{EIl}$$
$$\theta_{\rm B} = \frac{M_{\rm ba}l}{3EI} - \frac{M_{\rm ab}l}{6EI} - \frac{A\bar{x}}{EIl}$$

Expressing the end moments in terms of the end rotations gives:

$$M_{\rm ab} = \frac{2EI}{l} (2\theta_{\rm A} + \theta_{\rm B}) - \frac{2A}{l^2} (2l - 3\bar{x})$$

$$M_{\rm ba} = \frac{2EI}{l} \left( 2\theta_{\rm B} + \theta_{\rm A} \right) + \frac{2A}{l^2} \left( 3\bar{x} - l \right)$$

where  $M_{ab} =$  applied moment at end A of beam AB  $M_{ba} =$  applied moment at end B of beam AB  $\theta_A =$  slope of beam at end A  $\theta_B =$  slope of beam at end B l = span of beam E = modulus of elasticity I = moment of inertia of section of beam

For the most generalised case of a beam, if it also rotates as a rigid body due to settlement of support B and the rotation  $\Theta_{AB}$  is clockwise positive, then the end rotations are given by:

$$\theta_{A} = \frac{M_{ab}l}{3EI} - \frac{M_{ba}l}{6EI} + \frac{A(l-\bar{x})}{EIl} + \Theta_{AB}$$
$$\theta_{B} = \frac{M_{ba}l}{3EI} - \frac{M_{ab}l}{6EI} - \frac{A\bar{x}}{EIl} + \Theta_{AB}$$

Solving for the end moments in terms of end rotations, the generalised equations are:

$$M_{ab} = \frac{2EI}{l} \left(2\theta_{A} + \theta_{B}\right) - \frac{2A}{l^{2}} \left(2l - 3\bar{x}\right) - \frac{6\Theta_{AB}EI}{l}$$
$$M_{ba} = \frac{2EI}{l} \left(2\theta_{B} + \theta_{A}\right) + \frac{2A}{l^{2}} \left(3\bar{x} - l\right) - \frac{6\Theta_{AB}EI}{l}$$

 $\Theta_{AB}$  = rigid body rotation of beam AB due to settlement of support B.

#### 2.4.5 Fixed-end beams

For any beam with both ends fixed against rotation and displacement, the terms  $\theta_A$  and  $\theta_B$  vanish and the generalised slope-deflection equations become:

$$FEM_{ab} = -\frac{2A}{l^2} (2l - 3\bar{x})$$
$$FEM_{ba} = \frac{2A}{l^2} (3\bar{x} - l)$$

 $FEM_{ab}$  is the fixed-end moment at end A of a beam with both ends fixed against rotation and displacement and loaded with any arbitrary loading which produces a free span bending moment diagram of area equal to A with a centre of gravity at  $\bar{x}$  from the left-hand support.


Using a notation k = EI/l, which is termed the stiffness factor, the slope-deflection equations can be written as:

$$M_{ab} = 2k(2\theta_{A} + \theta_{B}) + FEM_{ab} - 6k\Theta_{AB}$$
$$M_{ba} = 2k(2\theta_{B} + \theta_{A}) + FEM_{ba} - 6k\Theta_{AB}$$

The fixed-end moments  $FEM_{ab}$  and  $FEM_{ba}$  for beams with different loading are given in Table 11.9.

#### 2.4.6 Theorem of three moments

Consider span AB of length  $l_1$  which has applied bending moments  $M_{ab}$  and  $M_{ba}$  at ends A and B respectively due to the effects of continuity or boundary conditions, and an arbitrary loading on span AB

which produces a free span bending moment diagram of area equal to  $A_1$  with a centre of gravity at  $\bar{x}_1$  from the left-hand support A:

Similarly, considering span BC, where the area of the free span bending moment diagram is  $A_2$  and the centre of gravity of the area  $A_2$  is at  $\bar{x}_2$  from the right-hand support:

$$\theta_{\rm BC} = \frac{M_{\rm bc}l_2}{3EI_2} - \frac{M_{\rm cb}l_2}{6EI_2} + \frac{A_2\bar{x}_2}{EI_2l_2}$$

Using the conventional sign for moments in beams (i.e. positive moments produce bottom tension and negative moments produce top tension), the bending moments in the slope deflection equations may be changed as follows:

This is known as the theorem of three moments. The application of this theorem results in the creation of a number of equations matching the number of unknown support moments in a continuous beam. At the simply supported end of the beam the bending moment is zero. If the beam is built-in at one end, say at support A, then the expression of rotation  $\theta_{AB}$  at end A is equated to zero, giving the necessary number of equations to solve the problem.



#### Carry-over factor

It was established earlier that when a bending moment  $M_{ab}$  is applied at end A of a simply supported beam, then the end rotations are given by:


EI remains constant over the length l of the beam. If a moment  $M_{ba}$  is applied at the end B of the beam to reduce  $\theta_B$  to zero, then the end rotation at B can be written as:

The carry-over factor for a beam with constant EI is  $+\frac{1}{2}$ . When a moment M is applied at one end of a beam then a moment  $\frac{1}{2}M$  is carried over to the other end of the beam if that end is fixed.

#### Distribution factor

Four prismatic members of uniform cross-section and fixed ends are connected at joint A as shown in SK 2/20. The members AB, AC, AD and AE have stiffness factors  $k_1$ ,  $k_2$ ,  $k_3$  and  $k_4$  respectively, where  $k_i = EI_i/l_i$ .



#### SK 2/20 Determination of distribution factors.

Assume that due to loading on all four members joint A rotates by an angle  $\theta_A$ . Since the other ends of the members are fixed with zero slope, the slope-deflection equations can be written as follows (see section 2.4.5):

$$M_{ab} = 4k_1\theta_A + FEM_{ab}$$
$$M_{ac} = 4k_2\theta_A + FEM_{ac}$$
$$M_{ad} = 4k_3\theta_A + FEM_{ad}$$

The term  $M_a$  is defined as the unbalanced moment at the joint which has the opposite sign to the algebraic sum of the applied moments at the joint.

The ratios  $k_i / \sum k$  are called the distribution factors.

After distribution at joint A the far ends of the beams will see an additional moment due to the carry-over equal to:

$$\frac{1}{2} \frac{k_{\rm i}}{\sum k} M_{\rm a}$$

The fixed-end moments may be due to transverse loading on the beam or due to displacement or rotation of the end joint. Fixed-end moments due to displacement of joints have a significant effect in sway frames. For sway frames the initial moment distribution is carried out ignoring sway and assuming supports at the joints in the direction of sway. After the initial moment distribution the reactions at these temporary supports are determined. Further moment distributions are carried out by releasing these temporary props one at a time and allowing the frame to sway in the direction opposite to the calculated reaction. The force required to cause a unit displacement at the joint of the frame is computed along with its effect on the other props in the system. Finally, a set of simultaneous equations matching the number of temporary props is created by equating the reactions at the props from the first moment distribution to the reactions due to unit sway multiplied by a constant at each point of sway. Solution of these constants from the equations gives the sway moments in the frame. These moments are then combined with the initial moments after first distribution.


#### 2.4.8 Arches

The definition and assumptions of arches are as follows:

- bar curved in one plane only
- supported at both ends
- points of support immovable
- loading in the same plane as the curvature
- plane of curvature is the plane of symmetry of the cross-section
- depth of cross-section is small compared to the radius of curvature.

Three-hinged arches are statically determinate whereas two-hinged arches and hingeless arches are statically indeterminate. A two-hinged arch has four unknown reactions at the supports, viz. two vertical and two horizontal reactions. The three equations of equilibrium are not sufficient to find four unknown reactions. The degree of redundancy in this case is one. The hingeless arch has six unknown reactions at the supports and hence the degree of redundancy is three.

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#### SK 2/21 Element of an arch rib.

Neglecting strain energy due to shearing forces, the strain energy of any arch may be written as:



Generally for most arches the cross-sectional area A and the moment of inertia I vary along the length of the arch rib.

This equation is valid for any symmetrical two-hinged arch subjected to vertical loads and may be used for numerical integration. An arch with variable cross-sectional geometry may be divided up into discrete segments along the length of its rib and the numerator and the denominator of the expression for H evaluated by summation of the components of each segmental value using the segment length as ds in the equation.

Mathematically H can be calculated if the arch rib is assumed to follow a geometric profile and the geometry of the cross-section is expressed in terms of its slope to the X-axis. Assume:


#### Thermal stresses in symmetrical two-hinged arches

Assume a rise of temperature of the arch rib by  $t^{\circ}C$ . If the support at *B* is free to slide then the support will move horizontally by a distance equal to  $l\alpha t$ , where  $\alpha$  is the coefficient of thermal expansion for the material of the arch. Since the support is restrained against horizontal movement, this is equivalent to applying a force *H* at the support which will produce an opposite displacement equal to  $l\alpha t$ .

#### 2.4.10 Hingeless symmetrical arches



SK 2/23 Hingeless symmetrical arch under symmetrical vertical load.

Because the loading is symmetrical, the shear force must vanish at the crown. Only two redundant internal forces are present at the crown, viz.  $M_c$  and  $N_c$ . Assume s to be half the length of the arch rib. At the crown, owing to symmetry, the rotation of the arch rib and the horizontal displacement must be zero. Applying Castigliano's second theorem it can be said:

$$\frac{\partial U}{\partial M_{\rm c}} = 2 \int_0^{\rm s} \frac{M}{EI} \frac{\partial M}{\partial M_{\rm c}} \, ds = 0$$

Using these two equations the two unknown internal forces  $M_c$  and  $N_c$  can be determined knowing the geometry of the arch and the loading.

M' = bending moment due to external loading only N' = axial thrust due to external loading only  $M_c =$  bending moment in arch rib at crown of arch  $N_c =$  axial thrust in arch rib at crown of arch

#### Elastic centre of the arch

If the origin is shifted to O as shown in SK 2/23 the following simplifications can be made:

The shifted origin at d is called the elastic centre of the arch. The expression for  $H_0$  and  $N_c$  may be used for numerical integration.

The choice of the origin at the elastic centre is equivalent to attaching an infinitely stiff bracket at the crown. The forces  $H_0$  and  $M_0$  act at the end of this bracket at a depth d from the crown of the arch. The rigid bracket assumption validates that there is no rotation and horizontal displacement at either O or C of the hingeless symmetrical arch under symmetrical loading.

#### Thermal stresses in hingeless symmetrical arch

A symmetrical hingeless arch subjected to a uniform rise of temperature  $t^{\circ}C$  will try to expand by  $\frac{1}{2}\alpha tl$  at the crown C. Because the arch is symmetrical, the rotation at the crown must be zero and the horizontal displacement is  $\frac{1}{2}\alpha tl$ . Applying the theorem of least work it can be said:



This expression for  $H_0$  may be used for numerical integration.

Antimetric loading on a hingeless arch



SK 2/24 Antimetric loading on a symmetrical hingeless arch.

The antimetric loading on a symmetrical hingeless arch is applied by two equal and opposite forces acting at an equal spacing on either side of the crown. From symmetry it can be concluded that each load P acting in the opposite direction at an equal distance from the crown will produce an equal and opposite internal bending moment and direct thrust at the crown. The moment and the axial thrust will vanish at the crown as a result of such a loading and only shearing force will remain. If the shearing force is  $V_0$ , then by using the theorem of least work it can be said:



At any cross-section M' and N' are the bending moment and axial thrust for external loading only.

Having found  $V_0$ , the rest of the internal forces and reactions can be found easily. The expression for  $V_0$  can be used for numerical integration. A combination of symmetric and antimetric loading can be used to represent any asymmetric loading on the arch as shown in SK 2/25.



SK 2/25 Symmetric and antimetric loading.


# 2.5 INFLUENCE LINES


In any structure there may be several critical points where the internal forces have to be evaluated. Loading on any part of the structure gives rise to the internal forces at the critical points of interest. The influence coefficient at any point in a structure for any internal force at any critical point in the structure is the value of the internal force due to unit load at that point. Suppose the point of interest for bending moment in a simply supported beam is the centre of span. The influence coefficient at a quarter point is the measure of bending moment at the centre of span when the unit load is at the guarter point on the span. The influence line is the graphical representation of all the influence coefficients on a structure for an internal force at a critical point of interest. First select an internal force, next select a point of interest and then apply unit load at any point on the structure to find the influence coefficient at that point for the internal force at the chosen point of interest. The influence coefficients are graphically represented as ordinates on the structure and when joined up by a line produce what is called the influence line. The completed diagram is called the influence diagram for an internal force at a critical point of interest in the structure.

The benefit of using influence lines becomes evident when several moving loads are applied to the structure and the task is to find the worst effect of these loads. The effects of individual loads are added to find the combined effect of several loads.

### 2.5.1 Influence lines of cantilever beams

When a unit load is applied at the end of a cantilever beam of length l then the bending moment at the support is -l, which is represented as an ordinate -l at the end of the cantilever beam. Similarly, if the unit load is at a distance x from the built-in end of the cantilever,





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then the bending moment at the built-in support is -x. The influence line for bending moment at the built-in end of a cantilever beam is a straight line with an ordinate of -l at the tip of the cantilever and zero ordinate at the built-in end. A load P applied at x from the built-in end of the cantilever will produce a bending moment -Px at the built-in end. For a uniformly distributed load of w per unit length over the whole length of the cantilever beam the bending moment at the built-in end will be the area of the influence diagram multiplied by the intensity of loading.


$$M = \frac{1}{2} llw = \frac{wl^2}{2}$$

The influence line for shearing force at the built-in end of the cantilever is a constant ordinate line of coefficient equal to 1. The influence line for deflection at the tip of the cantilever is given by the expression:

$$\delta = \left[\frac{x^3}{3EI} + \frac{x^2}{2EI}\left(l - x\right)\right]$$

where x is the distance from the built-in end.

# 2.5.2 Influence lines of a simply supported beam



SK 2/27 Influence diagrams for bending moments and shearing force at point C of a simply supported beam.


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A simply supported beam AB is under the action of a unit load. Consider the influence line for bending moment of a point C on the beam which is at a distance a from A and b from B. The bending moment at C is the reaction at  $B(R_b)$  multiplied by the distance bwhen the load is at the left of C. Similarly, the bending moment at Cis the reaction at  $A(R_a)$  multiplied by the distance a when the load is at the right of C. The influence coefficients for  $R_a a$  and  $R_b b$  are the ordinates a and b at A and B respectively. The influence line for bending moment at C is the influence line for reaction  $R_a$  times a to the right of C and  $R_b$  times b to the left of C. This gives the triangular influence diagram with a maximum ordinate ab/l at C.

Similarly, the shearing force influence line at C is the reaction influence line for  $R_b$  when the load is to the left of C and the reaction influence line for  $R_a$  when the load is to the right of C.

For a train of concentrated moving loads on a simply supported beam the bending moment will be maximum under a load where the shearing force changes sign. The *absolute maximum bending moment* in that beam occurs under this load when the load is so positioned that the resultant of the train of loads and the load itself are equally spaced about the centre-line of the beam, or, in other words, when the midpoint of the span bisects the distance between the load and the resultant of the train of loads.

# 2.5.3 Influence lines of three-hinged arches



SK 2/28 Unit load on a three-hinged arch.

The three-hinged arch shown in SK 2/28 is subjected to a unit vertical load. Assume that the reactions at support A are  $R_a$  and H', and at support B they are  $R_b$  and H', where H' is acting in the direction of the line joining A and B. Taking moments of all external forces about A:

$$R_{\rm b} = \frac{a'}{l}; \qquad R_{\rm a} = \frac{b'}{l}$$

- $R_a$  = vertical reaction at support A of three-hinged arch
- $R_{\rm b}$  = vertical reaction at support B of three-hinged arch
- a' = distance of unit load from support A of arch
- b' = distance of unit load from support B of arch
  - l = horizontal distance between supports A and B of arch
- H' = reaction at support of arch in the direction AB
- H =horizontal component of H'
- a = distance of hinge C from support A of arch
- b = distance of hinge C from support B of arch
- $\alpha$  = angle of inclination of line AB to horizontal

This means that the vertical reactions  $R_a$  and  $R_b$  are the same as in a simply supported beam of span *l*. Taking moments about the hinge *C* and equating to zero:

$$R_{a}a - H'f\cos\alpha = 0$$



when the load is to the right of C, and:

$$H = H' \cos \alpha = R_{\rm b} \, \frac{b}{f}$$

when the load is to the left of C.

It is concluded from the above expressions that the vertical simple span reaction influence lines when multiplied by a/f for the right part of C and b/f for the left part of C give the influence lines for H.





Bending moment at point D at a distance c from A (as shown in SK 2/30) may be expressed as follows:

$$M_{\rm d} = R_{\rm a}c - H'y_{\rm d}\cos\alpha = R_{\rm a}c - Hy_{\rm d}$$

The term  $R_ac$  represents the bending moment influence line for point D of a simply supported beam of length l, and the term  $Hy_d$  represents the influence line of horizontal thrust multiplied by  $y_d$ . If the ordinates of these two influence lines are subtracted from one another, the result is the influence line of bending moment for point D in a three-hinged arch. This is illustrated in SK 2/30.

Similarly, the shearing force  $V_d$  at point D may be expressed as follows when the load is to the right of D:



The tangent at D is inclined to the horizontal by an angle  $\phi$  and the angle of inclination of line AB to the horizontal is  $\alpha$ . The first term in the expression corresponds to the influence coefficients for shearing force at point D of a simply supported beam of span l multiplied by  $\cos \phi$ , and the second term expresses the influence coefficients of horizontal thrust H multiplied by  $\sin(\phi - \alpha)/\cos \alpha$ . The influence

diagram of shearing force at point D in the three-hinged arch is obtained by subtracting the ordinates of the second term from those of the first term. This is illustrated in SK 2/30.

#### 2.5.4 Influence lines of simple trusses

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
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SK 2/31 Influence diagrams of a simple truss.

 $R_a$  is the vertical reaction at A and the load is right of point D in SK 2/31.

Consider the free body diagram to the left of section mn of the truss illustrated in SK 2/31. The part truss is in equilibrium under the action of  $R_a$ ,  $S_1$ ,  $S_2$  and  $S_3$ . The lines of action of  $S_2$  and  $S_3$  meet at D,  $S_1$  and  $S_3$  meet at G and  $S_1$  and  $S_2$  meet at E.

Considering the equilibrium of the part truss on the left-hand side of section mn, taking moments of all the external forces about point D and equating the sum to zero:

$$R_{\mathbf{a}}a + S_{\mathbf{1}}h_{\mathbf{1}} = 0$$

$$\therefore \quad S_1 = -\frac{R_a a}{h_1}$$

Therefore the influence line ordinates for  $S_1$  are the influence line ordinates of bending moment for point D of a simply supported beam divided by  $h_1$ . Similarly:

$$S_3 = \frac{R_a d}{h_3}$$

Therefore, the influence line ordinates for  $S_3$  are the influence line ordinates for bending moment at point E for a simple beam divided by  $h_3$ .

By taking moments about point G it can be stated:

$$S_2 = \frac{R_a c}{h_2}$$

This expression is true when the load is to the right of D. Considering the equilibrium of the right-hand side of section mn of the truss when the load is to the left of C and taking moments about point G:

$$S_2 = -\frac{R_{\rm b}(l+c)}{h_2}$$

The influence line ordinates for  $S_2$  are the influence line ordinates of  $R_a$  or  $R_b$  (depending on the location of the load with respect to points D and C) multiplied by the appropriate factor as illustrated in SK 2/31.

Note:

For a parallel chord truss the factors  $c/h_2$  and  $(l+c)/h_2$  are taken to be equal to 1.0 because the distances c and  $h_2$  tend to infinity.

#### 2.6 MATRIX METHOD OF STRUCTURAL ANALYSIS

It is assumed that the reader has a working knowledge of matrix algebra and all the notations. The basic principles of the matrix method of structural analysis are discussed in this section. The most powerful and popular method of structural analysis with the help of matrix algebra is the displacement method. This section deals with the application of the displacement method to trusses, continuous beams and rigid frames.


#### 2.6.1 Truss analysis by the displacement method

The method of displacement is explained with reference to the truss shown in SK 2/32. Firstly the load equilibrium relationship between the external and internal forces is established at each joint, which are both free to move. Secondly, the joint deformation with member deformation relationship is established. The applied loads and the joint deformations are assumed to be positive corresponding to the direction of positive X and Y co-ordinates.

Applied external loads are  $P_1$  to  $P_4$  and the internal axial forces in the members of the truss are  $S_1$  to  $S_5$  for members 1 to 5 respectively.

Considering the load equilibrium relationship at all joints of the truss which are free to displace it can be stated:

 $S_1 \cos \alpha_1 - S_3 \cos \alpha_3 - S_5 = P_1$   $S_1 \sin \alpha_1 + S_3 \sin \alpha_3 = P_2$   $S_2 \cos \alpha_2 + S_4 \cos \alpha_4 + S_5 = P_3$  $S_2 \sin \alpha_2 - S_4 \sin \alpha_4 = P_4$

Assume that the joints A and B displace by  $\Delta_1$ ,  $\Delta_2$ ,  $\Delta_3$  and  $\Delta_4$ along the X-X and Y-Y axes as shown in SK 2/32. The axial increases in the length of the truss elements due to these joint displacements are  $\delta_1$ ,  $\delta_2$ ,  $\delta_3$ ,  $\delta_4$  and  $\delta_5$  for members 1 to 5 respectively. The relationship between the joint displacements and the member extensions may be expressed as follows:

The matrix  $[A^T]$  is the transpose of the geometry matrix [A] and is called the deformation matrix. The compatibility of deformations at all the joints is established by this relationship.

The relationship between the extension of a truss element and the internal force in the element can be expressed as follows:

This relationship expressed in matrix notation gives:

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where [K] is called the stiffness matrix. For the truss in question the stiffness matrix can be written as follows:

The joint displacement matrix of the structure  $[\Delta]$  can be solved by inversion of the  $[AKA^T]$  matrix and multiplying it by the load matrix. Having found the joint displacements, the internal forces in the members of the truss can be computed with the help of the geometry matrix and the stiffness matrix.



# 2.6.2 Continuous beam analysis by the displacement method

The method of displacement applied to a continuous beam is best explained with the help of a three-span continuous beam as illustrated in SK 2/33. Assume that an external moment is applied at each joint. They are termed  $FEM_1$ ,  $FEM_2$  and  $FEM_3$  at joints 1, 2 and 3 respectively. The applied joint moments are the algebraic sum of the fixed-end moments of the members connecting at the joint due to loading on the members. These applied moments make the joints rotate by angles  $\Theta_1$ ,  $\Theta_2$  and  $\Theta_3$  at joints 1, 2 and 3 respectively. Considering the equilibrium of moments at the joints it can be written:

$$FEM_1 = M_2 + M_3$$
$$FEM_2 = M_4 + M_5$$
$$FEM_3 = M_6$$

In matrix notation this can be expressed as:

[FEM] = [A][M]

where the geometry matrix [A] is given by:

From the slope-deflection equations derived in earlier parts of this chapter it is known that the end rotations and the end moments in prismatic members are related to one another. For a prismatic member with joint notations *ij* the following expressions can be written:

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The joint rotation matrix is computed from the geometry matrix, the displacement matrix, the stiffness matrix and the external joint moment matrix. The inversion of the matrix  $[AKA^T]$  multiplied by the matrix [FEM] gives the rotations at all the joints. When the joint rotations are known, the member internal forces can be calculated by the use of the geometry matrix and the stiffness matrix.



#### 2.6.3 Continuous frame analysis by the displacement method

The rigid frame chosen to illustrate this method has a single degree of freedom in the direction of sidesway. To determine the number of degrees of freedom in the direction of sidesway the following equation may be used:

$$s = 2j - (2f + 2h + r + m)$$

where s = number of degrees of freedom of sidesway j = total number of joints in the structure

- f = number of rotationally and translationally fixed supports (fixed)
- h = number of translationally fixed supports (hinged)
- r = number of translationally fixed supports in one orthogonal direction (roller)
- m = number of members in the frame

Applying this equation to the problem illustrated in SK 2/34:

 $s = 2 \times 6 - [(2 \times 3) + (2 \times 0) + (0 + 5)] = 1$ 

The number of degrees of freedom for sidesway is important in the analyses because in the displacement equations for the joints these unknown parameters have to be included. It may be noted that for the rigid frame illustrated the sidesway can occur at the level of the beam.

As in the case of the continuous beam discussed earlier, we can make the following assumptions:

•  $FEM_1$ ,  $FEM_2$  and  $FEM_3$  are three algebraic sums of fixed-end moments at joints 1, 2 and 3 respectively. All clockwise moments are assumed to be positive. There is a net external applied force at the level of the beam in the direction of the sway displacement, and this force may be called H. These four elements form the external force matrix.

- The members 1 to 5 as shown in SK 2/34 have geometric properties defined by  $(I_1l_1)$ ,  $(I_2l_2)$ ,  $(I_3l_3)$ ,  $(I_4l_4)$  and  $(I_5l_5)$  respectively, where  $I_i$  is the moment of inertia and  $l_i$  is the length of the prismatic member.
- The beam-end moments are, for member 1  $M_1$  and  $M_2$ , for member 2  $M_3$  and  $M_4$ , for member 3  $M_5$  and  $M_6$ , for member 4  $M_7$  and  $M_8$  and for member 5  $M_9$  and  $M_{10}$ . The beam-end rotations are marked exactly in the same fashion from  $\theta_1$  to  $\theta_{10}$ .
- Assume the joint rotations are  $\Theta_1$ ,  $\Theta_2$  and  $\Theta_3$  at joints 1, 2 and 3 respectively. Also assume that the horizontal displacement at the level of the beam due to sidesway is  $\Delta$ .

Considering the equilibrium of moments at the joints, the external load and internal force relationships may be written as follows, where P is the generalised form of notation of external loads:

$$P_{1} = FEM_{1} = M_{1} + M_{6}$$

$$P_{2} = FEM_{2} = M_{2} + M_{3} + M_{8}$$

[A] is termed the geometry matrix or the statics matrix.

The deformations of the joints are equated to the deformations of the ends of the prismatic members connecting at the joints. The effect of the sway of the frame at the level of the beam by an amount equal to  $\Delta$  is equivalent to angular displacements of members 3, 4 and 5 when the following relationship is true for small displacements:

The joint displacement matrix [X] is first solved by the inversion of the  $[AKA^{T}]$  matrix multiplied by the load matrix [P]. When the joint displacements are known, the member internal forces can be computed by the use of the geometry matrix and the stiffness matrix.

It is of interest to note that the matrix  $[AKA^T]^{-1}$  is entirely dependent on the geometric and material properties of the frame structure and its boundary conditions. The external load matrix does not influence this structural property within elastic limits and small displacements.


# 2.7 STRUCTURAL DYNAMICS

This section deals with the fundamentals of the vibration of structures, free or forced. Most structures can be idealised into a mass-springdashpot system. Vibration maintained only by the spring force of the structure is called free vibration. An external time-dependent force applied to a structure causes a forced vibration.

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The idealised spring represents the stiffness of the structure in any given direction and the dashpot is a measure of viscous damping, signifying the dissipating energy of the spring-mass system due to vibration. The linear viscous dashpot model of a structure represents a damping resistance which is velocity dependent.

### 2.7.1 Single degree of freedom (SDOF) systems



SK 2/35 Idealised dynamic models of structures.

The structures illustrated in SK 2/35 are idealised to dynamic models with a single degree of freedom (i.e. the lumped masses are allowed to move in one given linear direction only). It is assumed that the spring representing the structural stiffness is massless and has a stiffness equal to k (N/m). The viscous dashpot has a damping coefficient c (N sec/m).

For the case of the load supported by the spring vertically, assume the X-axis is along the line of motion and that the origin (x = 0) is at the location where the spring is unstretched. Assume a force p(t)is acting on the mass m, and causes a displacement u(t) of the mass after an interval of time t.

Inertial force =  $m\ddot{u}$  acting against the direction of motion Damping force =  $c\dot{u}$  acting against the direction of motion Spring force = ku acting against the direction of motion W = weight of mass = mgm = mass c = damping coefficient k = stiffness

p(t) = applied time dependent force

u(t) = time dependent displacement

The equation of dynamic equilibrium is given by:

$$p(t) - m\ddot{u} - c\dot{u} - ku + W = 0$$
  
or  $m\ddot{u} + c\dot{u} + ku = W + p(t)$ 

The static displacement of the spring due to load W is  $u_{st}$ , given by:

$$u_{\rm st} = \frac{W}{k}$$

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Assume  $u = u_r + u_{st}$ , where  $u_r$  is the relative displacement with respect to the static equilibrium configuration and  $u_{st}$  is a constant.

$$m\ddot{u}_{r} + c\dot{u}_{r} + ku_{r} = p(t)$$

Similarly for the portal frame the idealised SDOF dynamic model will give:

 $m\ddot{u} + c\dot{u} + ku = p(t)$ 

This is the fundamental equation of motion. Dividing both sides of the equation by m and using the notation  $m = k/\omega_n^2$  the equation of motion may be rewritten as:

$$\ddot{u} + 2\xi\omega_{\rm n}\dot{u} + \omega_{\rm n}^2 u = \left(\frac{\omega_{\rm n}^2}{k}\right)p(t)$$

where  $\xi = c/c_{\rm cr}$  and  $c_{\rm cr} = 2m\omega_{\rm n} = 2k/\omega_{\rm n}$ .

The term  $\omega_n$  (radians/sec) is called the undamped natural frequency of the structure and  $c_{\rm cr}$  is the critical damping coefficient. The magnitude of the damping factor  $\xi$  is used to determine three cases of damping, viz.  $0 < \xi < 1 =$  underdamped,  $\xi = 1 =$  critically damped and  $\xi > 1 =$  overdamped. For overdamped and critically damped structures there is no oscillation. Also:

 $T_{\rm n}$  = undamped natural period of vibration =  $\frac{2\pi}{\omega_{\rm n}}$  (seconds)

 $f_n$  = undamped natural frequency of vibration

$$=\frac{1}{T_{\rm n}}=\frac{\omega_{\rm n}}{2\pi}$$
 (cycles per second – Hz)

Assuming that the system is underdamped and the forcing function is zero, the equation of motion for free vibration is given by:

$$\ddot{u} + \omega_{\rm p}^2 u = 0$$


The solution of this second-order linear differential equation is:

 $u = C_1 \cos \omega_n t + C_2 \sin \omega_n t$ 

where  $C_1$  and  $C_2$  are constants to be determined from the initial conditions of motion when time t=0. Assume that at time t=0,  $u=u_0$ and  $\dot{u}=\dot{u}_0$ . Substituting these values in the equation of motion:

$$C_1 = u_0$$
 and  $C_2 = \frac{u_0}{\omega_n}$ 

Therefore the equation of motion of a single degree of freedom system is:



SK 2/36 Vectorial representation of a free vibration response.

The equation of motion has two parts. The first part is dependent on the initial displacement and the second part is dependent on the initial velocity of motion. Vectorial representation of these two parts is illustrated in SK 2/36. The rotating vector  $\overline{OB}$  with a length  $u_0$  is rotating anticlockwise with time t at an angular velocity  $\omega_n$ . Vector  $\overline{BC}$  with a length equal to  $u_0/\omega_n$  is at 90° to the vector  $\overline{OB}$ . The resultant vector is  $\overline{OC}$  which has a magnitude equal to A given by:

$$A = \sqrt{u_0^2 + \left(\frac{\dot{u}_0}{\omega_n}\right)^2}$$


A is called the amplitude of the motion, which is the maximum value of u. The equation of motion can also be written as  $u = A \cos(\omega_n t - \alpha)$ , as shown in the vector diagram, where  $\alpha$  is called the phase angle and is given by:

$$\alpha = \tan^{-1} \frac{\dot{u}_0}{\omega_n u_0}$$

The equation of motion may also be written as:

$$u = A\cos\omega_{\rm n}\left(t - \frac{\alpha}{\omega_{\rm n}}\right)$$

From this expression it can be concluded that a time equal to  $\alpha/\omega_n$  must pass after initial time t = 0 before *u* reaches the maximum value *A* equal to the amplitude of motion. This time is called the time lag.



SK 2/37 Undamped free vibration of a single degree of freedom system.

# 2.7.2 Effect of viscous damping on free vibration

The general equation of motion is given by:

 $\ddot{u}+2\xi\omega_{\rm n}\dot{u}+\omega_{\rm n}^2u=0$ 

The underdamped case  $\xi < 1$  is considered for the vibration analysis. Assuming the damped natural frequency  $\omega_d = \omega_n \sqrt{(1 - \xi^2)}$ , solution of the differential equation results in:

$$u = e^{-\xi\omega_{\rm n}t} (C_1 \cos \omega_{\rm d} t + C_2 \sin \omega_{\rm d} t)$$

The constants  $C_1$  and  $C_2$  are determined from the initial conditions as before. This will give:

$$u = e^{-\xi\omega_{n}t} \left[ u_{0}\cos\omega_{d}t + \left(\frac{\dot{u}_{0} + \xi\omega_{n}u_{0}}{\omega_{d}}\right)\sin\omega_{d}t \right]$$
$$= A e^{-\xi\omega_{n}t}\cos(\omega_{d}t - \alpha)$$

The amplitude of the motion, A, is given by:

$$A = \sqrt{u_0^2 + \left(\frac{\dot{u}_0 + \xi \omega_n u_0}{\omega_d}\right)^2}$$
  
and  $\alpha = \tan^{-1}\left(\frac{\dot{u}_0 + \xi \omega_n u_0}{\omega_d u_0}\right)$ 

The term  $e^{-\xi \omega_n t}$  is responsible for the dying out of the response over a period of time.

# 2.7.3 Forced vibration of undamped SDOF systems due to harmonic excitation

This section deals with the forced vibration of undamped single degree of freedom systems when the forcing function is harmonic. The solution to the general equation of motion is in two parts – i.e. the particular solution  $(u_p)$  and the complementary solution  $(u_c)$ . The total response of the system is the superposition of the forced vibration and the natural vibration.

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The equation of the forced motion is given by:

$$m\ddot{u} + ku = p_0 \cos \Omega t$$

where  $p_0 =$  amplitude of force of excitation  $\Omega =$  frequency of excitation


In the above equation the amplitude of the force of excitation  $p_0$  and the frequency of excitation  $\Omega$  remain constant. The solution of the differential equation may be written as  $u_p = U \cos \Omega t$ , where U is the amplitude of the steady-state response found by substitution of this solution in the equation of motion, and is given by:


$$U = \frac{p_0}{k - m\Omega^2} \quad \text{where } k - m\Omega^2 \neq 0$$

Assume  $U_0 = p_0/k$ , which is the deflection of the spring due to the amplitude  $p_0$  of the harmonic excitation. Assume also that the ratio of frequencies (forced upon natural) is equal to r.

 $r = \Omega/\omega_n$  and the response may also be expressed as  $u_p = U_0/(1-r^2)\cos\Omega t$  when  $r \neq 1$  and  $m/k = 1/\omega_n^2$ .

It is observed from the above response equation that when r approaches 1, the amplitude of the response approaches a very high value. This is called resonance. The response is in phase when r is less than 1, and is 180° out of phase when r is greater than 1. This phenomenon is illustrated in SK 2/38.  $U/U_0$  is called the steady-state dynamic magnification factor.





The total response including the free vibration will be written as:


$$u = \left(\frac{U_0}{1 - r^2}\right) \cos \Omega t + C_1 \cos \omega_n t + C_2 \sin \omega_n t$$

The constants  $C_1$  and  $C_2$  may be determined from the initial conditions of motion.

# 2.7.4 Forced vibration of undamped SDOF system by triangular impulse

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The spring-mass SDOF system is subjected to a triangular pulse load as in the case of a blast loading. The response of the system is calculated in two stages, viz.  $t \le t_d$  and  $t > t_d$ , where  $t_d$  is the time of duration of the impulsive loading.



SK 2/39 Triangular impulse load-time history.

The equation of the forced motion due to the triangular pulse when  $t \le t_d$  is given as:

$$m\ddot{u} + ku = f(t) = F_1\left(1 - \frac{t}{t_d}\right)$$

The solution of this differential equation is given by:

$$u = C_1 \sin \omega_n t + C_2 \cos \omega_n t + \frac{F_1}{k} \left( 1 - \frac{t}{t_d} \right)$$

At t=0, u=0 and  $\ddot{u}=0$ ,  $\therefore C_1 = F_1/\omega_n k t_d$  and  $C_2 = -F_1/k$ .

$$\therefore \quad u = \frac{F_1}{\omega_n k t_d} \sin \omega_n t - \frac{F_1}{k} \cos \omega_n t + \frac{F_1}{k} \left(1 - \frac{t}{t_d}\right)$$

The static displacement due to the maximum value of the impulsive load is  $u_{st} = F_1/k$ .

Dynamic magnification factor 
$$= \frac{u}{u_{st}} = \frac{\sin \omega_n t}{t_d \omega_n} - \cos \omega_n t + 1 - \frac{t}{t_d}$$

The equation of the forced motion due to a triangular impulse when  $t > t_d$  is given by  $m\ddot{u} + ku = 0$  because the external force is zero and a free vibration ensues. The solution to this equation is given by:

$$u = C_1 \sin \omega_{\rm n} t + C_2 \cos \omega_{\rm n} t$$

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
The constants  $C_1$  and  $C_2$  are determined from the initial condition of motion. The starting point of this motion is the end of the previous motion when t was less than  $t_d$ . Therefore the initial condition of this motion is found by substituting  $t = t_d$  in the response equation of the previous motion when t was less than or equal to  $t_d$ . The response of this free vibration stage is therefore given by:


$$u = \frac{F_1}{k\omega_n t_d} [\sin \omega_n t - \sin \omega_n (t - t_d)] - \frac{F_1}{k} \cos \omega_n t$$
$$\cdot \frac{u}{u_{st}} = \frac{1}{\omega_n t_d} [\sin \omega_n t - \sin \omega_n (t - t_d)] - \cos \omega_n t$$

The dynamic magnification factor  $u/u_{st}$  depends entirely on  $\omega_n t_d$  or the ratio  $t_d/T_n$ , where  $T_n$  is the natural period of vibration.

# 2.7.5 Free vibration of a simply supported beam with distributed mass

Consider a prismatic member with a constant flexural stiffness EI, a constant mass per unit length equal to m, and a span length l over simple supports. The inertial forces are acting against the flexural stiffness of the beam.





Assume u(x, t) is the transverse displacement of the beam, which is a function of x and t, where x is the distance along the length of the beam and t is the time elapsed in seconds. This is a case of free vibration and there is no applied external time-dependent force function on the system.

Consider the elementary section dx of the beam at a distance x from the left-hand support. The inertial force due to the elementary mass of the beam is m dx a, where a is the acceleration on the elementary mass given by  $d^2u/dt^2$ . On the elementary section dx the internal forces will act as shown in SK 2/40. The vertical force balance for dynamic equilibrium is given by:

$$V - \left(V + \frac{\partial V}{\partial x} dx\right) - m dx \frac{\partial^2 u}{\partial t^2} = 0$$
  
or  $\frac{\partial V}{\partial x} = -m \frac{\partial^2 u}{\partial t^2}$ 

The following relationships are true in any beam:

$$\frac{\partial M}{\partial x} = V;$$
  $\frac{\partial^2 M}{\partial x^2} = \frac{\partial V}{\partial x};$   $M = EI \frac{\partial^2 u}{\partial x^2}$ 

Substituting these expressions in the equation of vertical force equilibrium:

$$\frac{\partial^2 M}{\partial x^2} + m \frac{\partial^2 u}{\partial t^2} = 0$$
  
or  $\frac{\partial^2}{\partial x^2} \left( EI \frac{\partial^2 u}{\partial x^2} \right) + m \frac{\partial^2 u}{\partial t^2} = 0$   
or  $u^{iv} + \frac{m}{EI} \ddot{u} = 0$ 

$$u^{\mathrm{iv}} = \frac{\partial^4 u}{\partial x^4}; \qquad \ddot{u} = \frac{\partial^2 u}{\partial t^2}$$

where V = shear force in beam M = bending moment in beam m = mass per unit length of beamu = time-dependent transverse deflection of beam

This is the general equation of motion of the beam, where u is a function of time as well as distance x. By separating the variables one could use the following solution of the equation:

 $u(x,t) = \phi(x)y(t)$ 

This assumption in physical terms means that the beam will have a defined constant flexural shape  $\phi(x)$  and the amplitude of this shape varies with time according to the function y(t). The function  $\phi(x)$  is called the mode shape.

Substituting the above expression in the general equation of motion of the beam:

$$\phi^{\text{iv}}(x)y(t) + \frac{m}{EI}\phi(x)\ddot{y}(t) = 0$$

where  $\phi^{iv}(x)$  means fourth-order differentiation with respect to x and  $\ddot{y}(t)$  means second-order differentiation with respect to t. Dividing both sides of the equation by  $\phi(x)y(t)$  we get:

$$\frac{\phi^{\text{IV}}(x)}{\phi(x)} + \frac{m\ddot{y}(t)}{EIy(t)} = 0$$

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x and t are independent variables. The first term in the equation is a function of x only, whereas the second term is a function of t only. Therefore each part of the equation must be a constant with the same magnitude but of opposite sign to satisfy this equation for all arbitrary values of x and t.

Assume that  $a^4 = \omega^2 m/EI$  is the magnitude of the constant which will satisfy the equations.

$$\therefore \phi^{iv}(x) - a^4 \phi(x) = 0$$
 and  $\ddot{y}(t) + \omega^2 y(t) = 0$ 

Solution of the second equation is the free vibration response of an SDOF system:


$$y(t) = \frac{y_0}{\omega_n} \sin \omega_n t + y_0 \cos \omega_n t$$


A solution of the first equation is of the form given by  $\phi(x) = C e^{sx}$ . This when substituted in the first differential equation results in  $(s^4 - a^4)Ce^{sx} = 0$ , from which it can be derived that  $s = \pm a, \pm ia$ .


$$\therefore \quad \phi(x) = C_1 e^{iax} + C_2 e^{-iax} + C_3 e^{ax} + C_4 e^{-ax}$$
  
or 
$$\phi(x) = A_1 \sin ax + A_2 \cos ax + A_3 \sinh ax + A_4 \cosh ax$$

 $A_1$ ,  $A_2$ ,  $A_3$  and  $A_4$  can be determined from the beam boundary conditions.

At x = 0,  $\phi(x)_0 = 0$  and  $\phi(x)_0^{ii} = 0$  because M = 0At x = l,  $\phi(x)_l = 0$  and  $\phi(x)_l^{ii} = 0$  because M = 0







SK 2/41 Modes of vibration of a simply supported beam.

Substituting these conditions in the general equation of mode shape it is observed:

$$A_2 = A_4 = A_3 = 0$$
 and  $\phi(x)_1 = A_1 \sin a l = 0$ 

This gives  $\sin al = 0$ , or  $al = n\pi$  for n = 0, 1, 2, 3, 4, etc. which gives the following:

$$a = \frac{n\pi}{l}$$
$$\omega_{n} = n^{2}\pi^{2}\sqrt{\frac{EI}{ml^{4}}}$$
$$\phi(x) = A_{1}\sin\frac{n\pi}{l}x$$

# 2.7.6 Response of SDOF systems to a very short impulse

When the time of duration  $t_d$  of the impulse is very small compared to the natural period of vibration  $T_n$  of the system, the initial displacement  $u_0$  in the response equation of free vibration may be taken as equal to zero and the initial velocity  $\dot{u}_0$  may be given by the theorem of conservation of momentum as follows:

$$m\dot{u}_0 = \int F dt$$
 or  $\dot{u}_0 = \frac{\int F dt}{m}$ 

Consider free vibration after this very short impulse, and the equation of response may be written as:

$$u \approx \frac{\int F dt}{m\omega_{\rm n}} \sin \omega_{\rm n} t$$

F = magnitude of the impulsive force


# 2.7.7 Response of SDOF systems to any arbitrary time-dependent loading


The arbitrary time-dependent loading may be approximated as a series of very short impulses of magnitude  $F(\tau) d\tau$  occurring at elapsed time  $\tau$ . This is illustrated in SK 2/42.

Assume that the total time elapsed is t, the time elapsed after the impulse is t' and the elapsed time when the impulse occurred is  $\tau$ .

$$t = t' + \tau$$

The individual responses due to the very short impulses can be summed up to give the total response. From the previous section on





very short impulsive loads it can be said:

$$du = \frac{F(\tau)}{m\omega_{\rm n}} \sin \omega_{\rm n} t' \, d\tau = \frac{F(\tau)}{m\omega_{\rm n}} \sin \omega_{\rm n} (t-\tau) \, d\tau$$

$$u = \int_0^t \frac{F(\tau)}{m\omega_n} \sin \omega_n (t-\tau) d\tau$$

Following the same argument, the total response of a damped SDOF system due to any time-dependent arbitrary loading will be given by:

$$u = \int_0^t \frac{F(\tau)}{m\omega_{\rm D}} e^{-\xi\omega_{\rm n}(t-\tau)} \sin \omega_{\rm D}(t-\tau) d\tau$$

#### 2.7.8 Seismic response of a damped SDOF system

The very short impulsive loads  $F(\tau)/m$  could be the equivalent seismic accelerations from the acceleration time-history of an earthquake given by the expression  $\ddot{u}_g(\tau)$ . Assuming  $\omega_D = \omega_n$ , the response equation due to seismic excitation may be written as:

$$u = \frac{1}{\omega_n} \int_0^t \ddot{u}_g(\tau) e^{-\xi \omega_n(t-\tau)} \sin \omega_n(t-\tau) d\tau$$

This is the earthquake displacement equation of a damped single degree of freedom system. The effective acceleration on the mass m of the structure is  $\omega_n^2 u$  and the effective earthquake base shear is given by  $m\omega_n^2 u$ .

#### 2.7.9 Response spectra

The spectral velocity function is  $\omega_n u$  and may be expressed as:


$$V = \int_0^t \ddot{u}_{g}(\tau) e^{-\xi \omega_{n}(t-\tau)} \sin \omega_{n}(t-\tau) d\tau$$

The maximum value of this velocity response for a given damping coefficient and a given natural frequency of a single degree of freedom system can be computed from a given earthquake acceleration time-history, and this is called the pseudo-spectral velocity  $S_V$  given by:

$$S_{\rm V} = \left\{ \int_0^t \ddot{u}_{\rm g}(\tau) \, e^{-\xi \omega_{\rm n}(t-\tau)} \sin \omega_{\rm n}(t-\tau) \, d\tau \right\}_{\rm max}$$

A curve can be drawn for  $S_V$  against a series of SDOF systems with varying  $\omega_n$  and fixed damping coefficient  $\xi$ . A series of these curves can also be drawn with different damping coefficients. These curves are called the response spectra for pseudo velocity.

DAMPING VALUES (S): 0.5%, 2%, 5%, 7%, 10%



SK 2/43 Typical response spectra for pseudo velocity, displacement and acceleration.

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Similarly response spectra curves can be drawn for the following:

Spectral displacement  $S_{\rm D} = S_{\rm V}/\omega_{\rm n}$ 

Spectral acceleration  $S_A = \omega_n S_V$ 

From the spectral acceleration response spectra one could calculate the maximum effective base shear by multiplying the mass of the system by the appropriate acceleration from the spectra corresponding to the natural frequency of the system and an appropriate value of the damping coefficient.

Maximum horizontal base shear  $H_{max} = MS_A$ 

where M = mass of system


The response spectra found from a given ground motion time-history will show large local peaks due to resonance, and for practical applications these peaks are broadened out.

### 2.8 ANALYSIS OF PLATES

#### 2.8.1 Elastic analysis of plates

Assume that the load acting on the plate is normal to the surface of the plate, and the deflection of the plate due to the applied loading is small compared to the thickness of the plate. There is no in-plane loading on the plate and the plate is not restrained in the in-plane direction. Assume that during bending the middle plane of the plate has no strain.

The plane xy lies in the middle plane of the plate and the axis z is in the perpendicular out-of-plane direction. An element of the plate of sides dx and dy, cut out from the plate by two pairs of planes parallel to planes xz and yz, is shown in SK 2/44.



SK 2/44 Internal loads in a plate at the middle plane.

Assume that q is the loading per unit area on the plate and q dx dy is the loading on the plate element of sides dx and dy.  $M_x$  is the bending moment per unit length acting on the edges of the plate element parallel to the y-axis and  $M_y$  is the bending moment per unit length acting on the edges parallel to the x-axis.  $M_{xy}$  and  $M_{yx}$  are the torsional moment per unit length on the edges of the plate element parallel to the y-axis and x-axis respectively. The out-of-plane shear forces  $V_x$  and  $V_y$  per unit length of the plate element correspond to bending moments  $M_x$  and  $M_y$  respectively.

Considering the force diagram in SK 2/44 the vertical force balance gives:

$$\frac{\partial V_{x}}{\partial x} dx dy + \frac{\partial V_{y}}{\partial y} dy dx + q dx dy = 0$$
$$\frac{\partial V_{x}}{\partial x} + \frac{\partial V_{y}}{\partial y} + q = 0$$

Taking moments about the x-axis gives:

$$\frac{\partial M_{xy}}{\partial x} dx dy - \frac{\partial M_y}{\partial y} dy dx + V_y dx dy = 0$$
$$\frac{\partial M_{xy}}{\partial x} - \frac{\partial M_y}{\partial y} + V_y = 0$$
milarly,
$$\frac{\partial M_{yx}}{\partial y} + \frac{\partial M_x}{\partial x} - V_x = 0$$
bserving that  $M_{yx} = -M_{xy}$  and eliminal

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ting  $V_x$  and  $V_y$  from the Ob equations gives:

$$\frac{\partial^2 M_x}{\partial x^2} + \frac{\partial^2 M_y}{\partial y^2} - 2 \frac{\partial^2 M_{xy}}{\partial x \partial y} = -q$$

From pure bending of plates it is known that:

$$M_{x} = -D\left(\frac{\partial^{2}w}{\partial x^{2}} + \nu \frac{\partial^{2}w}{\partial y^{2}}\right)$$
$$M_{y} = -D\left(\frac{\partial^{2}w}{\partial y^{2}} + \nu \frac{\partial^{2}w}{\partial x^{2}}\right)$$

$$M_{xy} = -M_{yx} = D(1-\nu) \frac{\partial^2 w}{\partial x \, \partial y}$$

$$D = \frac{Eh^3}{12(1-\nu^2)}$$

where

D = flexural rigidity of plate

- h = thickness of plate
- w = deflection of plate in the out-of-plane direction  $\nu =$  Poisson's ratio for material of plate

$$\frac{\partial^4 w}{\partial x^4} + 2 \frac{\partial^4 w}{\partial x^2 \partial y^2} + \frac{\partial^4 w}{\partial y^4} = \frac{q}{D}$$

The shearing forces in the plate are expressed as:

$$V_{x} = \frac{\partial M_{yx}}{\partial y} + \frac{\partial M_{x}}{\partial x} = -D \frac{\partial}{\partial x} \left( \frac{\partial w}{\partial x^{2}} + \frac{\partial^{2} w}{\partial y^{2}} \right)$$
$$V_{y} = \frac{\partial M_{y}}{\partial y} - \frac{\partial M_{xy}}{\partial x} = -D \frac{\partial}{\partial y} \left( \frac{\partial^{2} w}{\partial x^{2}} + \frac{\partial^{2} w}{\partial y^{2}} \right)$$


These are the classical differential equations for any plate with small deflections. The solution will depend on the loading and boundary conditions. Solutions for several loading and boundary conditions of different geometric shapes of plates are available in *Theory of Plates and Shells*, second edition, by Timoshenko and Woinowsky-Kreiger, published by McGraw-Hill Book Company, 1959.


#### 2.8.2 Yield-line analysis of plates

In the ultimate limit state design of two-way elements it is not necessary to define the stress distribution in the element. Instead, assume plastic hinges in the regions of highest stresses. The yield-line method assumes that at the point of maximum moments plastic hinges will form and yielding will take place until the full plastic moment capacity is developed along the length of a yield line. Several yield lines will form in a plate until failure takes place by loss of flexural rigidity. Yield lines are idealised plastic moment formation lines in a two-way element. The idealised yield-line patterns in two-way elements are given in SK 2/45.

Plates are divided into segments along assumed yield lines. Yield lines must be straight lines forming axes of rotation of these segments. It has been shown by experiments that the use of idealised yield lines as shown in SK 2/45 results in a slight error on the side of conservatism.


The corner sections of two-way elements are stiffer in comparison to the internal parts of the elements. In order to model this additional stiffness, which will result in less rotation along the idealised yield






lines, it is recommended that the plastic moment of resistance is reduced to  $\frac{2}{3}M_{\rm P}$  over the corner region according to the diagrams in SK 2/46.

The ultimate resistance of a plate subjected to a uniformly distributed load is defined as the load per unit area that will cause





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failure along the idealised yield lines. The method of equilibrium may be used to determine the ultimate resistance. The equilibrium method requires shear forces on both sides of the yield lines to be equal and opposite. For simplicity, this method only checks the equilibrium of moments along a set of positive yield lines, assuming that shear force is zero along a positive yield line. Sagging moments are positive and hogging moments are negative. The ultimate moment of resistance may also be determined by the theory of virtual work, which requires a complex differentiation to find the minimum value of unit resistance.

The method of equilibrium involves the determination, for a segment, of the sum of the resisting moments along the yield lines and equating this sum to the moment of the external loading on the segment about the axis of rotation of the segment that is the support of the segment. This is expressed in mathematical terms as follows:

$$\sum M_{\rm P}l = r_{\rm u}Ac$$

or 
$$r_{\rm u} = \frac{\sum M_{\rm P} l}{Ac}$$

where  $M_P$  = ultimate plastic moment capacity of the plate section per unit length (Nm/m)

- l =length of a side of segment or projected length of a side of a segment over which  $M_P$  is acting to resist the rotation due to the applied loading
- $r_{\rm u} =$  ultimate resistance in N/m<sup>2</sup>
- A =area of the segment bordered by the yield lines (m<sup>2</sup>)
- c = centroid of the area A (loaded by  $r_u$ ) from the line of rotation of the segment.

Consider the two-way plate element shown in SK 2/46. L and H are the dimensions of the plate. Locations of the yield lines are denoted by x and y. For symmetrical yield lines x is assumed equal to L/2. The only unknown parameter in the analysis is the dimension y. The segments are marked 1 and 2. The free body diagrams of the segments show the actions of  $M_P$  resisting the rotation about the segment support. Consider the free body diagram of segment 1:

$$\sum M_{\rm P}l = 2\left[\frac{2}{3}M_{\rm P}\left(\frac{L}{4} + \frac{L}{4}\right) + M_{\rm P}\left(\frac{L}{2}\right)\right] = \frac{5}{3}M_{\rm P}L$$

Assuming projected lengths for the inclined sides of the triangular segment:

$$c_{1} = \frac{y}{3}; \qquad A_{1} = \frac{Ly}{2}$$
$$r_{u}A_{1}c_{1} = \sum M_{P}l = \frac{5}{3}M_{P}L$$
$$\therefore \quad r_{u} = 10\frac{M_{P}}{y^{2}}$$

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Similarly, for segment 2 the moment balance will give:

$$\sum M_{\rm P}l = 2\left[\frac{2}{3}M_{\rm P}\left(\frac{y}{2}\right) + M_{\rm P}\left(H - \frac{y}{2}\right)\right] = 2M_{\rm P}\left(H - \frac{y}{6}\right)$$

$$c_2 = \frac{L(3H - 2y)}{6(2H - y)}; \qquad A_2 = \frac{L(2H - y)}{4}$$

$$A_2c_2 = \frac{L^2(3H - 2y)}{24}$$

$$\therefore \quad r_{\rm u} = \frac{8M_{\rm P}(6H - y)}{L^2(3H - 2y)}$$

To find y equate the two expressions for  $r_u$ :

 $\frac{10M_{\rm P}}{y^2} = \frac{8M_{\rm P}(6H-y)}{L^2(3H-2y)}$ 

Having found y from the above equation  $r_u$  can be found.

### 2.9 METHODS OF PLASTIC ANALYSIS


#### 2.9.1 Definition of plastic behaviour


The stress-strain relationship of mild steel in pure tension shows considerable ductility. Ductility is defined as the ultimate strain divided by the strain at yield. This property is generally found for all grades of carbon steel in tension and compression.

If the strain goes beyond yield at every fibre of a critical section in a loaded element made of structural steel, the section becomes fully plastic. Its internal resistance at that critical section becomes constant at the level of full plasticity. The strain can increase beyond this fully yielded strain to a maximum ultimate strain based on the available ductility. Externally applied loads on the element will work against this constant internal resistance to produce permanent deformation in the structure. Plastic strain is defined as the residual strain after all loads have been removed.

#### 2.9.2 Plastic behaviour of a section of a beam in pure bending

Consider a beam with symmetrical section in pure bending. The tensile and compressive extreme fibre stresses in the critical section of the beam increase with the increase in loading. When the yield stress  $f_y$  is reached in the extreme fibres, the stress does not go beyond yield but remains constant. The strains in the extreme fibres can go beyond yield strain. With the increase in load beyond the first onset of yield in the extreme fibres, progressively from the outer fibres more and more fibres closer to the neutral axis go beyond yield strain. At some point in the incremental loading a resistance moment is reached in the section and all of the material in the section goes beyond yield strain. A plastic hinge forms in the section and an ultimate maximum plastic moment of resistance is offered by the section at that point.





Consider a rectangular section of width b and depth d. Assume that all the tensile and compressive fibres in the section have gone beyond yield strain. The stress blocks will be two rectangles on either side of the neutral axis as shown in SK 2/47. The tensile force T and the compressive force C of the stress blocks are given by:

$$T = C = \frac{1}{2} db f_{\rm y}$$

b = width of rectangular section d = depth of rectangular section T = tensile internal force in section C = compressive internal force in section  $f_y =$  yield stress of material

The lever arm between T and C is d/2.


$$\therefore \quad M_{\rm P} = T \frac{d}{2} = \left(\frac{bd^2}{4}\right) f_{\rm y} = S f_{\rm y}$$

 $M_{\rm P}$  = plastic moment of resistance of section S = plastic modulus of section

The ratio of the plastic moment of resistance to the elastic moment of resistance is called the shape factor. The shape factor of two flanges only is 1, and the shape factor of a universal beam is about 1.15. The design strength  $p_y$  should be used in the determination of  $M_P$  where the thickness exceeds 16mm. The design strength is obtained from Table 6 of BS 5950: Part 1.

# 2.9.3 Plastic behaviour of a section of a beam with bending and axial load

Axial compressive load on a section along with bending has the effect of shifting the neutral axis towards the tension zone. The tensile stress block becomes smaller, signifying a reduction in the plastic moment capacity of the section.



SK 2/48 Stress blocks in a section with bending and axial load.

The effect of compressive load is shown in SK 2/48. Assume that the tensile stress block is shifted by a distance *a* from the neutral axis and *A* is the total area of the section.

Axial load resistance =  $2atf_y$ 

Axial capacity of section =  $Af_{y}$ 

$$n = \frac{\text{Load}}{\text{Capacity}} = \frac{2at}{A}$$

The revised moment capacity of the section is the full section pure bending plastic moment of resistance  $M_P$  less the moment capacity lost due to the axial load stress block at the centre of the section. The revised moment capacity is given by:

$$M'_{\rm P} = M_{\rm P} - taf_{\rm y}a = M_{\rm P} - t\frac{n^2A^2}{4t^2}f_{\rm y} = \left(S - \frac{n^2A^2}{4t}\right)f_{\rm y}$$

The ratio n is obtained from the applied compressive load. The design strength  $p_y$  should be used in place of  $f_y$  where the thickness exceeds 16 mm.

# 2.9.4 Plastic behaviour of a section of a beam with bending and shear

Longitudinal fibre stresses due to bending moment when combined with shear stresses will give rise to a yield criterion which will take place before the longitudinal bending stresses reach yield. This is the Von Mises yield criterion and is given by:

$$f_{y}^{2} = f_{m}^{2} + 3f_{v}^{2}$$

where  $f_m =$ longitudinal fibre stress due to bending moment  $f_v =$  shear stress due to applied shear force V

In an I-section one could assume that the flanges are allowed to go up to yield stress  $f_y$ , but the web carries all the shear force and hence the bending stress in the web is limited to  $f_m$ . If the plastic moment of resistance of the web only is  $M_{pw}$ , then the revised plastic moment of resistance of the section with shear is M' given by:

$$M' = M_{\rm P} - \left(\frac{f_{\rm y} - f_{\rm m}}{f_{\rm y}}\right) M_{\rm pw}$$

where  $f_v = V/t_w d_w$  and  $f_m = \sqrt{(f_y^2 - 3f_v^2)}$   $M_{pw} =$  plastic moment of resistance of web only  $t_w =$  thickness of web  $d_w =$  depth of web

The reduced value of longitudinal fibre stress should be used to find a further reduction of plastic moment capacity if an axial compressive load is also present. Assuming that the axial load carrying capacity of the web only is not exceeded, the following relationship of axial load N can be written:

$$2a = \frac{N}{f_{\rm m} t_{\rm w}}$$

where a is the distance on either side of the central axis of the section over which the axial load is resisted. As in the case of bending and axial load, the plastic moment of resistance is further reduced to:

$$M' = M_{\rm P} - \left(\frac{f_{\rm y} - f_{\rm m}}{f_{\rm y}}\right) M_{\rm pw} - t_{\rm w} a^2 f_{\rm m}$$


The design strength  $p_y$  should be used in place of  $f_y$  where the thickness exceeds 16 mm.

#### 2.9.5 Load combinations in plastic analysis

The method of superposition cannot be used for structures where yielding has taken place because structural stiffness changes with yielding. Effects of different loads cannot be added together after any part of the structure has strained beyond the yield limit. The behaviour of the structure beyond this point becomes non-linear. Nonlinear analysis requires the application of loads in increments till failure is reached by turning the structure into a mechanism.

#### 2.9.6 Plastic analysis of structures

Plastic analysis of indeterminate structures should be carried out using the incremental load method. This is possible only when the ultimate plastic moment resistance is known for all parts of the structure. Before commencement of the analysis section properties must be available. The difficulty arises in the determination of ultimate moments which cause plastic hinges to appear in the critical parts of the structure. The ultimate moments are dependent on several factors, such as coacting shear and direct load and elastic instability.



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
SK 2/49 Plastic analysis of a portal frame.

Consider a simple single span portal frame as shown in SK 2/49. The frame is subjected to a uniformly distributed load as shown. The plastic hinge at the centre of the beam (1) is governed by the plastic moment capacity of the section. The plastic hinge at the beam/ column interface on the beam (2) is governed by the reduced plastic moment capacity of the section due to the presence of shear. The hinge on the column at the beam/column junction is governed by a reduced plastic moment capacity due to the combined bending moment, shear and direct load. The same is true for the hinge at 4. In a single span fixed-base portal frame the degree of redundancy is 3, and it requires four plastic hinges to form before the structure reduces to a mechanism. The analysis becomes iterative and time consuming because the value of the ultimate plastic moment changes with shear and direct load. Further complication arises if biaxial bending with torsion is present. The elastic analysis with factored loads does not take into account the redistribution of loads due to rotation of plastic hinges, and as such may be regarded as conscrvative. But non-linear plastic analysis with load-dependent plastic hinges can be very complicated and is not normally carried out.

Total factored and combined basic loads for an ultimate load scenario should be determined before the commencement of the plastic analysis. This combined loading should then be applied to the indeterminate structure fractionally and incrementally. At any stage of the incremental loading, if a plastic hinge appears in the structure, the structural configuration should be changed to incorporate the hinge and the additional incremental loading applied on the new structure with the hinge. At all remaining elastic parts of the structure the stresses due to incremental loading on the new structure should be additive. This process should continue till all the loads are used up or the structure turns into a mechanism due to the formation of several hinges.

The method of incremental loading is illustrated by the simple problem of a fixed-end beam with uniformly distributed load.

The fixed-end beam of span length l is subjected to a uniformly distributed load. The plastic moment of resistance of the beam section

is  $M_P$ . With incremental loading, when the loading becomes equal to  $w_1$  per unit length then the plastic hinges at 1 and 2 form.

$$M_{\rm P} = \frac{w_1 l^2}{12}$$

The beam now behaves as simply supported till the hinge at 3 is formed due to further incremental loading. Then the system, with three hinges, turns into a mechanism. The incremental loading required to form the third hinge is  $w_2$ .

$$\therefore \quad \frac{w_1 l^2}{24} + \frac{w_2 l^2}{8} = M_P = \frac{w_1 l^2}{12}$$
$$\therefore \quad w_2 = \frac{w_1}{3}$$

w is the total ultimate uniformly distributed load on the span given by:

$$w = w_1 + w_2 = \frac{4}{3} w_1$$
$$w_1 = \frac{3}{4} w$$
$$M_P = \frac{wl^2}{16}$$

Note: This analysis ignores the effect of shear on the plastic moment of resistance of the beam section.

# Chapter 3 Analysis of Structures: Worked Examples

# 3.1 EXAMPLE 3.1: ROOF TRUSS

Design a truss to be used in a pitched roof for an industrial building. The span of the truss is 15 metres and the height of the building at the eaves is 7.5 metres.

#### 3.1.1 Type of truss

## Step 1 Select appropriate truss type The table below is useful for the selection of the type of truss suitable for the intended span.

For a 15 metre span select a Fink truss with a height-to-apex of 3 metres. Assume a truss spacing equal to 4 metres.

Step 2 Determine the geometry of the truss Length of rafter =  $\sqrt{(7.5^2 + 3^2)} = 8.078$  m Distance between nodes on rafter =  $8.078 \div 4 = 2.019$  m Angle of inclination of rafter to horizontal =  $\tan^{-1} \frac{3}{7.5} = 21.80^{\circ}$





#### SK 3/3 Analysis of truss by method of section.

Consider the basic wind load case 1. At the support at joint 9, as shown in SK 3/3, the truss is restrained vertically but is allowed to slide horizontally. Therefore the horizontal reaction at joint 9 is zero.

Taking moments about joint 1 of all the external forces on the truss we equate to zero the following expression for equilibrium:

$$(R_9 \times 15) - (4.509 \times 2.02) - [2.109 \times (4.04 + 6.06)] - (1.054 \times 8.08) - (1.559 \times 15 \cos \alpha) - [3.119 \times (15 \cos \alpha - 2.02)] - [3.119 \times (15 \cos \alpha - 4.04)] - [4.258 \times (15 \cos \alpha - 6.06)] - [2.699 \times (15 \cos \alpha - 8.08)] = 0$$

This gives  $R_9 = 11.86 \text{ kN}$ 

Net vertical component of wind load =

The member numbers and the joint numbers are shown in SK 3/3. The internal force in any member is designated as  $S_i$ , where *i* is the member number of interest. When the internal force in a member

acts towards a joint, the member is in compression; when it acts away from the joint, the member is in tension.

Consider the equilibrium of joint 9. Resolving and equating to zero all the internal and external forces about the vertical and the horizontal axes for equilibrium we get:

 $-S_8 \cos \alpha + S_{13} + 1.559 \sin \alpha = 0$ 

 $S_8 \sin \alpha + 1.559 \cos \alpha - 11.86 = 0$ 

From these two equations we get:

$$S_{0} = 28.04 \,\mathrm{kN}$$
 (tensile) and  $S_{13} = 25.45 \,\mathrm{kN}$  (compressive)

Similarly, considering the equilibrium of joint 8 we can conclude:

$$S_{21} = 3.12 \text{ kN}$$
 (tensile) and  $S_7 = 28.04 \text{ kN}$  (tensile)

Consider the equilibrium of joint 15. Resolving vertically and horizontally we get:

$$-S_{22} \sin 2\alpha + S_{21} \cos \alpha = 0$$
  

$$\therefore S_{22} = \frac{3.12 \cos \alpha}{\sin 2\alpha} = 4.2 \text{ kN (compressive)}$$
  

$$S_{12} - S_{13} + S_{21} \sin \alpha + S_{22} \cos 2\alpha = 0$$
  

$$\therefore S_{12} = 25.45 - 3.12 \sin \alpha - 4.2 \cos 2\alpha = 21.25 \text{ kN (compressive)}$$

We cannot progress beyond this joint using the method of joints. Take a section x-x as shown in SK 3/3. The right-hand side of section x-x must be in equilibrium with the applied forces at joints 6, 7, 8, and 9 and the member internal forces of members 5, 27 and 11 designated by  $S_5$ ,  $S_{27}$  and  $S_{11}$ .

Taking moments about joint 5 of all forces on the right of section x-x and equating to zero for equilibrium:



-  $(1.559 \times 8.08) + (11.86 \times 7.5) = 0$ 



The rest of the joints can now be solved for by the method of equilibrium of joints.

# 3.1.4 Method of section using Maxwell diagram

Consider another basic load case, namely imposed load. The polygon of forces, funicular polygon and Maxwell diagram are shown in SK 3/4. We will now use a step-by-step method of drawing the Maxwell diagram, the force polygon and the funicular polygon by the method of section.





Step 1 Draw the truss to scale. Choose any scale large enough to get an adequate directional parameter for all members.

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- Step 2 Draw on the nodes of the truss the known directions of all applied forces, including the reactions. If the direction of any reaction is not known to start with, it will become known at the end of the analysis. The direction of the reaction at the support with rollers is to be taken as vertical.
- Step 3 Number or annotate alphabetically all the spaces between the loads, including the reactions, as shown in SK 3/4. The loads are designated vectorially by adjacent spaces. For example, the load on the apex of the truss shown in SK 3/4 is vertical and can be represented by a vertical vector  $\overline{6-7}$  in the force polygon corresponding to the numbers of the two adjacent spaces on either side of the load.
- Step 4 Number or annotate alphabetically each triangular space inside the truss as shown in SK 3/4. The internal forces in the members of the truss are vectorially represented by the two adjacent spaces on either side of the member. For example, the internal force in the central tie member of the truss in SK 3/4 is represented by a vector 1-18 in the Maxwell diagram.
- Step 5 Draw the polygon of forces. Choose any scale large enough for the forces to be properly represented in magnitude and direction, and for unknown forces to be accurately scaled off from the Maxwell diagram. Start the polygon of forces with vector  $\overline{2-3}$  in a direction vertically downwards from point 2 to point 3 representing the first applied load on the truss from the left-hand end. The distance from 2 to 3 in the force polygon is a representation of the magnitude of the force, using a convenient scale of forces (e.g.  $x \, kN = 1 \, mm$ ).
- Step 6 Choose a pole 0 anywhere close to the polygon of forces and draw the rays from the pole to the ends of the vectorial representation of individual applied forces as shown in SK 3/4.
- Step 7 Draw the funicular polygon under the truss by extending the lines of action of the applied forces. Start at the support which is restrained horizontally and vertically. Draw lines between the lines of action of forces under the truss in a systematic order parallel to rays in the polygon of forces where rays must correspond to spaces between the loads. For example, the first line of the funicular polygon under the truss in SK 3/4 is parallel to ray 0–3 of the force polygon because it corresponds to the space 3 between the loads in the diagram of the truss above. The next line parallel to ray 0–4 starts from the point where the first line parallel to ray 0–3 meets the line of action of the load  $\overline{3-4}$ . Following this principle complete the funicular polygon up to the last space between load direction lines. Close the funicular polygon by joining the last two points on the load lines.

Step 8 In the polygon of forces draw a line vertically from the last point after vectorial representation of all applied forces, to represent the direction of the reaction at the support with rollers. Draw a line from the pole 0 parallel to the closing line of the funicular polygon. These two lines meet at a point which gives the magnitude and direction of the vertical reaction at the support with rollers. The reaction at the other support is represented in magnitude and direction by the joining line between this point and the starting point of the polygon of forces.

In SK 3/4, the ray 0-1 in the force polygon is parallel to the closing line of the funicular polygon under the truss. The reaction at the roller support is represented in magnitude and direction by the vector  $\overline{11-1}$  in the polygon of forces. The vector  $\overline{1-2}$  represents the other reaction at the fully restrained end of the truss.

Step 9 Take a section x-x through the truss as shown in SK 3/4. Remove the right-hand portion of truss beyond section x-x. Assume that a fictitious member replaces the two members 7-17 and 17-18 of the truss. This fictitious member must act at the apex of the remaining left-hand portion of the truss for equilibrium. The left-hand portion of the truss is maintained in equilibrium by the load from the fictitious member, the load in tie member 1-18 and the reaction force 11–1, for which the direction and magnitude are known but the point of action is unknown. These three forces must meet at a point for equilibrium, which means that the line of action of the vertical reaction will be shifted from the position of the right-hand support. The magnitude and direction of the reaction will remain unchanged because the loading on the truss has not changed. Therefore, ray 0-1in the polygon of forces will remain unchanged and hence the direction of the closing line in the funicular polygon under the truss must remain unchanged. Since there are no other forces in the system beyond space 7 in the truss diagram, the ray parallel to 0-7 must be projected to meet the original closing line of the funicular polygon to meet at a point r'. This point must lie on the line of action of the shifted vertical reaction of the right-hand support. Draw a vertical line from this point r' to meet the line of action of member 1–18 at r. For equilibrium, the fictitious member of the truss must have its line of action passing through this point. The line from r to the apex of the truss gives the direction of the fictitious member.

Step 10 Draw the Maxwell diagram by drawing a line parallel to the fictitious member from point 7 on the polygon of forces and another line parallel to member 1–18, starting from point 1. These two lines meet at point 18, defining vectorially the internal force in member 1–18 by vector 1–18. Similarly draw a line parallel to member 1–12 from point 1 and another line parallel to member 10–12 from point 1 and another line parallel to member 10–12 from point 10. These two lines meet at 12, giving vectorially the internal force in member 1–12. Solve the whole truss graphically by solving one space at a time.



## 3.2 EXAMPLE 3.2: CONTINUOUS BEAM

Use of the building is as residential units. Residential occupancy class is Type 2, as per Table 5 of BS 6399: Part 1.

Step 1 Determine structural concept

There are two basic structural solutions possible for the roof of the building shown in SK 3/5. First, the columns may be capped off at the underside of the main beams and the main beams may be made continuous over the columns. This will mean several splices in the beam capable of moment and shear transfer. From the point of view of ease of fabrication, splicing and buildability it will also be

necessary to keep the beam size unchanged over the whole length of the continuous beam. In this structural arrangement it may not be possible to take full advantage of the possible saving of material weight due to continuity of the beam. Second, the columns may be allowed to go up to the underside of the reinforced concrete roof slab, and the beams may be connected to the columns as simple supports. The sizes of the beams may follow the actual strength requirement depending on span and loading. Although this arrangement may be more economical and buildable, the continuous beam arrangement is adopted here to show the analytical procedure.

The main continuous beam is assumed built-in at the reinforced concrete shear wall, and the beam is simply supported on the columns. The columns carry vertical loads only and the lateral stability of the building is dependent on a system of shear walls. The vertical deformation of the columns is ignored. The secondary beams are simply supported on the main continuous beams. The reinforced concrete (RC) slab is supported by the secondary beams.








Hyperstatic reaction is due to the difference of moment at the two ends of a member in a structure and this reaction balances the difference of moment by an equal and opposite couple acting at a lever arm equal to the length of the member. Always draw the bending moment diagram on the tension side of the structure. The direction of the hyperstatic reaction at the two ends of a member follows the direction of slope of the line joining the bending moments at the two ends of the member. If this line is sloping downwards in a beam at one end, the hyperstatic reaction at that end of the beam is acting downwards on the beam. Similarly, if this line is sloping upwards, then the hyperstatic reaction is acting upwards at that end of the beam. This is only true if the bending moment diagram is drawn on the tension side.



The initial fixed-end moments at joint B are +661.8 and -1171.9. The unbalanced moment at the joint is (-1171.9 + 661.8) = -510.1 kNm. To balance the joint a total positive moment equal to 510.1 kNm is distributed at joint B in proportion to the relative stiffness determined by the distribution factors. 510.1 kNm multiplied by 0.53 gives +270.4. No moment gets carried over to the free end, and nothing gets carried over to joint B as -76 kNm. Similarly, half of +239.7 distributed at B gets carried over to C as +119.9. These carried over moments create a moment imbalance at the joint again, requiring further distribution. This process of carry-over and distribution is

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performed a few times till the distribution moments become small. When all the moments at either side of a joint are added up, it gives the joint moment. Compared to the three moment method, this method is approximate and hence there is a small difference in the final value of the moments obtained.

The fixed-end moments used above have been determined before in the method demonstrating the moment distribution. The sign convention must be followed very carefully. The unbalanced fixed-end moments are applied to the joints by the members, and the clockwise moments are taken as positive.



# 3.3 EXAMPLE 3.3: FRAME STRUCTURE

# 3.3.1 Analysis of a rigid frame by the method of moment distribution

A single span two-storey portal frame structure is chosen to demonstrate the method of moment distribution. SK 3/11 shows the

structure and the assumed loading. The loading is at serviceability limit state. The dead, imposed and wind loading are combined in one load case which is analysed.

Assume UB 610  $\times$  305  $\times$  149 kg/m for the first floor beam, and for all other members assume UB 457  $\times$  191  $\times$  82 kg/m.

### Step 1 Find distribution coefficients At first floor level:


 $k_{\text{beam}} = 124700 \div 1000 = 124.7; \quad k_{\text{columns}} = 37090 \div 500 = 74.2$ 

This gives the beam distribution factor equal to 0.458 and the column distribution factor equal to 0.271 top and bottom. At the roof level the beam distribution factor is 0.33 and the column distribution factor is 0.67.

Step 2 Find fixed-end moments

$$FEM_{\text{floor}} = \frac{30 \times 10^2}{12} = 250 \text{ kNm}$$
$$FEM_{\text{roof}} = \frac{10 \times 10^2}{12} = 83.3 \text{ kNm}$$

Step 4 Find the reactions at the props

The reactions at the props are the sum of the static reactions from applied horizontal loads assuming simple supports and the hyperstatic reactions found from the difference in end moments of the columns. The prop reactions  $P_5$  at joint 5 and  $P_6$  at joint 6 are determined as follows:

$$P_{5} = -\left[5 \text{ m} \times 5 \text{ kN/m} + \left(\frac{-78.69 - 87.55 + 90.72 + 29.73}{5} + \frac{+74.14 + 100.31 - 79.72 - 39.87}{5}\right)\right]$$

= -26.814 kN acting from right to left

 $= -10.858 \,\mathrm{kN}$  acting from right to left

The props will be removed one at a time. If the prop at joint 6 is removed, the frame will sway to the right between the first floor and roof level. This will give rise to fixed-end moments in columns 2–3 and 5–6 due to the relative displacement at the ends of the members. Similarly, if the prop at joint 5 is removed, keeping the prop at joint 6 in position, the frame will sway to the right at floor level only. This will give rise to fixed-end moments in columns 1–2, 2–3, 4–5 and 5–6. The amount of relative displacement required between floors is unknown but the forces required to cause these relative displacements must balance the propping reactions at joints 5 and 6.


Choose any small sway deflection  $\Delta$ . The choice of this small deflection is entirely arbitrary. The value of the fixed-end moments due to the assumed value of  $\Delta$  should be large enough to carry out the moment distribution successfully. Assume a relative sway between floors equal to 3.5 mm.

Fixed-end moment in the columns when  $\Delta = 3.5 \,\mathrm{mm}$  is given by:

$$FEM_{\text{columns}} = \frac{6\Delta EI}{l^2} = \frac{6 \times \frac{3.5}{1000} \times 210 \times 10^6 \times 29\,410 \times 10^{-8}}{5^2}$$
$$= 51.84 \,\text{kNm}$$

Carry out the moment distribution separately for the two cases: first when the prop is removed at joint 5 and then when the prop is removed at joint 6 (see SK 3/13 and SK 3/14).

When the prop is removed at joint 6, a horizontal force  $P_{1R}$  is applied at the roof level to produce the side sway. The value of this load  $P_{1R}$ , obtained after the moment distribution with a fictitious



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displacement, is given by:

$$P_{1R} = \frac{2 \times (20.11 + 30.34)}{5}$$

= +20.18 kN based on the column-end moments

This applied force at roof level also gives rise to a reaction  $P_{1F}$  at the prop at the floor level which is not removed.  $P_{1F}$  is given by:

$$P_{1\rm F} = -\frac{2 \times (20.11 + 30.34 + 9.36 + 4.68)}{5}$$

 $= -25.80 \,\mathrm{kN}$  based on the end moments

When the prop is removed at joint 5, a horizontal force  $P_{2F}$  is applied at the floor level to produce the side sway. The value of this load is obtained after the moment distribution with the prop at joint 5 removed, and is given by:

$$P_{2F} = \frac{2 \times (22.68 + 40.19 + 48.99 + 50.41)}{5}$$

= +64.91 kN based on the end moments

This applied force gives rise to a reaction  $P_{2R}$  at the prop at roof level which is given by:

$$P_{2R} = -\frac{2 \times (22.68 + 40.19)}{5} = -25.15 \,\text{kN}$$

Assume that  $k_1$  is a constant factor by which the force  $P_{1R}$  has to be multiplied to get an equal and opposite force to the reaction  $P_6$ . Similarly,  $k_2$  is the factor by which the force  $P_{2F}$  has to be multiplied to get an equal and opposite force to the reaction  $P_5$ . These loads also cause reactions at the unremoved props. The combined action of these loads in the proportion  $k_1$  and  $k_2$  at the roof and floor level respectively must equal the propping reactions.

 $P_{1R}k_1 + P_{2R}k_2 = 10.858$ 

 $P_{\rm 2F}k_2 + P_{\rm 1F}k_1 = 26.814$



#### 3.3.2 Analysis of a rigid frame by the matrix method



SK 3/15 The frame loading, deformation and compatibility diagrams.

For any indeterminate structure the degrees of freedom at the joints must be established before commencement of the analysis. In the frame illustrated in SK 3/15 the joints 2, 3, 5 and 6 can rotate and there are two degrees of freedom of side sway at the roof and at the floor level. The external force matrix should have these six components.

The statics matrix is composed as follows:  $P_1$ ,  $P_2$ ,  $P_3$  and  $P_4$  are the unbalanced fixed-end moments at joints 3, 6, 2 and 5, respectively, and  $P_5$  and  $P_6$  are the horizontal applied loads at the roof and floor level, respectively, resulting from the static reaction of loads on columns 1-2 and 2-3. In the absence of loads on these columns the loads  $P_5$  and  $P_6$  would be zero in the external force matrix.

From the calculation of fixed-end moments performed earlier for the moment distribution we can write the external force matrix as follows:

By equating the deformations at all the joints we get the compatibility of member deformations  $\theta$  and joint deformations X. The joint deformations are either rotational or translational, depending on the degrees of freedom. The sign convention of joint deformations  $\theta$  may be explained as follows. Joints 2 and 5 are connected by a horizontal member of high axial stiffness and as such it is assumed that the horizontal translation 2 to 2' is equal to 5 to 5', which is equal to  $X_6$ . Joints 1, 3, 4 and 6 are restrained horizontally. Owing to the rigid horizontal translation of the joints, the member ends should not rotate. To achieve this condition, member 1-2 at joint 1 must be rotated anticlockwise by  $\theta_5$  to coincide with the original state. Similarly, at joint 2' member 2–1 must be rotated anticlockwise by  $\theta_6$ .



# 3.4 EXAMPLE 3.4: ANALYSIS OF A HINGELESS ARCH

For the parabolic arch in SK 3/16 assume the following geometric parameters:

- $A_0$  = area of the arch cross-section at the crown of the arch =  $24.71 \times 10^{-3} \text{ m}^2$
- $I_0 =$  moment of inertia of the arch cross-section at the crown =  $750 \times 10^{-6} \text{ m}^4$



SK 3/16 Symmetrical parabolic hingeless arch with variable area and inertia.

A = area of the arch cross-section at any point on the arch rib where the inclination of the tangent to the horizontal is  $\phi$ , and I is the moment of inertia of the arch cross-section at the same point

$$A = \frac{A_0}{\cos \phi}; \quad I = \frac{I_0}{\cos^3 \phi}$$

The origin of the arch is assumed to be at the crown, where x and y' are zero. The equation of the centre-line of the parabolic arch is given by:

$$y = \frac{4fx^2}{l^2}$$

where f is the rise of the arch from the springing level and l is the span of the arch between supports. The span of the arch is 50 m and the rise is 6.25 m, giving a rise to span ratio of 1:8. The numerical integration method is used to find the internal forces in the arch rib subjected to a symmetrical loading of 300 kN at the centre of the arch and another loading case of a pair of loads at 5 m from the centre of the arch. As discussed in Chapter 2 in the section on arches, only half of the arch needs to be analysed because the shear vanishes at the crown due to symmetry. To use this analytical method, it should be remembered that only a pair of symmetrical loads can be analysed at a time. The central loading of 300 kN is split into two loads of 150 kN applied side by side.

The arch is divided into 10 segments. The centres of these segments are assumed to lie 2.5 m apart on the X-axis starting with the first segment at x = 1.25 m. The following expressions have been used to calculate the numbers given in Tables 3.4a, b and c:

For the central load of 300 kN  $M' = -150 \times x$  and  $N' = 150 \times \sin \phi$ . M' and N' are the bending moment and the direct thrust due to the applied load only.

This method of numerical integration can be used for any arch structure provided the energy-based formulae are derived for that particular type of arch. For the hingeless arch considered here, the results of the numerical integration are shown in Tables 3.4a, b and c.

The results of the analyses may be summarised as follows:

- For the central load of 300 kN on the arch the internal forces are available from Table 3.4b.
- The horizontal thrust at the crown =  $N_c = -(-565.45)$  kN = 565.4 kN.
- The bending moment at the crown =  $M_c = -(-699.26)$  kNm = 699.26 kNm.
- The bending moment at any point on the arch is given in Table 3.4b in the column headed M ( $M = M_c + N_c y + M'$ ).
- ( $M_s$  is the bending moment at the fixed support.)

Similarly, for the pair of 300 kN loads symmetrically spaced at 5.0 m about the centre of the arch, the results are given in Table 3.4c.

For a uniform rise of temperature of 1°C the internal forces in the arch will be determined as follows:

Coefficient of thermal expansion of steel =  $\alpha = 12 \times 10^{-6}/^{\circ}C$ 



# 3.5 EXAMPLE 3.5: YIELD-LINE ANALYSIS OF A RECTANGULAR PLATE

Consider a rectangular steel plate rigidly supported on three sides and free on one long side, as shown in SK 3/17.



SK 3/17 Two-way spanning rectangular steel plate.


#### Step 1 Determine loading and select trial thickness


Assume that the plate is a part of a decking system in a dockside structure. The imposed loading is  $20 \text{ kN/m^2}$ . Assume 12.5 mm plate as a first trial.

Self-weight of the plate =  $1 \text{ kN/m}^2$ 

Ultimate loading on the plate =  $(1.4 \times 1) + (1.6 \times 20) = 33.4 \text{ kN/m}^2$ Service loading on the plate =  $21 \text{ kN/m}^2$ 

Deflection should be limited to l/200 at service load. Stresses at service load must not go beyond yield.







Step 3 Determine plastic moment of resistance Thickness of plate = t = 12.5 mm

> Plastic moment of resistance of plate =  $M_P = \frac{t^2}{4} f_y = \frac{12.5^2}{4} \times 275$ = 10742 Nmm/mm

Step 4 Determine ultimate unit resistance of each sector

Sectors 1 and 2 are as shown in SK 3/18. The ultimate unit resistance  $= r_u$ . The summation of moments in each sector is equated to zero for equilibrium. From the free body diagrams of each sector, the sum of all positive moments and negative moments on the yield-lines must balance the moment of the applied ultimate load about the line of rotation of the sector.

Consider sector 1

$$\sum M = (1500 \times M_{\rm P}) + \left(2 \times \frac{2}{3} \times 750 \times M_{\rm P}\right) + (1500 \times M_{\rm P})$$




The ultimate resistance is greater than the ultimate load.

## 3.6 EXAMPLE 3.6: SEISMIC ANALYSIS OF A TALL CANTILEVER STRUCTURE

The structure chosen for this exercise is a tall chimney made of steel. The geometry of the structure including its deflected profile is shown in SK 3/19.

The mass per unit length and the moment of inertia of the crosssection of the chimney will be assumed to be constant over its whole length. The principles described here may equally be applied to





cantilever structures with variable mass per unit length and variable moment of inertia. These two variables are usually functions of x, which is the vertical axis of the co-ordinate system.

The chimney structure will be approximated to a single degree of freedom (SDOF) system by this method of analysis. Assume that the chimney is subjected to a ground motion  $v_g(t)$  and that there is a constant load N at the top of the structure. N is introduced in the analysis because the principles established may then be used for other structures (e.g. a water tank). The deflected shape has to be assumed as a function of x.

Assume that the shape function is  $\psi(x)$ . The amplitude of the motion is v(x, t), which is a function of both x and t, where t is the time in seconds. Assuming a generalised co-ordinate system Z(t), it can be said:

 $v(x,t) = \psi(x)Z(t)$ 

where the shape function  $\psi(x)$  is a dimensionless ratio of the local displacement to a reference displacement.

$$\psi(x) = \frac{v(x,t)}{Z(t)}$$

The energy principle, known as Hamilton's principle, is used to solve the problem of vibration. The kinetic energy is termed T and the potential energy is termed V. The kinetic energy of the chimney may be written as:

$$T = \frac{1}{2} \int_0^l m(x) [\dot{v}^{t}(x, t)]^2 dx$$


The strain energy of the chimney due to flexure may be expressed as:

$$V_{\rm f} = \frac{1}{2} \int_0^t EI(x) [v''(x,t)]^2 \, dx$$

The derivatives with respect to x are marked by primes and those with respect to time are marked by dots. For example:

$$v'' = \frac{d^2v}{dx^2}$$
 and  $\ddot{v} = \frac{d^2v}{dt^2}$ 

The vertical load N on top of the tower undergoes a vertical deflection equal to e(t), which is a function of time. The parameter e(t) may be determined as follows.



SK 3/20 The relationship between dv, dx and e(t).

Consider the diagram in SK 3/20:

$$e(t) = dv \tan\left(\frac{\phi}{2}\right) = \frac{1}{2} dv \tan\phi \text{ for small values of } \phi$$
$$= \frac{1}{2} dv \frac{dv}{dx} = \frac{1}{2} \left(\frac{dv}{dx}\right)^2 dx$$

The potential energy of the load N is therefore given by:

$$V_{\rm N} = -N \int_0^t e(t) = -\frac{N}{2} \int_0^t \left[ v'(x,t) \right]^2 dx$$

The potential energy of the load N is reduced by the deformation e(t) of the chimney, and therefore the negative sign is introduced.

There are no directly applied dynamic loads on the chimney. An earthquake produces a base motion. If damping is neglected in the analysis, then Hamilton's principle will take the form:

$$\int_{t_1}^{t_2} \partial(T - V) dt = 0$$
  
$$\therefore \quad \int_{t_1}^{t_2} \left[ \int_0^l m(x) \dot{v}^t(x, t) \partial \dot{v}^t dx - \int_0^l EI(x) v''(x, t) \partial v'' dx + N \int_0^l v'(x, t) \partial v' dx \right] dt = 0$$

where:

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$$\dot{v}^{t} = \dot{v}_{g} + \dot{v}; \quad v'' = \psi''Z; \quad v' = \psi'Z; \quad \dot{v} = \psi\dot{Z}$$
$$\partial \dot{v}^{t} = \partial \dot{v}; \quad \partial v'' = \psi''\partial Z; \quad \partial v' = \psi'\partial Z; \quad \partial \dot{v} = \psi\partial \dot{Z}$$

Substituting in Hamilton's equation:

$$\int_{t_1}^{t_2} \left[ \dot{Z} \,\partial \dot{Z} \,\int_0^l m(x)\psi^2 \,dx + \partial \dot{Z} \dot{v}_g(t) \,\int_0^l m(x)\psi \,dx \right]$$
$$- Z \,\partial Z \,\int_0^l EI(x)(\psi'')^2 \,dx + NZ \,\partial Z \,\int_0^l (\psi')^2 \,dx \,dt = 0$$

Integrating by parts this expression becomes:

$$\int_{t_1}^{t_2} \left[ m^* \ddot{Z} + k^* Z - k^*_G Z - p^*_{\text{eff}}(t) \right] \partial Z \, dt = 0$$

where:

$$m^* = \int_0^l m(x)\psi^2 dx = \text{the generalised mass}$$
$$k^* = \int_0^l EI(x)(\psi'')^2 dx = \text{the generalised stiffness}$$
$$k^*_G = N \int_0^l (\psi')^2 dx = \text{the generalised geometric stiffness}$$
$$p^*_{\text{eff}}(t) = -\ddot{v}_g \int_0^l m(x)\psi dx = \text{the generalised effective load}$$

Since  $\partial Z$  is arbitrary, the expression in brackets must be equal to zero.

$$m^*\ddot{Z} + k^*Z - p_{eff}^*(t) = 0$$
 where  $k^* = k^* - k_G^*$ 

This is the familiar equation of motion of an SDOF system.

For the chimney assume a shape function of vibration given by:

$$\psi(x) = 1 - \cos\frac{\pi x}{2l}$$

Also, mass per unit length is constant and equal to m. Therefore:

$$m^* = \int_0^l m(\psi)^2 \, dx = m \int_0^l \left(1 - \cos\frac{\pi x}{2l}\right)^2 \, dx = 0.228 m l$$
$$k^* = \int_0^l EI(\psi'')^2 \, dx = EI \int_0^l \left(\frac{\pi^2}{4l^2}\cos\frac{\pi x}{2l}\right)^2 \, dx = \frac{\pi^4}{32} \frac{EI}{l^3}$$

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$$p_{\text{eff}}^{*}(t) = \ddot{v}_{g}(t) \int_{0}^{t} m\psi \, dx = m\ddot{v}_{g}(t) \int_{0}^{t} \left(1 - \cos\frac{\pi x}{2l}\right) dx$$
$$= 0.364 m l\ddot{v}_{g}(t) - \Lambda \ddot{v}_{g}(t)$$
$$k_{G}^{*} = N \int_{0}^{t} (\psi')^{2} \, dx = N \int_{0}^{t} \left(\frac{\pi}{2l} \sin\frac{\pi x}{2l}\right)^{2} \, dx = \frac{N\pi^{2}}{8l}$$

At the critical buckling load  $N_{cr}$  this stiffness will become zero.

$$\therefore \quad \frac{N_{\rm cr}\pi^2}{8l} = \frac{\pi^4 EI}{32l^3} \quad \text{which gives} \quad N_{\rm cr} = \frac{\pi^2 EI}{4l^2}$$

The equation of motion can be written as:

For the chimney in SK 3/18 assume:

• Direct load  $N = 0 \,\mathrm{kN}$ 

• Constant mass per unit length =  $m = 2.0 \frac{\text{kN s}^2}{\text{m}}$  (per metre length)

- Constant moment of inertia of the chimney cross-section =  $I = 628 \times 10^{-4} \text{ m}^4$
- Young's modulus for steel =  $E = 200 \text{ kN/mm}^2$ Therefore:



The circular frequency of the chimney =  $\omega = \sqrt{\frac{\bar{k}^*}{m^*}}$ 

$$=\sqrt{\frac{305.9}{22.8}}=3.66$$
 rad/s

The time period of oscillation =  $T = \frac{2\pi}{\omega} = 1.72$  s

The cyclic frequency  $= f = \frac{1}{T} = 0.58 \text{ Hz}$ 



SK 3/21 Response spectra normalised to 1g.

Assume a ZPA (zero period acceleration) value of 0.25g for the seismic excitation.

Assume 2% damping for the steel chimney.

For a cyclic frequency of 0.58 Hz,  $S_v$  (pseudo-velocity) is obtained from the response spectra as  $S_v = 0.25 \times 2.2 = 0.55$  m/s.

The maximum generalised co-ordinate displacement is given by:

$$Z_{\text{max}} = \frac{\Lambda}{m^* \omega} S_{\text{v}} = \frac{36.4 \times 0.55}{22.8 \times 3.66} = 0.240 \,\text{m}$$

The maximum displacement of the chimney is therefore given by the expression:

$$v_{\max} = 0.240 \times \left(1 - \cos \frac{\pi x}{2l}\right) \mathrm{m}$$

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The maximum base shear is:

Assume there is a mass on top of the structure of weight N kN. In the equation of motion the stiffness to be used is then given by:

where  $N_{\rm cr} = \pi^2 E I/4l^2$  and the total mass  $M = m^* + N/g$ .

Circular frequency  $\omega = \sqrt{\frac{\bar{k}^*}{M}}$ 

Maximum base shear = 
$$V_{\text{max}} = \left(\frac{\Lambda^2}{m^*} + \frac{N}{g}\right)\omega S_v$$

where  $S_v$  is obtained from the response spectrum for  $T = 2\pi/\omega$ . The bending moment at the base of the chimney is given by:

$$M_{0,\max} = \frac{\Lambda}{m^*} m\omega S_v \int_0^l \psi(x) x \, dx + \frac{N}{g} \omega S_v l$$
$$= \frac{\Lambda}{m^*} m l^2 \omega S_v \left(\frac{1}{2} + \frac{4}{\pi^2} - \frac{2}{\pi}\right) + \frac{N}{g} \omega S_v l$$
$$= 0.429 m l^2 \omega S_v + \frac{N}{g} \omega S_v l$$


At a height h above the base the bending moment and shear force are given by:

$$M_{\rm h,max} = \frac{\Lambda}{m^*} m\omega S_{\rm v} \int_{\rm h}^{l} \psi(x) x \, dx + \frac{N}{g} \omega S_{\rm v}(l-h)$$
$$V_{\rm h,max} = \frac{\Lambda}{m^*} m\omega S_{\rm v} \int_{\rm h}^{l} \psi(x) \, dx + \frac{N}{g} \omega S_{\rm v}$$

Carry out numerical integration to find  $m^*$ ,  $k^*$ ,  $\Lambda$  and  $\omega$  if the mass per unit length and the moment of inertia vary with x. Divide the chimney or any tall cantilever structure into discrete segments, and use the summation principle to solve for  $\omega$ .

# 3.7 EXAMPLE 3.7: PLASTIC ANALYSIS OF A PITCHED PORTAL FRAME

The frame to be analysed is shown in SK 3/22. These frames are to be spaced at 6.0 m centres.





## Step 4 Carry out analysis using trial sections and unit distributed loading Two separate analyses will be carried out with symmetrical uniformly distributed unit loading on the portal frame. The first analysis will

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assume that the structure is fully elastic and that there are no plastic hinges. The second analysis will be carried out with two plastic hinges in the rafter at the connection with the columns. It is assumed that the plastic hinges in the rafter will form simultaneously in the rafter due to the symmetry. The next set of plastic hinges will turn the structure into a mechanism, thereby causing failure.


The plastic hinges will form in the rafter at B when the loading is  $473.2 \div 51.67 = 9.1 \text{ kN/m}$  on the rafter because unit uniformly distributed loading produces a bending moment equal to 51.67 kNmat B (see Table 3.5). Ultimate loading is equal to 10 kN/m. Therefore, the load remaining to be put on the rafter is equal to 10 - 9.1 = 0.9 kN/m.


The effect of the remaining load of 0.9 kN/m will be according to the results of Analysis 2 from Table 3.5. Plastic hinges will form in the column at A when the bending moment reaches 588.4 kNm, as determined in Step 6. The ultimate bending

moment at A is 540.6 kNm from Table 3.6. The increase in bending moment for each kN/m of loading on the rafter at this stage is 113.9 kNm, as per Table 3.5 Analysis 2. Additional loading on the rafter beyond the ultimate loading required to cause failure is given by:



At a loading of 10.42 kN/m, further plastic hinges may form in the columns at A and failure may take place. There is only 4.2% reserve strength in the structure above the ultimate load. There is no need to carry out any more refinement in the design to achieve economy.

Note: This portal frame is designed without haunches. Haunches may still be required at the connections of the rafters to the columns because it might not be possible to design the rafter connection to withstand the full plastic moment capacity, even with extended end plates.

#### 3.7.1 Haunched pitched portal frame

The pitched portal frame shown in SK 3/22 is reanalysed with haunches at the connections of the rafters to the columns. The haunch geometry is shown in SK 3/26, with a reduced section of the rafter as a first trial. The plastic analysis is carried out assuming that the plastic hinges will form where the haunch ends on the rafter. It is assumed that the haunch is identical to the rafter in flange width and web thickness. The section classification of the haunch at its deepest part at the connection with the column should be at least compact as per Clause 5.3.4 of BS 5950: Part 1.

#### 134 Structural Steelwork

#### Step 3 Choose trial section for rafter and columns

Choose a reduced section of rafter UB  $356 \times 171 \times 67$  kg/m and use the same section for the column as before, i.e. UB  $457 \times 191 \times 98$  kg/m.

The first hinge will form in the rafter 1237 mm from the intersection of the centre-lines of the column and the rafter as shown in SK 3/26. The average increase of depth of the rafter in the haunch is 155 mm. In the analysis an allowance is made for this increased stiffness at the connection by modelling the haunched part of the rafter as a separate member with increased area and inertia.





Step 6 Calculate reduction of plastic moment of resistance of the column section This step remains unchanged from the previous analysis of the portal without haunches. Plastic moment of resistance of the column section is 588.4 kNm.

#### Step 7 Find final internal forces in the structure

The plastic hinges will form in the rafter at location C when the loading has reached  $328.8 \div 38.98 = 8.44 \text{ kN/m}$ , because the unit uniformly distributed load produces a 38.98 kNm bending moment at location C on the rafter.

Load remaining to be put on the rafter = 10 - 8.44 = 1.56 kN/m.

The effect of this additional load will be as shown by the results of Analysis 2 in Table 3.7.

The final internal forces in the members are the results of Analysis 1 multiplied by 8.44 plus the results of Analysis 2 multiplied by 1.56. The serviceability limit state results are obtained by multiplying the results of Analysis 1 by 6.6.

Check: The bending moment at A in the column at the ultimate limit state is equal to  $(55.59 \times 8.44) + (122.65 \times 1.56) = 660.5 \text{ kNm} > 588.4 \text{ kNm}$ . This is in excess of the plastic moment of resistance of

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the column, hence failure may take place before the ultimate load is reached. There are three possible solutions:

- (1) Increase the depth of the haunch, which also increases the length of the haunch.
- (2) Increase the size of the rafter.
- (3) Increase the size of the column.

The most cost effective alternative could be to increase the length and depth of the haunch. The depth may be increased to a maximum value of 400 mm if the rafter section has to be used to form the haunch. Assume a haunch depth of 400 mm and a length of 1500 mm. Repeat the calculations of Steps 3 to 7. The structure should be able to carry the ultimate loading with this revised geometry.

#### Step 10 Design restraint system

Haunched portals designed by the method of plastic analysis must have the restraints as specified in Section 5.5 of BS 5950: Part 1. The following list shows the necessary steps.

- Provide torsional restraint at the end of the haunch as per Clause 5.3.5.
- Find minimum distance of the adjacent restraints from the hinge restraint as per Clause 5.3.5.
- Provide note on the drawing regarding the fabrication restriction as per Clause 5.3.7.
- Check if stiffeners are required at the hinge location as per Clause 5.3.6.
- Check sway stability with notional horizontal force applied at the top of the column, when the deflection must not exceed h/1000, h being the height of the column.
- Check haunch restraints as per Figure 10 of BS 5950: Part 1.
- Check column stability as per Clause 5.5.3.4.
- Check rafter stability as per Clause 5.5.3.5.

## Chapter 4 Design of Structures

#### 4.1 PRINCIPAL ISSUES

The criteria which govern the design of structures may be summarised as follows:

*Fitness for purpose* is generally covered by the overall geometry of the structure and its components. It should be possible to have unrestricted and unhindered use of the structure for its intended purpose.

Safety and reliability are assured by following the Codes of Practice for loading, materials, design, manufacture, erection, corrosion protection and fire resistance.

**Durability** is satisfied by the choice of the right materials for the purpose, including protection systems compatible with the environmental exposure.

Value for money is a very important criterion. The designer should take into account the whole life cost of the structure, including the maintenance requirements and the cost of demolition/decommissioning.

*External appearance* of any structure changes over time. Designers should make appropriate allowances in their choice of materials and finishes to avoid rapid degradation of appearance.

User comfort is influenced by vibration of the structure as a result of wind, road/rail traffic and vibrating machinery. Large deflections cause alarm to users. Designers should take appropriate measures to minimise this discomfort.

*Robustness* comes with the chosen structural form. It is a measure of the additional inherent strength of the structure to withstand accidental overloads. Failure of a component part of the structure must not initiate global collapse.

**Buildability** is perhaps the most important issue – it includes the manufacture, handling, transport and erection of components. Good design would most necessarily mean good buildability. It has an enormous impact on overall cost of the structure and to understand the principles of buildability it is necessary to know the manufacturing process, the handling problems and the transport restrictions. It should be borne in mind that the lowest material weight does not necessarily mean the lowest cost. The fundamental design considerations which influence buildability are discussed below.

#### 4.2 MATERIAL GRADE SELECTION AND SECTION TYPE SELECTION

The use of small quantities of different grades and section sizes should be avoided because it becomes more expensive to purchase from stockholders. Large quantities of sections within a serial size can be purchased directly from the steel mills in lengths up to 15 m. Buying from a stockholder could also increase wastage because only standard stock lengths of material are generally available.

The problem with purchasing directly from the steel mills lies in the fact that the current rolling programme of a particular section size may already have been fully subscribed and the next programme of rolling of the same size may not suit the contract requirements. Popular section sizes in large quantities, if selected by the designers, may tend to increase the total tonnage of material but could improve the buildability in terms of overall cost and time. Small quantities of high grade material have stiffer price penalties.

The cost penalty for Design Grade 50 is small compared to its strength advantage over Grade 43. Grade 50 should be specified unless the design is governed by deflection only. Angles are quite difficult to obtain in Grade 50. Structural hollow sections are very efficient for axial compression and torsional capacity. These sections are 60–80% more expensive than open sections and involve connection by welding. They frequently require additional stiffening at connections because the wall thickness may not be adequate. Also, such sections are only available in standard mill lengths, which means extra wastage and/or additional splicing by butt welding. Seamless tubes with thicker walls are much more expensive. The materials for all the fittings need not be related to the material of the members. They should be chosen by the fabricator on the basis of the design requirements for strength and performance.

#### 4.3 MANUFACTURING PROCESS

The modern manufacturing process is described very briefly here to give an appreciation of the steps involved. It starts with blast cleaning of material from stock and the application of a prefabrication primer. (Some fabricators choose to carry out the blast cleaning after cutting the sections to size and after carrying out the holing operations.) After blast cleaning and priming, the next stage is cutting, which can be done in many ways. The most popular technique is to use a circular saw in conjunction with a conveyor system. This can be done fairly accurately by utilising a measuring device.

Band sawing, motor-operated hacksawing, guillotining, flame cutting and plasma cutting are other techniques practised in modern fabrication shops. Plates are generally flame cut or plasma cut. Flats and angles are generally cropped using specialised handling and cutting machines.

The next operation is holing. In modern fabrication shops CNC (computer numerically controlled) beam-drilling lines are used. There

are usually three drill heads, which can carry out simultaneous drilling operations in the top and bottom flanges and the web of a beam. This system operates in conjunction with a cutting and conveyor network operated by CNC software. All fittings and short members are drilled manually. Fabricators generally prefer punching to drilling holes. This is normally permitted for untensioned bolts up to a material thickness equal to the hole diameter.


Flange thinning, stripping and coping are other operations carried out under CNC instructions or by marking manually and flame cutting. Vertical surface milling is sometimes used with deep sections to achieve the desired accuracy of length. Horizontal surface milling of bearing surfaces is also carried out to achieve specified flatness criteria.

Profile preparation of circular hollow-section (CHS) ends for welding is generally done by plasma cutting machines under CNC instruction. Manually, this end preparation is an expensive and timeconsuming operation involving flame cutting and grinding.

Joining of components in the shop is done by welding or bolting. Jigs and templates are used for positioning the components to be joined. Semi-automatic metal inert gas (MIG) welding techniques are used with wire-fed welding equipment.

#### 4.4 CONNECTION DESIGN

The raw material cost of the finished product is only 35–50%. The rest of the cost is in fabrication and handling in the shop. The connections

can influence up to 65% of the cost of the production. Member sizes should be chosen on the basis of connection requirements rather than the actual design requirement (i.e. if an increase in the size of the member could simplify the connections, one should think seriously about increasing the size of member). Design drawings should show the philosophy of connection assumed by the designer such that the complexity is fully understood at tender stage and the best price can be obtained. This also avoids future claims and delays in the event of complications during fabrication.

#### 4.4.1 Simple connections

These are the cheapest to fabricate but, depending on the shear load they transfer, their complexity may go up and increase the fabrication costs accordingly. In SK 4/1 the generally accepted types of simple connections are shown with a reference to their shear carrying capacity and complexity. The carrying capacity in percentage terms relates to the shear capacity of the member being connected. In this type of low-cost connection philosophy one would find primary beams with end cleats or part-depth end plates for connections to columns. Secondary beams will have notched ends and be drilled in the web for connection to fin plates. The columns will have simple base plates and splices with flanges drilled for primary beams and webs, with fin plates attached for the connection of secondary beams. This philosophy has the lowest fabrication cost.

#### 4.4.2 Moment connections

These connections can be moderately or highly complex, depending on the moment and shear they transfer. The fabrication costs go up quite significantly in line with the degree of complexity. In SK 4/1 the standard types of moment connections are shown with reference to their degree of complexity and their moment carrying capacity. The carrying capacity in percentage terms relates to the ultimate plastic moment capacity of the member being connected.


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
In a moderately complex moment connection one will find primary beams with end plates butt welded to the top flange or extended end plates with fillet welds. The primary beam will have fin plates or holes for the connection of secondary beams. The secondary beams will be notched and will have end plates or a double row of angle cleats. The columns may have base plates without stiffeners and tensile stiffening of the flanges may be required at the primary beam connection. Secondary beam-to-web of column connection will be by means of double angle cleats.

In a highly complex moment connection one will find primary beams with haunched end plates and will have holes for the connection of secondary beams by double angle cleats or end plates. The secondary beams will have flexible end plates or double angle cleats and they will be notched. Columns will have base plates with stiffeners, and at the connection with primary beams they will have tensile as well as compressive stiffeners. The secondary beams with end plate connections to the webs of the columns may have welded T-stubs if fin plates are not adequate.

*Note:* The cost of fabrication of a high-cost moment connection could be six to eight times more than that of a simple connection.

4.4.3 Trusses and open-web girders

#### Low-cost connections

All monoplanar trusses with two continuous booms and internal bracing where the joints are assumed 'pinned' may have low-cost connection provided the booms are made of UB, UC, RSJ, ST, RSC, RSA or RHS with gusset plates bolted or welded at the intersections with the internal bracing. The internal bracing is generally made of RSA, RSC, RSJ, UC or UB, using bolts for connections to the gusset plates. When RSJ, UC or UB are used, flange stripping may be necessary for connection to gusset plates, requiring extra fabrication work. The cost of fabrication goes up with welded internals. The boom faces for connections of the internals should be wider than the internals to allow fillet welds all round. The welded connections require a lot more handling in the shop.

#### Medium-cost connections

If monoplanar trusses require stiffening of the booms at the connections because the forces are high, then the fabrication costs are increased considerably. Any moment connection at the internal bracing, as in a Vierendeel truss, will increase the complexity of the connection. The types of sections for the booms and the internals remain the same as in a low-cost connection option. Welded connections at the intersections requiring stiffening add even more to the cost of fabrication.

#### High-cost connections

All monoplanar trusses made of circular hollow sections with welded intersections require full profile preparation for the internals. Some connections may require the thickening of walls (by 'canning' or by the use of 'saddles') to prevent high local stress concentrations. Through-fitted and welded gussets are also used. These connections require a great deal of time, effort and handling in the shops.

If the trusses are in more than one plane then the complexity of the connection is more severe. Jigging in three dimensions adds to the cost of fabrication. Problems associated with multi-positional welding and numerous handling and transportation processes should be carefully considered by the designers at the conceptual design stage.

In SK 4/2 the different types of connections of the truss are illustrated. It should be emphasised again that a low raw material weight is not necessarily the lowest cost option.

A check list of actions and design considerations for designers is included here to show how to achieve a design which satisfies the good buildability guidelines. The check list is split into four parts, each one covering the considerations relevant to the overall activity during that stage. Designers will benefit from this check list because at each design stage it will enable them to take into account the problems which could be encountered later in the manufacturing, transportation and erection stages.

#### 4.5 CHECK LIST OF ACTIONS AND DESIGN CONSIDERATIONS

#### (1) Conceptual design stage

- Use as few different section sizes as possible in any one structure.
- Use same grade of steel in individual projects.
- Use Grade 50 steel whenever possible unless deflection governs the design.
- Structural hollow sections are 60-80% more expensive and they should be used with care.
- High strength friction grip (HSFG) bolts should be used only where it is absolutely necessary from the design point of view.
- Do not mix welding and bolting in the same piece to be fabricated.
- Consider weldability of materials before specifying welding.
- Use rolled steel beams in place of fabricated latticed girders wherever possible.
- Avoid using multi-planar trusses.

(2) Detailed design stage

- Do not specify small quantities of high grade steel.
- Increase member size to avoid stiffening at connections.
- Select section sizes for members of a truss such that local stiffening at intersections is avoided.
- Avoid haunched beam-end connections.
- Avoid tension and compression stiffening in columns use heavier sections instead.
- Avoid using 'canning' or 'saddles' in CHS truss fabrication use thicker walled sections instead.
- Avoid using RSJ, UB and UC as truss internals because flange stripping may be necessary at the intersections.
- Use bolted internals in a truss in preference to welded internals.
- Do not specify intermittent fillet welds where there is a possibility of moisture ingress.
- Remember, a continuous smaller size fillet weld is cheaper than an intermittent fillet weld.
- Do not over-specify weld size.
- Drawings must show the design philosophy of the connections.
- Do not use different grades of bolt of the same diameter.
- Standardise the bolts to be used stick to M20 Grade 8.8 for shear connection and M24 Grade 8.8 for moment connections wherever possible.
- Use fillet welds of up to 12mm leg length in preference to butt welds of equivalent strength.
- Use site bolting in preference to site welding.

#### (3) Manufacturing stage

- Design single end cuts square to the member length.
- Use one hole diameter on any one piece.
- Align holes on axis square to the member length.
- Do not use staggered holes.
- Use adequate side clearance for holes in webs.
- Rationalise the range of fitting sizes.
- Do not specify the grade of material for the fittings leave it to the fabricator.
- Provide adequate access for welding.
- Consider the effects of distortion due to welding.
- Weld inspection and acceptance criteria must be clearly specified.
- Specify single coat of protection system during fabrication.
- Allow the fabricator to choose the method of corrosion protection. Specify only the performance criteria.
- Always check the limits of transportation before designing components and parts. See Tables 4.4 and 4.5 at the end of the chapter.
- Avoid using structural hollow sections for long members which are beyond the standard length available from stockholders.
- Limit the size of frames to be transported to less than 5m wide and 27.4m long.

- Be aware that dimensional limits apply not only to transport handling in a fabricator's workshop, off-site painting yards and galvanising facilities will also impose size restrictions.
- Stability of part frames used for manufacture and transport should be considered at the design stages.

#### (4) Erection stage

- Permit the use of fully threaded bolts wherever possible.
- Always specify washers to protect the surface finish.
- Specify that bolts, nuts and washers should be pre-coated with the designed corrosion protection system before delivery to the site.
- Do not specify a corrosion protection system unless it is required by the environmental exposure conditions.
- Make sure that the corrosion protection system is compatible with the fire protection scheme.
- Do not use composite construction with welded through-deck stud shear connectors to the top flanges of beams in environments where corrosion protection is required. It is impossible to paint the top flanges after the metal decking has been installed and shear connectors have been fitted.
- Do not specify shop-applied decorative finishes because they will be damaged in handling during transport and erection.
- Specify the procedure for removal of temporary lifting points in the structural components.
- Consider adding temporary support to an incomplete structure during manufacture, handling, transport and erection.

#### 4.6 ULTIMATE LIMIT STATE DESIGN

There are three basic types of design. They are described below.

#### (1) Simple design

Beam-to-column connections are assumed simple and do not develop bending moments. Structural members intersecting at a point are assumed pin jointed. Lateral stability of the structure is maintained by vertical bracing or shear wall.

#### (2) Rigid design

Beam-to-column connections are assumed rigid, and the connection geometry is not altered by the application of load on the structure. The connections are designed to ensure full continuity of members.

#### (3) Semi-rigid design

It is assumed that some degree of stiffness is offered by the joints. The beam-to-column connections are designed to withstand up to 10% of the maximum free span bending moment in the beam. This 10% restraint moment at the end connections is taken into account to find the design bending moment in the beams. Columns are designed to carry this additional restraint moment from the connection. The structure should be braced in both directions for lateral stability.

BS 5950 permits semi-rigid designs where a limited amount of moment transfer can be provided by the connection. In order to limit the high cost of complicated connection details, it is possible to limit the connection stiffness based on a simple connection geometry as in an extended end plate connection or flange cleat connection. Elastic analysis results with factored loads will predict much higher connection forces, but by limiting these connection forces to the pre-designed connection capability, one could achieve a degree of economy.

The advantages are:

- Reduction in the depth of the beam.
- Reduction in the cost of the frame.
- Reduction in fabrication cost by avoiding complexity.
- Improved exploitation of composite construction where the mid-

span plastic moment capacity in a beam is very high.

The disadvantages are:

- Greater deflection at service loads.
- With a high proportion of live load, unless the designer is very careful, joints may go plastic at service load and ratchetting will occur, resulting in large unacceptable deflections over a period of time.
- Full service load stress checks are necessary to make sure all components at the joints are below yield.
- The design is unacceptable for seismic loading because the ductility of the structure depends on the formation of plastic hinges which must not form at the connections because the connections are brittle compared with the member, where the hinges should be allowed to form. In seismic design the connections should be made significantly stronger than the member capacity.
- At least 70% of the elastically analysed moments in a rigid unbraced frame must be catered for by the connections, otherwise at service loads the components of the joint may go beyond yield.
- Much less available reserve strength against accidental overload sacrifice of robustness.

#### Step-by-step method of semi-rigid design 4.6.1

- Carry out elastic analysis with factored loads and find the design Step 1 bending moments at the beam-column junctions.
- Reduce design bending moments at the connection to 70% of the Step 2 elastically analysed value.
- Design a simple moment connection with either end plates or flange Step 3 angle cleats, whichever is functionally acceptable. Check that no column stiffening is required.
- Step 4 Determine plastic moment capacity of the designed connections.

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- Step 5 Determine plastic moment capacities of the sections in the frame at critical points.
- Step 6 Carry out unit load analyses of the frame assuming progressive formation of hinges. Several analyses of the frame will be required, depending on the degree of redundancy. The last hinge should make the structure into a mechanism. An example of the unit load analyses is shown in the plastic frame analyses in Chapter 3.
- Step 7 Firstly load the complete undamaged structure till the first set of hinges is formed. This first set of hinges must never form at or below the service load. No part of the structure should go beyond yield at service load.
- Step 8 After the first set of hinges has formed, use the results of the analysis with unit loading of the frame in Step 6 with these hinges and apply further loading till the next set of hinges forms. Carry on using the next revised frame with more hinges from the previous one till such time as you have reached the ultimate loading or the structure has become a mechanism.
- Step 9 Check that at ultimate loading the structure is not a mechanism. Find the reserve strength or robustness by applying further load beyond the ultimate load till failure occurs.
- *Note:* The unit load frame analysis with a progressively increasing number of hinges is a very useful tool because the rest of the analyses can be done simply by hand.

#### 4.6.2 Load combinations at the ultimate limit state as per BS 5950: Part 1

Basic load cases: DL = Dead load IL = Imposed load CLV = Crane vertical load CLH = Crane horizontal load TLR = Thermal load due to rise in temperature TLF = Thermal load due to fall in temperature WL = Wind loadNHF = Notional horizontal force (Clause 2.4.2.3 of BS 5950: Part 1)

The combinations of basic load cases with appropriate load factors at the ultimate limit state are given in Table 4.1. Load cases 11, 12, 13, 14, 37, 38, 39 and 40 are required to check uplift and overturning of the structure. Load cases 41 and 42 are required to check the lateral stability of the structure with a notional horizontal force. The notional horizontal force is applied at a floor level. This is taken as equal to the greater of either 1% of the factored dead load at the floor level or 0.5% of the combined factored dead and imposed loads at the floor level. The load factors to be used for this computation are 1.4 for the dead load and 1.6 for the imposed load.

## 4.6.3 Patterned loading

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With significant live load on the span a patterned loading sequence could produce higher design bending moments. The distribution of live loads on spans to produce the maximum effect may be carried out following the simple guidelines in Table 4.2.

#### 4.6.4 Structural stability against lateral loads

At the concept stage of the design of a structure the type of global framework for lateral stability should be determined. The requirements of lateral stability provided by braced-bay frames, rigid frames and shear walls have to be decided at the concept stage. Some guidance about the requirements of any chosen global structural form is given in Table 4.3.

#### 4.6.5 Stability of multistorey rigid frames

### Elastic design of sway frames


- (1) If the effective lengths of the columns are obtained by the limited frame method as described earlier, then the stability of the frame is satisfied.


where  $\lambda_{cr}$  = elastic critical load factor. To determine  $\lambda_{cr}$ , the sway index  $\phi_s$  has to be found for each storey height. By elastic analysis of the rigid frame against horizontal loads find deflections at every storey level. The horizontal load should be taken as 0.5% of all factored vertical loads at the level under consideration. The sway index is given by:










Vertical bracing elevations of Z- and X-bracing



Vertical bracing elevations of V- and K-bracing





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# Chapter 5

## Design of Struts

## 5.1 AXIAL CAPACITY OF A COLUMN OR A STRUT

The capacity of a column or a strut to carry axial compression depends on the following factors generally:

- (1) Its end conditions how it is attached to other parts of the structure or foundation.
- (2) Its material strength.
- (3) Its cross-sectional shape.
- (4) Its overall length.
- (5) Its manufacturing process.
- (6) The structural concept of the global structure of which it is only a part (i.e. braced, unbraced, sway frames cantilever etc.).
- (7) The presence of local transverse loading or eccentric axial loading.
- (8) The presence of simultaneously acting bending moment and shear, as in multistorey rigid frames.

## 5.2 TYPES OF FAILURE OF A COLUMN OR STRUT

Purely axial loading on a column may cause failure for the following reasons:

- (1) Squashing as in a very small stocky column where the yield stress  $p_y$  may be applied uniformly over the whole cross-sectional area.
- (2) Flexural buckling as in a slender column where the column deflects laterally about the weaker principal axis and the failure occurs before the entire cross-section can be loaded to the yield stress  $p_y$ .
- (3) Torsional buckling as in an unsymmetrical shape made of thin plate thickness where the member twists about its longitudinal axis and failure occurs before the section can attain the yield stress  $p_y$ . This type of failure is very uncommon and is normally encountered in cold-formed thin sections.
- (4) Local buckling as in a section where the proportion of individual elements is such that the whole member may not behave as a slender column (as in case 2 above) but local elements may buckle before the yield stress  $p_y$  is attained. In these cases, the local elements prone to buckling, because of their geometric proportions, must be designed with reduced design strength  $p_y$  in compression.

(5) Local failure – as in a compound section where the compound column as a whole is stronger than its main components. In a compound column the main components are tied together by lacing or battens. The main components may buckle about their weak minor axis between the points of restraint by the lacing or batten system.

#### 5.3 DESIGN BASIS OF COLUMNS AND STRUTS

#### 5.3.1 Compressive strength $(p_c)$

Basically there is only one consideration in the design of a column or strut, namely its slenderness. The slenderness affects the flexural buckling, the local buckling and the local failure of a compound strut.

The Euler theory of a pin-jointed column predicts a critical axial load under ideal conditions. If other important factors are taken into consideration, this critical load for failure is revised to give the current considerations in BS 5950: Part 1. The factors which influence the theoretical elastic critical load are:

- lack of straightness
- eccentricities of loading which are not accountable in design
- material variability
- material imperfections
- geometric imperfections
- residual stresses due to the manufacturing process

These effects cannot be fully addressed by numerical methods. Experimental observations have given rise to the adoption of the design curves in BS 5950: Part 1. These factors change from shape to shape and also according to the selection of manufacturing process. BS 5950: Part 1 therefore recommends the use of four different curves of compressive strength  $p_c$  for four types of struts. These curves lie below the theoretical Euler curve for compressive strength of a pin-jointed column.

#### 5.3.2 Boundary conditions

The effective length of a column, which influences the slenderness, is dependent on the boundary conditions. The degrees of freedom at the boundary are translational and rotational. Depending on the available freedom at the ends, an approximate method has been devised whereby a factor is applied to the length of the strut to convert it to the theoretical pin-jointed elastic critical case, as in the Euler theory. The consideration of the buckling mode is important when the effective length is determined. A single curvature buckling is expected in a pin-jointed column whereas a double curvature is expected when there is an intermediate restraint. When the ends are rotationally restrained the column will buckle in such a manner that the distance between the points of contraflexure is half the total length. Similarly, for a cantilever column the effective length is twice its normal length. The combination of rotational and translational freedoms at ends gives rise to many methods of finding the effective lengths of columns or struts.

#### 5.3.3 Combined axial compression and bending moment

#### Local capacity check

The design basis for the local capacity check is exactly the same as in a member subjected to combined axial tension and bending. To understand this philosophy see Section 6.3.


#### Overall buckling check

The principal issues are:

- (1) Axial capacity of the member in compression.
- (2) Secondary moments due to applied bending moment and applied axial compression.
- (3) Overall buckling about the minor axis due to applied moments.

The complex nature of the problem makes it extremely difficult to analyse numerically. The axial compression by itself causes elastic instability in a slender column. The axial capacity of the member depends on the slenderness ratio and the section classification. Similarly, the buckling resistance moment also depends on the effective length of compression flange and section classification. A mathematical explanation of this complex process may be given as follows:

Assume that a constant moment M is applied to the member and causes a deflection  $\delta$  at the centre of the column. This deflection gives rise to an additional moment  $F\delta$  where F is the axial compression.



SK 5/1 Column with bending and axial compression.

The total maximum moment in the section can be stated as  $M + F\delta$ . This maximum moment can be approximated to the following:

$$M_{\rm max} = \frac{M}{\left(1 - \frac{F}{P_{\rm cr}}\right)}$$

where  $P_{\rm cr} = {\rm elastic \ critical \ load} = \pi^2 EI/L^2$ 

M = constant applied moment on column section

F = axial compression in column

- $\delta = deflection at centre of column$
- $M_{\text{max}} =$ maximum moment in column section due to moment and direct load

L = effective length of column between restraints

The elastic critical load decreases rapidly with the increase in the effective length of the member. This results in a rapid increase in the secondary moment, as can be seen from the expressions given above. The failure due to axial load alone on the member is controlled by the slenderness about the minor axis or a flexural buckling failure at a load equal to  $P_{cy}$ . Similarly, the failure due to bending moment about the major axis is governed by the lateral torsional buckling of the compression flange about its minor axis and this failure moment is termed  $M_{b}$ , as explained in Chapter 7. If these two failure conditions are imposed in the expressions derived before, we get an interaction equation given by:

$$\frac{F}{P_{\rm cy}} + \frac{M}{\left(1 - \frac{F}{P_{\rm crx}}\right)M_{\rm b}} \le 1.0$$

where  $P_{cy} =$  flexural buckling failure axial load

 $M_{\rm b}$  = lateral torsional buckling failure moment

 $P_{\rm crx}$  = elastic critical load corresponding to effective length  $L_{\rm x}$ 

 $P_{\rm cry}$  = elastic critical load corresponding to effective length  $L_y$ 

# *Note:* The additional moment is dictated by the Euler critical buckling load about the major axis.

If we extend the argument to both axes at the same time we will get the following expression which is the basis of the code formulation:

$$\frac{F}{P_{\rm cy}} + \frac{M_{\rm x}}{\left(1 - \frac{F}{P_{\rm crx}}\right)M_{\rm b}} + \frac{M_{\rm y}}{\left(1 - \frac{F}{P_{\rm cry}}\right)M_{\rm cy}} \le 1.0$$

where  $M_{cy} =$  plastic moment capacity of the section about the minor axis.

Conservatively the code also allows the following unity check for a member subjected to axial compression and biaxial bending.

$$\frac{F}{A_{\rm g}p_{\rm c}} + \frac{mM_{\rm x}}{M_{\rm b}} + \frac{mM_{\rm y}}{p_{\rm y}Z_{\rm y}} \le 1.0$$

where  $A_g = \text{gross sectional area}$ 

-

- $p_{\rm c} = {\rm compressive \ strength \ of \ the \ column \ as \ a \ strut}$
- $p_{\nu} = \text{design strength}$
- $Z_y =$  elastic section modulus for moments about the minor axis m = uniform moment factor

The theoretical derivation of the interaction formula is based on uniform moments  $M_x$  and  $M_y$  acting on the whole member about the major and minor axes respectively. The factor *m* is introduced to account for the variation of moment along the length of the member. This factor is called the uniform moment factor and can be obtained from Table 18 of BS 5950: Part 1.

### 5.4 STEP-BY-STEP DESIGN PROCEDURE OF COLUMNS/STRUTS

#### Step 1 Select type of strut and trial section

At the early concept stage of the design the major issues governing the choice of a type of strut should be considered. These issues are addressed in Table 5.1. The star ratings provide general guidance only and may differ from site to site, so feedback from the manufacturers of the components is most important. It should be borne in mind that Grade 50 steel offers substantial economy over Grade 43, provided the serviceability limit state of deflection does not govern the design.

#### Step 2 Determine combined ultimate axial loading

Follow the load combination procedures after structural analyses with basic loads as described in Chapters 3 and 4. Determine the ultimate axial compression, choosing load combinations and factors from Table 4.1.

#### Step 3 Determine ultimate bending moments and shear forces

At the concept stage of the design, the type of construction will have been decided – continuous or simple. Calculate the bending moments in a compression member according to the construction method chosen:

- (1) Continuous construction (as in a rigid frame structure): carry out structural analyses to determine bending moments and shear forces.
- (2) Simple construction (as in a braced frame construction): determine the nominal bending moments following the rules below:
  - (a) For a beam supported on a column cap plate assume that the beam-end reaction is applied on the face of the column or the edge of the packing plate, if used. The face of the column towards the span of the beam should be taken to determine the eccentricity of the applied load on the column.
  - (b) For a roof truss supported on a column cap plate, the eccentricity of the vertical load from the truss may be ignored if the connection between the truss and the column cap plate is simple and does not transfer any moments.

- (c) For a beam connected to the side of a column, the eccentricity of the vertical load should be assumed to be 100 mm, or the distance from the centre of the column to the centre of a stiff bearing, whichever is greater.
- (d) Ignore the effect of eccentric end connections for struts made of angles, single channels and single T-sections, provided the slenderness ratios are limited to values given in Table 5.3 in Step 6.
- (e) For laced struts, battened struts, batten-starred angle struts, and battened parallel angle struts, allow for eccentricity of end connections.
- (f) Columns in multistorey buildings using simple construction may not be designed for patterned loading as described in Table 4.2. All beams should be fully loaded to determine maximum column loads. The nominal moments due to beam eccentricity should be added to moments from partial fixity (semi-rigid design approach), and this total moment should be divided between column lengths above and below the joint in proportion to the column stiffness I/l. These nominal moments at any level may be divided equally between the columns above and below if the ratio of stiffness of the columns does not exceed 1.5. These nominal moments have no effect below or above the level considered.

#### Step 4 Determine local bending moments in latticed girders and trusses

Where the exact positions of purlins or other concentrated point loads on the rafter relative to the intersections of the web members are not known, the local bending may be taken as:

$$M_{\rm local} = \frac{WL}{6}$$

where W = ultimate point load from purlin or any other source

L =length of the rafter between the points of intersection with web members

 $M_{\text{local}} = \text{local bending moment in rafter due to concentrated}$ load of purlin

#### Step 5 Determine effective length of strut

The most important element in the design of a strut is its effective length in both orthogonal principal axes. Table 5.2 may be used to find the effective lengths.




#### Base stiffness

Stiffness of the foundation at the base of a column may be taken as:

- (1) Equal to the column stiffness if it is rigidly connected in the direction being considered.
- (2) Equal to 10% of column stiffness if it is nominally connected in the direction being considered.
- (3) Equal to zero if a proper pinned or rocker connection is used.

#### Beam stiffness

Stiffness of a beam connected rigidly to a column may be taken as:

- (1) Equal to the beam stiffness *I/l* if a concrete floor is supported by the beam.
- (2) Equal to 0.5I/l if the frame is braced and there is no concrete floor.
- (3) Equal to 1.5I/l if the frame is free to sway and there is no concrete floor.
- (4) Equal to zero if the beam is carrying 90% or more of its reduced plastic moment capacity (reduction due to combined moment and axial load).

I =moment of inertia of section of beam and l =span of beam.

#### Column stiffness

The column stiffness may be taken as equal to I/l, where l = storey height and I = moment of inertia of section of column.

#### Relative stiffness

The relative stiffness  $k_3$  of the effective bracing in any storey may be determined as follows:

- (1) Rigid-jointed frames braced against side sway  $k_3 = \infty$ .
- (2) Rigid-jointed frames with unrestricted side sway  $k_3 = 0$ .
- (3) Rigid-jointed frames with no bracing but with wall panel built in the plane of the frame and extending the full height of the storey:








SK 5/3a Effective length ratio  $L_E/L$  for a column in a rigid-jointed frame braced against sidesway for  $k_3 = \infty$ .






#### Step 6

#### Determine the slenderness ratio $\lambda$

The slenderness ratio  $\lambda$  is defined as the effective length with respect to an axis of buckling divided by the radius of gyration of the column section about the same axis.

$$\lambda_{\rm x} = \frac{L_{\rm EX}}{r_{\rm x}}$$
 and  $\lambda_{\rm y} = \frac{L_{\rm EY}}{r_{\rm y}}$ 

 $L_{\rm EX}$  and  $L_{\rm EY}$  are the effective lengths about the two orthogonal axes. The rules for finding  $\lambda$  for single angles, double angles, single channels and single T-sections are given in Table 5.3. These values of slenderness ratio may be used if the eccentricity of end connections is ignored.

#### Step 7 Check maximum slenderness ratio

The slenderness ratio  $\lambda$  should not exceed the following values:

- (1) Members resisting dead imposed and crane loads: 180.
- (2) Members resisting self-weight and wind only: 250.
- (3) Member is normally a tie but wind causes a reversal of stress: 350. (Deflection due to self-weight should be limited to l/1000 – otherwise, design for axial load plus bending due to deformation.)

#### Step 8 Check classification of section

This should be checked with reference to Clause 3.5.2 and Table 7 of BS 5950: Part 1.

#### Step 9 Determine strength reduction factors for slender elements

This should be determined with reference to Clauses 3.6.3 and 3.6.4 and Table 8 of BS 5950: Part 1. See Worked Example 5.2 for an explanation of this principle.







#### Step 14 Design of lacing systems

General rules:

- (1) Lacing should not vary in section or inclination throughout the length of the member.
- (2) Inclination of the lacing should be between  $40^{\circ}$  and  $70^{\circ}$  to the axis of the member.
- (3) Lacing can be double intersection (cross) or single intersection. Single intersection lacing should not be opposed in direction on opposite faces of the main members. This would give rise to torsion in the member.
- (4) Tie panels in the form of battens should be provided at the ends of the lacing system.
- (5) Slenderness ratio  $\lambda_c$  should not be greater than 50 for individual main members connected by the lacing, where  $L_c$  (effective length) is the length between the points of intersections of the lacing with the main members. Radius of gyration of the main members about the minor axis is used to compute  $\lambda_c = L_c/r_{yy}$ .

Select a type and section of lacing to satisfy the general rules. Find effective lengths of the lacing bars from the sketches in Table 5.2 in Step 5. Check that the slenderness ratio of the lacing bars do not exceed 180.

Find shear force V across a plane perpendicular to the axis of the member, which is given by:

$$V = \left(\frac{2.5}{100}\right)F + V_{\rm s}$$

where F = ultimate maximum axial compression in the member

 $V_{\rm s} =$  transverse shear in the member at any section acting with F

The lacing bar should be checked for an axial tension or compression equal to  $N_{\rm L}$ , which is given by:

$$N_{\rm L} = \frac{V}{\sin\phi} \frac{1}{J}$$

where J = number of lacing bars cut by a plane perpendicular to the axis of the member

 $\phi$  = angle of inclination of the lacing bars to the axis of the member

 $P_{\rm LC} = {\rm capacity \ of \ lacing \ bar \ in \ compression} = A_{\rm g} p_{\rm c}$ 

 $A_{g}$  = the gross cross-sectional area of the lacing bar

The compressive strength  $p_c$  may be obtained from Table 27(c) of BS 5950: Part 1 corresponding to the slenderness ratio of the lacing bar and its design strength  $p_y$ .

Note: If the lacing system is connected to the main member by one fastener only, then the capacity  $P_{LC}$  should be multiplied by 0.8.

The capacity of the lacing bar in tension  $P_{LT} = A_e p_y$ , where  $A_e$  is the effective area of the section, which equals the gross area less deduction for holes, if any. Check that  $P_{LC}$  and  $P_{LT}$  are both greater than  $N_L$ .

The load in the tie panels at the end of lacing is  $N_{\rm L} \sin \phi$ . The tie panel should be designed as a batten, as in Step 15.

#### Step 15 Design of battens

General rules:

- The joints between the main components and the battens must be rigid. Use welded connections or connection by at least two bolts along the axis of the main member on each main member.
- (2) Battens should be provided opposite each other in each plane at the ends of the members and at the point of lateral restraints.
- (3) Intermediate battens on opposite faces of main members should be uniformly spaced throughout the length of the member.
- (4) The maximum slenderness ratio  $\lambda_c$  of the main member between end welds or end fasteners of adjacent battens should not exceed 50. ( $\lambda_c = L_c/r_{yy}$  - see point (5) of Step 14.)
- (5) The slenderness ratio of the compound column about an axis perpendicular to the plane of the battens  $\lambda_b$  is given by:

 $\lambda_{\rm b} = \sqrt{(\lambda_{\rm m}^2 + \lambda_{\rm c}^2)} \ge 1.4\lambda_{\rm c}$ 

where  $\lambda_{\rm m} = L_{\rm E}/r$ ,  $L_{\rm E}$  = effective length of the compound column about an axis perpendicular to the plane of the battens, and r = radius of gyration of the compound column about the same axis.

- (6) The thickness of the plate used as batten should not be less than 1/50 of the minimum distance between welds or fasteners on the batten connecting the main members, i.e. the free length of batten.
- (7) The slenderness ratio of the batten should not be less than 180 where the length of the batten is taken as the minimum distance between welds or fasteners on the batten connecting the main members, i.e. the free length of batten.
- (8) Width of the end battens should not be less than the distance between the centroids of the main members of the compound column.
- (9) Width of the intermediate battens should not be less than half the distance between the centroids of the main members of the compound column.
- (10) Width of any batten should not be less than twice the width of the narrower connected element of the main members of the compound column.

Select a type and section of end batten and intermediate batten. Decide on a spacing of the intermediate battens. Satisfy maximum slenderness ratio  $\lambda_c$  of the main members.

Check thickness, slenderness and width limitations of the battens. Find transverse shear force V across a plane perpendicular to the axis of the compound column, which is given by:

 $V = 0.025F + V_{\rm s}$ 

where F = ultimate maximum axial compressive force in the compound column

 $V_{\rm s}$  = transverse shear in the compound column at a batten position acting with F

The batten should be checked for axial load tension or compression equal to V/2 for two parallel planes of battens.

 $P_{\rm BC}$  = capacity of the batten in compression =  $A_{\rm g} p_{\rm c}$ 

 $A_g$  is the gross cross-sectional area and  $p_c$  is the compressive strength, which can be obtained from Table 27(c) of BS 5950: Part 1 corresponding to the slenderness ratio and design strength  $p_y$  of the batten.

The capacity of the batten in tension  $P_{BT}$  is given by:


 $P_{\rm T} = A_{\rm e} p_{\rm y}$ 

where  $A_e$  is the effective area of the batten after deduction of holes, if any. Check that  $P_{BC}$  and  $P_{BT}$  are both greater than V/2.

#### 5.5 WORKED EXAMPLES

## 5.5.1 Example 5.1a: Design the internal compression member of a roof truss

Choose the roof truss in Example 3.1 in Chapter 3. Select member 16.

## Step 1 Select type of strut and a trial section

By reference to Table 5.1, the most cost-effective option should be an angle in Grade 43 steel. From inspection of the basic load table, it is evident that maximum compression is of the order of 25 kN. Assuming a compressive strength  $p_c$  equal to  $125 \text{ N/mm}^2$ , the minimum area required for the strut will be  $200 \text{ mm}^2$ . The design will be based on the minimum slenderness ratio.

Choose RSA  $50 \times 50 \times 6 \times 4.47$  kg/m as a trial section.

Step 2 Determine combined ultimate axial loading Basic load cases:

> Dead load (DL) 6.96 kN (compression) Imposed load (IL) 8.36 kN (compression) Wind load (WL) 5.81 kN (compression) or 5.42 kN (tension)

### 5.5.3 Example 5.2a: Design the rafter of a roof truss

Choose the roof truss in Example 3.1 in Chapter 3. Select member number 1 (see SK 5/5).

By reference to Table 5.1, the most cost-effective option should be a T-section in Grade 50 steel. From inspection of the basic load table, it is evident that the maximum compression in the member is of the order of 120 kN. Assuming  $p_c = 120 \text{ N/mm}^2$ , the minimum area of section required is  $1000 \text{ mm}^2$ .

Choose  $102 \times 127 \times 13$  kg/m structural T-section in Grade 50 steel.

#### Step 2 Determine combined ultimate axial loading Basic load cases:







#### 5.5.6 Example 5.4: Design the corner column of a multistorey building



SK 5/8 Floor plan showing typical column and beam layout.

Design a corner column at the ground floor level in a simple beamcolumn construction of a multistorey building, where side sway is prevented by shear walls and plan bracing. The beams are carrying concrete floors. The main beams sit on very stiff brackets connected to the flanges of the columns. The secondary beams are connected to the web of the columns by web cleats. The storey height is 5 metres.

#### Step 1 Select type of strut and a trial size

Table 5.1 shows that a cost-effective option could be a UC in Grade 50 steel.

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From basic load cases it is seen that maximum axial compression is approximately 4000 kN. The minimum sectional area required, assuming  $p_c = 200 \text{ N/mm}^2$ , is given by:

$$A_{\rm min} = \frac{4000 \times 10^3}{200} = 20\,000\,\rm{mm^2}$$

Select UC  $305 \times 305 \times 158$  kg/m as a trial size in Grade 50 steel.

#### Determine combined ultimate axial loading Step 2

For simple construction it is not necessary to carry out analysis with patterned loading on the beams to find the maximum load on the column. Assume all beams are fully loaded.

Eccentricity of the main beam reaction to the centre of column = 100 mm + D/2 = 263.6 mm about the major axis of the column. (D = overall depth of column.)

Eccentricity of the secondary beam reaction = 100 mm (minimum to be allowed in the design).

The beams are not designed with partial fixity at the columns.

Assume that the column size is  $305 \times 305 \times 137$  kg/m at the first floor level. The column stiffnesses at the ground floor and first floor level are given by:



Assume that the upper roof stanchion is made from UB914  $\times$ 419  $\times$  388 kg/m. To get adequate end clearance for the crane, the minimum centre-to-centre distance between the lower roof stanchion and the crane stanchion is 2000 mm.

The compound column will be checked against only one load combination to show the procedure. There are several possible load combinations, with the basic loads as given in Table 4.1. Most of these conditions have to be properly investigated.

#### Step1 Select type of strut and trial sections

For a very heavy industrial building column select fabricated section in Grade 50 steel. It is assumed that the lacing will be spaced at about 2500 mm along the longitudinal axis of the compound stanchion.

 $\lambda_{\rm c} = L_{\rm c}/r_{\rm yy}$  should be kept below 50 for an individual component of the compound column.





## Chapter 6 Design of Ties

#### 6.1 PRINCIPAL ISSUES

- (1) The effective area of the section in tension.
- (2) The design strength of the material  $p_y$ .
- (3) The bending moments due to eccentric connections.
- (4) The reduced contribution in tension of unconnected legs of simple tension members like angles, channels and T-sections.
- (5) The effect of stress concentration around holes or discontinuities.
- (6) Compound tension members made up by lacing or batten.

#### 6.2 DESIGN BASIS

The effective area is determined by finding the net area of an element of a section (i.e. deducting the area of holes for connections) and multiplying by a correction factor to allow for some stress concentration effects. At or near the holes, the tensile stress in a purely tensile member may be allowed to go up to the ultimate stress. On this basis, the correction factor is higher in the case of Grade 43 steel because the ratio of tensile stress at the ultimate stress level to that at yield is higher in Grade 43 steel. This factor becomes 1 for Grade 55 steel. Such an increase in stress around holes is not allowed in simple tension members, where the effect of eccentric connection is neglected. The basis of finding the effective area in a simple tension member connected by one element of its section is by using the net area of its connected element and adding a proportion of the area of the unconnected element. For other types of tension members, full account of any eccentric connection must be taken. The capacity in tension of a member is simply its effective area multiplied by its design strength.

#### 6.3 COMBINED AXIAL TENSION AND BENDING MOMENT

#### 6.3.1 Principal issues

- (1) Axial capacity of the member in tension.
- (2) Plastic moment capacity of the section about both axes.
- (3) Lateral torsional buckling of member due to bending moment.

The axial capacity can be found, as usual, by multiplying the effective area by the design strength. The plastic moment of resistance depends on the section classification and the design strength. The lateral torsional buckling effects are much less pronounced when the member

.

is in tension, but, depending on the level of axial tension compared to its axial capacity, this effect may be severe if applied tension loads are small. The steel design code does not require checking of the effect of lateral torsional buckling when a member is under axial tension, but designers should use their own judgement when dealing with slender members with low axial tension and high bending moments. The residual compressive stress in the compression flange after allowing for axial tension may give rise to elastic instability owing to buckling.

#### 6.3.2 Design basis

Using a fully elastic approach the maximum tensile stress at a corner of the member subjected to biaxial bending and tension should not exceed the design strength  $p_y$ . This expressed in stress notation gives:

Dividing both sides by  $p_y$  and also expressing the stresses in terms of the applied direct tension (F), applied moments ( $M_x$  and  $M_y$ ), effective area ( $A_e$ ) and section moduli ( $Z_x$  and  $Z_y$ ), the equation can be rewritten in the form given below:

where F = applied direct tension

The plastic moment capacity of the section may be used instead of the elastic moment of resistance. Depending on the section classification and the design strength,  $M_{cx}$  and  $M_{cy}$  should replace  $p_y Z_x$ and  $p_y Z_y$  respectively. Therefore:

This modified equation is in the code BS 5950: Part 1, but this is only a local section capacity check and not a full member capacity check. The lateral torsional buckling effects of members with axial tension should be checked with moments alone, ignoring the axial tension which has a beneficial effect. The equivalent uniform moment factor m should be used to represent the effect of the variation of bending moment over

the whole length of the member. The unity equation of the member with moments only is given by:

The values of  $M_{rx}$  and  $M_{ry}$  are derived by interaction formulation based on the principles explained in Chapter 4. The constants  $Z_1$  and  $Z_2$  are based on experimental results. It should be borne in mind that this is only a local section capacity check and the overall member buckling is ignored.

#### 6.4 STEP-BY-STEP DESIGN OF MEMBERS IN TENSION

#### Step 1 Select type of tie and trial section

The guidance given for struts in Table 5.1 is also valid for ties. However, the star ratings are for general guidance and may vary from site to site. Use Grade 50 steel whenever possible; angles are difficult to obtain in higher grades of steel. Structural hollow sections used as ties cost substantially more than other rolled sections.

The trial section is best chosen by dividing the axial load by the design strength  $p_y$  to get a minimum area required, and then, by making an allowance for the holes for connection, an approximate

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area of section can be determined. Select from the published section tables a section which has an area closest to this area. When a combined moment and axial tension load is present, a further allowance has to be made in the area required for the trial section. Check that the member slenderness ratio does not fall below 350 where reversal of stress can occur due to wind.

#### Step 2 Determine ultimate axial tension

From analysis of basic load cases, find the combination which causes the maximum axial tension.


#### Step 3 Determine ultimate bending moments and shear forces

From analysis of basic load cases, find the various combinations of axial tensions with bending moments and shear forces. Use the load combination principle given in Table 4.1.

#### Step 4 Find moments due to eccentric connection

Except for angles, channels and T-sections designed as simple tension members, all other members should be designed with an allowance for eccentric connection.

#### Step 5 Find net area of an element of a tension member with fasteners



SK 6/1 Determination of net area from staggered holes in elements.

Net area  $A_n$  is gross area of the element  $A_g$  less the deduction for bolt holes.

(1) For holes in a row perpendicular to the line of action of the tensile force on the element the net area  $A_n$  is given by:

- g = the distance measured between the holes at right angles to the direction of the tensile load. For an angle with holes on both legs, the gauge length g may be taken as the sum of the back marks less the leg thickness.
- Step 6 Determine effective area of an element of a section with fasteners The code allows the stress across the net area to go beyond yield to approach the ultimate tensile strength. Therefore, to find the effective area from the net area, an increase of the net area may be allowed by multiplying it by a factor. The ratio of ultimate strength to yield strength is higher for lower grades of steel and therefore this factor is higher for lower grades of steel as given in Table 6.1.






ANGLE CONNECTED BY ONE LEG

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eccentricity, correction factors are introduced. The net area of the elements after deduction of holes is used to find the effective area for simple members. Do not apply the factor  $K_e$  to these elements.

- *Note:* Double angles back to back should be separated by a distance not exceeding the aggregate thickness of the legs. Solid packing pieces should be used when they are designed as interconnected.

## Step 12 Design of lacing or batten system

General rules: lacing

- (1) Lacing should not vary in section or inclination throughout the length of the member.
- (2) Inclination of the lacing should be between  $40^{\circ}$  and  $70^{\circ}$  to the axis of the member.
- (3) Lacing can be double intersection (cross) or single intersection. Single intersection lacing should not be opposed in direction on opposite faces of the main members. This will give rise to torsion in the member.
- (4) Tie panels in the form of battens should be provided at the ends of the lacing system.
- (5) Slenderness ratio  $\lambda_c = L_c/r_y$  should not be greater than 80 for individual main members connected by the lacing, where  $L_c$  (effective length) will be the length between the points of intersection of the lacing with the main members and  $r_y$  is the radius of gyration of the main members about the minor axis.

#### General rules: batten

- (1) The joints between the main components and the battens must be rigid. Use welded connection or connection by at least two bolts along the axis of the main member on each main member.
- (2) Battens should be provided opposite each other in each plane at the ends of the members and at the points of lateral restraint.
- (3) Intermediate battens on opposite faces of main members should be uniformly spaced throughout the length of the member.
- (4) The maximum slenderness ratio  $\lambda_c$  of the main member between end welds or the end fastener of adjacent battens should not exceed 80.
- (5) The thickness of the plate used as battens should not be less than  $\frac{1}{50}$  of the minimum distance between welds or fasteners on the batten connecting the main members.
- (6) The slenderness ratio of the batten should not be less than 180, where the length of the batten is taken as the minimum distance between welds or fasteners on the batten connecting the main members.
- (7) Width of the end battens should not be less than the distance between the centroids of the main components.
- (8) Width of the intermediate battens should not be less than half the distance between the centroids of the main components.
- (9) Width of any batten should not be less than twice the width of the narrower connected element of the main members.

The transverse shear force acting parallel to the planes of lacing or batten,  $V_1$  is the greater of  $V_1$  or  $V_2$ , as given by:

 $V_1 = 1\% F; V_2 = V_s$ 

where F = the ultimate maximum axial tensile force in the compound member

 $V_s$  = the maximum ultimate transverse shear in a direction parallel to the planes of the lacing or battens

The lacing bar should be checked for an axial tension or compression equal to  $N_{\rm L}$  given by:

- where J = number of lacing bars cut by a plane perpendicular to the axis of the member
  - $\phi$  = angle of inclination of the lacing bars to the axis of the member

The capacity of lacing bar in compression  $P_{LC}$  is given by:

where  $A_{g} = \text{gross cross-sectional area of lacing bar}$ 

 $p_c$  = compressive strength, which may be obtained from Table 27(c) of BS 5950: Part 1 corresponding to the slenderness ratio of the lacing bar and its design strength  $p_y$  Note: If the lacing system is connected to the main member by one fastener only, then the capacity  $P_{LC}$  should be multiplied by 0.8.



#### 6.5 WORKED EXAMPLES

6.5.1 Example 6.1: Design the main tie of the roof truss in Example 3.1



SK 6/3 Roof truss of Example 3.1.

Basic load cases for member 9:

Dead load = 32.81 kN (tension) Imposed load = 39.38 kN (tension) Wind load = 25.45 kN (tension)

#### Step 1 Select type of tie and trial section

Refer to Table 5.1, where some guidance is given about the choice of type of section. An angle section in Grade 43 steel could be the most cost-effective solution. The maximum tension in the member is of the order of 117 kN, so the minimum area of section required =  $(117 \times 10^3)/275 = 425 \text{ mm}^2$ .

There is no reversal of stress in any part of the tie in the truss and therefore there is no limitation of the slenderness ratio of the member. Try RSA  $75 \times 50 \times 6 \times 5.65$  kg/m in Grade 43 steel with area of section equal to 719 mm<sup>2</sup>.

#### Step 2 Determine ultimate axial tension

Combination 1: 1.4 (dead load) + 1.6 (imposed load) =  $(1.4 \times 32.81) + (1.6 \times 39.38) = 108.9 \text{ kN}$ Combination 2: 1.2 (dead load) + 1.2 (imposed load) + 1.2 (wind load) =  $(1.2 \times 32.81) + (1.2 \times 39.38) + (1.2 \times 25.45)$ = 117.2 kN Combination 3: 1.4 (dead load) + 1.4 (wind load)

Step 4 Determine moments due to eccentric connection Not required for angles, channels and T-section used as simple tension members.

## Step 5 Determine net area of an element of a section with fasteners

Assume one bolt hole of diameter 22 mm for an M20 Grade 4.6 bolt of capacity 39.2 kN in the 6 mm thick leg of the angle. This capacity is enough for all internal members connecting to the tie.

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

Steps 9, 10, 11 and 12 are not required because there is no bending in the member.

# 6.5.2 Example 6.2: Design the tie of a 75 m span latticed girder for the roof of an aircraft hangar

The spacing of the nodes in the girder is 5 m and the girder is 4.5 m deep. A runway beam is connected to the tie half-way between the nodes. The capacity of the hoist is 2 tonnes.





Basic loads: Dead load = 612 kN (tension) Imposed load = 940 kN (tension) Wind load = 586 kN (tension) and 513 kN (compression)

Under the worst adverse loading condition the tie may suffer reversal of stress. The tie is assumed continuous.

Bending moment due to runway beam and hoist: = 29 kNm (sagging) at midpoint between nodes = 13.4 kNm (hogging) at the nodes

#### Step 1 Select type of tie and a trial section

Refer to Table 5.1. Compound channels in Grade 50 steel should be the most cost-effective solution. From inspection of basic loads, the maximum load in tension is of the order of 2500 kN. Assuming  $p_y = 355 \text{ N/mm}^2$ , the area of section required is given by:

$$A_{\rm min} = \frac{2500 \times 10^3}{355} = 7050 \,\rm{mm^2}$$

Select two channels  $254 \times 89 \times 35.74$  kg/m battened. The area of each channel is 4550 mm<sup>2</sup>. The plastic moment capacity of each channel is given by:


$$S_x p_y = 414 \times 355 \times 10^{-3} = 147 \,\mathrm{kNm}$$

This is well in excess of the requirement.

Because there is a possible reversal of stress due to wind, the maximum slenderness ratio must be below 350. Given  $L = 5000 \,\mathrm{mm}$  and  $r_{xx} = 98.8 \,\mathrm{mm}$ , which is the minimum for the combined section.

 $\therefore \lambda_{\text{max}} = \frac{L}{r_{\text{xx}}} = 50.6 < 350 \text{ (Satisfied)}$ 

The channels are placed face to face as shown in SK 6/5. The backto-back distance is kept the same as the depth of the vertical compression member in the latticed girder, which is 203 mm.

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#### Step 13 Local capacity check

At the attachment of the runway beam to the flange of the channel, a local capacity check should be carried out. The tensile stress in the bottom flange of the channel due to combined axial tension and bending is very close to the design strength  $p_y$ . If vertical stiffeners are provided in the channel at the point of attachment of the runway beam, then further checks are not necessary.

## Chapter 7 Design of Beams

#### 7.1 PRINCIPAL ISSUES

The principal issues governing the design of beams are as follows:

- (1) The section capacity at the point of maximum moment is the first criterion to be investigated. This section capacity depends on the design strength of the material, the geometry of the section and the slenderness of the elements in the section. This section capacity also depends on the shear force that is acting simultaneously.
- (2) Lateral torsional buckling of the compression flange as a whole is another very important consideration in the design of a beam. This relates to the degree of restraint of the compressive flange, the distribution of bending moment along the length of the member, the slenderness ratio of the member about the minor axis, the torsional index of the section as a whole, the buckling parameter of the section and the slenderness factor of the compression flange relative to the tension flange.
- (3) Local buckling of the compression flange, where the flange could buckle locally due to the application of a concentrated load, is another major issue. This may cause failure in the event of a sudden change in the line of action of compressive force in the flange. This phenomenon is accompanied by web compression buckling. Web stiffeners are needed to overcome this problem.
- (4) Similarly, local failure of the web due to buckling, compression, crushing or stress concentrations around openings may occur and web stiffeners are also required to overcome these problems.
- (5) Beams have to be checked for excessive deflection. It is necessary to limit deflection for user comfort, aesthetics and protection of secondary attachments. Even if a small amount of compressive force is present, the secondary effect of this force can be amplified several times by large in-plane deflections, causing failure.

#### 7.2 DESIGN BASIS

#### 7.2.1 Local capacity

This check is carried out to find if the maximum bending moment at any section is within the plastic moment of resistance of the section. An important factor which governs the local capacity is the slenderness of the elements in the cross-section. The section is normally made of plate elements. The thickness of the plate in the elements determines if the failure will occur at or before the full plastic moment of resistance is reached. The full plastic moment of resistance is reached when the stress at every part of the section reaches the design strength  $p_y$ . The fundamental issues here are the overhangs of flanges from the web and the depth to thickness ratio of the web.

There are factors which influence the local buckling of the elements in a cross-section, namely the manufacturing process (i.e. rolled or welded), the depth of neutral axis, the material strength and the presence of high shear load at the section.

The classification of sections in BS 5950: Part 1 addresses most of the issues mentioned above. The sections are classified as plastic, compact, semi-compact and slender. The basis of their classification is by the slenderness of their constituent elements. The slenderness is measured as the ratio of the longest dimension over the shortest dimension. A factor relating to the material strength is also introduced. It is proportional to the inverse of the square root of the design strength, which means that the Grade 43 materials have a factor of unity. The higher the design strength, the higher the probability that the whole section will not become fully plastic and this is reflected in the limitation on the slenderness ratio. Because of the presence of residual stresses and, also, possible geometric irregularities, welded built-up sections suffer from a further reduction in the limiting ratios for compactness.

**Class 1 plastic** sections are defined as sections in which a plastic hinge can form with full hinge rotation capability. In a plastic analysis of a rigid redundant frame, plastic hinges are allowed to form progressively as incremental load is applied. The first hinge to form in the structure must have sufficient rotational ductility to allow subsequent hinges to form in the structure. So, for plastic analysis of a structure the section must be class 1. These sections have local capacity such that the full design strength  $p_y$  can develop at all points in the section, resulting in a plastic moment of resistance equal to  $M_{cx} = S_x p_y$ , where  $S_x$  is the plastic modulus of the section.

**Class 2 compact** sections are similar to class 1 sections in all respects except that the full rotational ductility may not be available. Plastic analysis may not be valid using a member with compact section. The design strength  $p_y$  may develop at all points in the cross-section, but, very soon after, a collapse mechanism may form with slightly more rotation resulting in a considerable degradation of rotational stiffness. The plastic moment of resistance for these sections may also be taken as  $M_{cx} = S_x p_y$ , as in class 1.

Class 3 semi-compact sections show only partial plastic behaviour, depending on the slenderness of the elements. The compression

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flange and/or the web can be slender when compared to the limiting values given in Table 7 of BS 5950: Part 1. The design strength may be achieved at the extreme fibres but the rest of the section may not see full  $p_y$  before failure occurs by local buckling of the slender element. The moment capacity of the section is taken as  $M_{cx} = Z_x p_y$ , where  $Z_x$  is the elastic modulus of the section.

Class 4 slender sections may be governed more by local buckling than the design strength  $p_y$ . The design strength has to be reduced to accommodate this deficiency. Clause 3.6 and Table 8 of BS 5950: Part 1 give rules to find the reduced design strength. The moment capacity is take as  $M_{cx} = Z_x p_y$  where  $p_y$  is the reduced value of the design strength of the slender element.

For semi-compact and slender sections the stress distribution in the web is triangular, whereas for plastic and compact sections the stress distribution is rectangular at the ultimate limit state.

#### 7.2.2 Lateral torsional buckling

In the case of a column, failure may take place suddenly at the critical axial compression due to elastic instability. Similarly, a beam loaded in the plane of its web may fail at the elastic critical load by deflecting sideways and by twisting about its longitudinal axis. It can be shown by theoretical analysis that the elastic critical load for failure of the beam depends on the boundary conditions at the supports, the unrestrained length of the compression flange, the torsional index of the section of the beam, the shape of the bending moment diagram and the type of loading. Some other factors which are equally important and cannot be properly accounted for in the theoretical analysis are the initial out-of-correctness of the geometry of the beam, the residual stresses in the beam as a result of the manufacturing process, the eccentricity of applied loading etc. The formulas in the BS 5950 code of practice for checking the lateral torsional buckling of a beam are based on theoretical analysis as well as laboratory testing, and take into account the effects of all other factors contributing to elastic instability.

The check for lateral torsional buckling of a beam includes finding the equivalent slenderness  $\lambda_{LT}$ , which is equal to the minor axis slenderness  $\lambda$  of the beam multiplied by the appropriate correction factors. These correction factors include u and v, which are functions of the geometry of the section of the beam, and n, a slenderness correction factor which depends on the nature of loading on the beam. Conservatively, this n may be taken as equal to 1.

This means that a beam with a value of  $\sqrt{(M_P/M_E)} \le 0.4$  may be designed without consideration of lateral torsional buckling effects. Also, if the lateral restraints of the compression flange of the beam are designed in such a way that  $\lambda_{LT}$  does not exceed  $\lambda_{L0}$ , then the lateral torsional buckling effects can again be ignored.

#### 7.2.3 Buckling of web

The behaviour of the solid web in shear is similar to that of openweb latticed girders in which distinct lines of compression and tension diagonal members are used to carry the vertical shear force. Web buckling due to vertical shear occurs in thin webs along lines of compressive stress acting diagonally within the web. Assuming a is the spacing of transverse stiffener and d is the web depth, as the aspect ratio (a/d) increases, the length of the diagonal compressive strut increases. This results in a decrease of the elastic critical load along the diagonal in compression. The elastic critical shear stress derived from elastic theory is expressed as follows:

#### 7.2.4 Tension-field action in thin webs

It has been shown experimentally that the shear buckling resistance of thin webs can be considerably improved if properly designed transverse stiffeners are used and the flanges are capable of carrying an additional force due to tension-field action. The flanges must be anchored properly at the ends to allow the tension-field action to develop. The tension-field action in solid webs of beams may be used for all beams except gantry girders. The rules of detailing as specified in BS 5950: Part 1 should be adhered to.





#### Step 3 Determine internal forces

Determine bending moment for relevant load combinations. Determine shear force for relevant load combinations. Find maximum coacting direct loads with bending moments.

# Step 4 Select trial section and carry out section classification

Rules for choice of section with equal flanges and normal loads:

- (1) When the compression flange is fully restrained along its length, choose a section from the Steelwork Design Guide to BS 5950: Part 1 (pages 128 to 133 for Grade 43 steel; pages 256 to 261 for Grade 50) if using UB sections. Use a section with  $M_{cx}$  greater than the maximum applied moment M.
- (2) When the compression flange is not fully restrained laterally and the beam is loaded between lateral restraints, use the equivalent slenderness method. Find n from Table 15 or 16 of BS 5950: Part 1. Choose a section from the Steelwork Design Guide to BS 5950: Part 1 using appropriate n,  $L_e$  and grade of steel such that the buckling resistance moment  $M_b$  is greater than the maximum applied moment M. In this case the equivalent uniform moment factor m is taken as equal to 1.





### Step 12 Member moment capacity (lateral torsional buckling)

Destabilising load is one which is applied to the top flange of a beam at a point which is not laterally braced or restrained, and the load and the flange are both free to deflect laterally because the top flange is not laterally and rotationally restrained. Lateral restraint of the compression flange of a beam becomes effective only when the restraint is connected to an appropriate bracing system which transfers the load to the support of the structure. *Torsional restraint* effectively holds the flanges of the beam in position relative to each other.

### Determination of effective lengths

(1) For beams with no lateral restraint in span the effective length  $L_{\rm E}$  will be as shown in Table 7.2.













If it is necessary to include the effective section of the web in the calculation of the buckling strength of the bearing stiffener, then the centre of gravity of the equivalent effective section should be found and the eccentricity of the reaction  $R_L$  from the centre of gravity of the effective section along the centre-line of web should be treated as an applied moment on the section. The procedure of analysis is as follows:

- Design as a column in simple construction as per Clause 4.7.7 of BS 5950: Part 1.
- Determine the applied moment M on the effective section of the bearing stiffener =  $R_L e$  (where e is the eccentricity of reaction  $R_L$  from the centre of gravity of effective section along the centre-line of web). See SK 7/14.

- Determine the plastic modulus  $S_x$  of the effective section about the equal area axis perpendicular to the web.

# Step 18 Bearing stiffeners using tension-field action

Use of transverse stiffeners results in an increase in shear buckling resistance  $V_{cr}$  of the web due to decreased values of the a/d ratio. The transverse web stiffeners also increase the shear strength of web due to the development of tension field action. If a panel of web between transverse stiffeners buckles in shear due to the diagonal compressive stress, then the tension field develops along the other diagonal to carry the additional shear force.

In SK 7/15 the solid web girder is shown to behave like a typical N-truss with tension diagonals. Prior to the buckling of the compression diagonal, equal compressive and tensile principal stresses develop in the plane of the web. The tension field appears after the buckling along the compression diagonal. The progressive shortening along the compression diagonal results in plastic hinge formation in the flanges.

The shear buckling resistance  $V_b$  is composed of the basic shear strength  $q_b$ , which combines the buckling strength  $q_{cr}$  and the postbuckling strength due to tension-field action. The elastic critical shear stress of the panel  $a \times d$  is called  $q_{cr}$ . The shear buckling resistance also has a component based on the flange-dependent shear stress  $q_f$ . The flanges are required to carry the end anchor forces of the tension diagonal after development of tension-field action. The flanges must have some spare capacity to carry this anchoring force in addition to the stresses due to moment and axial load. Hence this flangedependent shear strength is multiplied by a factor ( $\sqrt{K_f}$ ) to allow for the state of stress in the flange due to the bending moment and axial load present at the point of interest. The smaller flange should be considered to determine the state of stress.






Intermediate panels (B and C) are designed by using tension-field action; the end panel (A) is not. The shear force  $F_v$  in the end panel is limited to the shear buckling resistance  $V_{cr}$  of the panel, which depends on the spacing of stiffeners in the end panel. The end panel is designed as a vertical beam between the two flanges resisting the shear  $R_{tf}$  and bending moment  $M_{tf}$ .




(a) PART ELEVATION OF GIRDER








(c) CASE 1: Panel A not designed by tension-field action Panel B,C etc. designed by tension-field action

Select the stiffener spacing (a) for the end panel such that a/d for the end panel closest to the support gives  $q_{cr}$  (from Table 21 of BS 5950: Part 1) greater than or equal to the shear stress  $f_{v}$ .

Note:  $R_{tf}$  and  $M_{tf}$  are obtained for the panel which is designed using tension-field action. To calculate  $R_{tf}$  and  $M_{tf}$  use the values of a/d for that panel.

The flanges of the vertical beam spanning between the flanges of the girder are the two vertical stiffeners bounding panel A. The bending moment  $M_{\rm tf}$  is resisted by these two stiffeners acting as flanges at a lever arm equal to a, the spacing of the stiffeners. Therefore, the additional vertical forces in the stiffeners =  $M_{\rm tf}/a$ .

Follow Step 17 completely but instead of  $R_L$  use  $(R_L + M_{tf}/a)$ .

Check that end panel A has adequate capacity for horizontal shear  $R_{tf}$ . To check the shear capacity of the vertical beam the following procedure should be used.

- Determine a/t ratio of the vertical beam where the depth of the vertical beam is the spacing a of the stiffener in end panel A.
- If this ratio is greater than 63ε, the web is classed as slender and Tables 21(a) to (d) of BS 5950: Part 1 can then be used to find q<sub>cr</sub>.
- Determine  $V_{cr} = q_{cr}at$  and check that  $V_{cr} \ge R_{tf}$ . Note that the depth of this beam is the spacing *a* of the stiffeners in end panel A.
- If the web of the vertical beam is not slender then check  $0.6p_{yw}ta \ge R_{tf}$ , where a is the spacing of the stiffeners in the end panel A.

#### Case 2

Intermediate panels (B and C) and the end panel (A) are designed using tension-field action and a single bearing stiffener.

The single end bearing stiffener in this case has to resist the tensionfield force of end panel A. This stiffener, spanning vertically between the flanges, has to resist the vertical end reaction  $R_{\rm L}$  of the girder as axial compression, a bending moment equal to  $\frac{2}{3}M_{\rm tf}$  about the vertical axis and a horizontal shear force equal to  $R_{\rm tf}$ .

- Design as a column in simple construction as per Clause 4.7.7 of BS 5950: Part 1.
- Determine applied moment M on the effective section of bearing stiffener =  $R_L e$  (where e is the eccentricity of reaction  $R_L$  from the centre of gravity of effective section along the longitudinal axis of the beam when the effective section of the bearing stiffener includes 20 times the thickness of the web).
- Determine plastic modulus  $S_x$  of the effective section about the equal area axis perpendicular to the web.
- Determine effective slenderness  $\lambda_{LT} = 0.5(L_s/r_{sc})$  (where  $L_s$  is the length of the bearing stiffener and  $r_{sc}$  is the radius of gyration about the minor axis of the effective section of the stiffener).
- Determine the bending strength  $p_b$  from Table 12 of BS 5950: Part 1 using  $\lambda_{LT}$  and the design strength  $p_y$ .
- Determine  $M_b = S_x p_b$ .

• Check the unity ratio: 
$$\frac{R_{\rm L}}{P_{\rm x}} + \frac{M + \frac{2}{3}M_{\rm tf}}{M_{\rm b}} \le 1.0.$$

Determine  $P_x$  according to method described in Step 17.

Conservatively the effective section of the bearing stiffener may not include the contribution from 20 times the thickness of web along the longitudinal axis of the beam. In that case the term M vanishes from the unity equation.

Check that the bearing stiffener has adequate shear capacity against horizontal shear  $R_{tf}: 0.6p_{yw}(2b_s t_s) \ge R_{tf}$ .

*Note:* The width and the thickness of the bearing stiffener should not exceed those of the smaller and thinner flange of the beam. In practice, a single bearing stiffener designed using tension-field action becomes very thick and uneconomical.

#### Case 3

Intermediate panels (B and C) and the end panel (A) are designed using tension-field action and also using a pair of end stiffeners spaced e apart.

In this case a bearing stiffener is placed in line with the centre-line of the bearing and the web is allowed to project beyond the centre-line of the bearing by a distance e, where the end post is located. The end post and the bearing stiffener jointly form the vertical beam which carries the anchorage force  $H_q$  from tension-field action. This system requires the availability of space beyond the centre-line of the bearing for the web to project, and in most practical applications it becomes difficult to accommodate.

The vertical beam has to resist the horizontal shear  $R_{tf}$  and the moment  $M_{tf}$  resulting from tension-field action. The bearing reaction  $R_L$  is resisted by the bearing stiffener. The length of web equal to e projecting over the bearing resists the horizontal shear  $R_{tf}$ . To check the shear capacity of the vertical beam the following procedure should be used.

- Determine the e/t ratio of the vertical beam where the depth of the vertical beam is the spacing e of the bearing stiffener and the end post.
- If this ratio is greater than  $63\varepsilon$ , the web is classed as slender and Tables 21(a) to (d) of BS 5950: Part 1 can then be used to find  $q_{\rm cr}$ .
- Determine  $V_{cr} = q_{cr}et$  and check that  $V_{cr} \ge R_{tf}$ . Note that the depth of this beam is the spacing e of the end posts.
- If the web of the vertical beam is not slender then check  $0.6p_{yw}te \ge R_{tf}$ , where e is the spacing of bearing stiffener and the end post (see SK 7/15),  $p_{yw}$  is the design strength of the web and t is the thickness of the web.

The moment  $M_{tf}$  is resisted by the vertical beam, with flanges as the bearing stiffener and the end post spaced at a lever arm equal to e.

#### Design of end post

The width of the end post  $b_e$  should be taken as equal to the actual  $b_e$  or  $13t_e\sqrt{(275/p_y)}$  (whichever is the smaller).

 $t_e =$  thickness of end post

 $b_{\rm s}$  = width of bearing stiffener

 $t_{\rm s}$  = thickness of bearing stiffener

t =thickness of web

The vertical end beam has width of flanges equal to  $2b_e + t$  and  $2b_s + t$  and the depth of web is e. The procedure for determining the buckling moment of resistance of this vertical beam is as follows.

- Determine the vertical equal area axis of this beam and determine the plastic modulus  $S_x$  of the section of the vertical beam about the equal area axis.
- Determine the section area  $A_s$  of this vertical beam and determine the moment of inertia  $I_s$  of the vertical beam section about the minor axis, which is horizontal through the centre-line of the web along the longitudinal axis of the beam.
- $A_s = 2(b_e + b_s) + et$  and  $I_s = [(2b_e + t)^3 t_e + (2b_s + t)^3 t_s + et^3]/12$ .
- Determine the radius of gyration  $r_s = \sqrt{(I_s/A_s)}$ .
- Determine the slenderness ratio of the vertical beam =  $\lambda = L_s/r_s$ , where  $L_s$  is the length of the stiffener.

• Determine 
$$N = \frac{(2b_e + t)^3 t_e}{(2b_e + t)^3 t_e + (2b_s + t)^3 t_s}$$
.

- Determine  $x = e/t_e$  or  $e/t_s$  (whichever is the smaller).
- Determine  $\lambda/x$  and, using the value of N, find the slenderness factor v from Table 14 of BS 5950: Part 1.
- Determine the equivalent slenderness  $\lambda_{LT} = nuv\lambda$ , where n and u may be taken equal to 1.0.
- Using  $\lambda_{LT}$  and the design strength  $p_y$  find the bending strength  $p_b$  from Table 12 of BS 5950: Part 1.
- Determine the buckling resistance moment  $M_b = S_x p_b$ .
- Check  $M_{\rm tf} \leq M_{\rm b}$ .













The plate girder will be used in a sports stadium where the columns are spaced at 24 m centres. The secondary beams carrying the seats for the spectators are assumed to be resting on the top flange of the plate girders. The secondary beams are at 6m centres. The girder is





It has been found in the first method that a spacing of 1800 mm to the first stiffener from the bearing is adequate for web buckling without using tension-field action. The next stiffener is under the secondary beam 6m from the bearing. The spacing between the first and the second stiffener in the web is 6 - 1.8 = 4.2 m. This gives:











PART ELEVATION AT SUPPORT



Since bearing stiffeners are not required, as established in Step 14, the torsional restraint at the support may be provided by effectively holding both flanges laterally in position by external means. This is achieved by connecting the top flange to the roof leg of the stanchion. The top flange has to be restrained laterally to resist the horizontal end reaction due to surge or crabbing. The maximum horizontal reaction at the support due to horizontal loading on the girder from the crane should be increased by a force equal to 1% of the maximum flange force due to vertical loading to become effective in restraining torsion at the support. The bottom flange is held in position by direct bolted connection to the bracket on the column as shown in SK 7/52 (see Clause 4.3.3 of BS 5950: Part 1).

## 7.5 BEAMS SUBJECT TO TORSION

## General

If the resultant shear force in a section passes through the shear centre of the section, then there is no torsion induced. A section symmetrical about both of the principal axes has the centroid and the shear centre coincidental. The shear centre of a channel section lies on the X-X axis about which the section is symmetrical.

### .5.1 Torsional resistance

The torsion is resisted by the section in two different ways, i.e. uniform torsion and warping torsion. When the rate of change of angle of twist is constant along the length of a member, then uniform torsion occurs. Warping results in bending stresses in the flanges of an open section like a universal beam. Warping in that section gives rise to equal and opposite shear parallel to the two flanges of the UB. The section resists torsion by the sum of the resistances of uniform and warping torsion.

The torsional rigidity relating to uniform torsion is GJ; the warping rigidity is EH.

E = elastic modulus H = warping constant G = shear modulus J = torsional constant

Closed sections have a very large torsional rigidity GJ compared to warping rigidity EH and hence they resist torque essentially by uniform torsion. The total torsional resistance at any point in a beam  $T_r$ is given by:

The angle of twist  $\phi$  due to torsion is amplified by the presence of bending moment. This induces additional warping moments in the flanges and additional torsional shears. This additional minor axis bending  $M_{yt}$ is proportional to the angle of twist  $\phi$ . 





## Chapter 8 Design of Composite Beams and Columns

## 8.1 COMPOSITE BEAMS

## 8.1.1 Principal issues

The principal issues governing the design of composite beams are as follows.

- (1) The interface between the concrete and the steel beam is capable of transmitting shear such that the concrete and the steel beam act compositely as one section. The shear connectors have to be designed in such a manner that this condition is achieved.
- (2) At the construction stage, the steel beams should be strong enough to carry the weight of wet concrete, construction-imposed load and some concentrated plant load, including any shuttering or permanent formwork used. The steel beams may be propped during the construction stage to avoid carrying these loads.

- (3) The composite plastic stress state will be dependent on the location of the plastic neutral axis. This may necessitate some lengthy computations depending on whether the neutral axis is in the concrete, in the flange, or in the web of the steel beam.
- (4) The compression flange of the steel beam may be considered as effectively restrained in a simply supported beam by the hardened concrete, but adequate measures have to be considered at the construction stage when the concrete is wet. The horizontal liquid thrust of the concrete on the side shutters could be quite considerable.
- (5) The effective width of the concrete slab in compression acting compositely with the steel beam requires consideration.
- (6) The mechanism of shear transfer between the concrete and the steel beam, and also within the concrete slab itself (longitudinally along the beam), should be investigated.
- (7) Care should be taken to limit the d/t ratio of the web in such a fashion as to get a plastic section for the development of full plastic moment of resistance of the composite cross-section. The classification of the web will depend on the location of the neutral axis.
- (8) At the serviceability limit state the calculations of deflection will require the considerations of propped or unpropped construction, cracked or uncracked moment of inertia, shrinkage and creep of the concrete, and full or partial interaction of shear studs.
- (9) The method of analysis of continuous beams dictates the percentage of redistribution of support moment to the span. This percentage will depend on whether a gross uncracked section or a cracked section is used in the analysis, and also whether the compactness of the steel section would allow ductile plastic behaviour.


## 8.1.2 Design basis

Elastic analysis of simple beams and continuous beams is carried out with cracked or uncracked moment of inertia of the section. The elastic analysis results are used to determine deflection, vibration characteristics and concrete serviceability limit states, such as crack widths. During construction the unpropped steel section will carry the weight of the concrete and the locked-in stresses influence the serviceability limit state. Creep and shrinkage also affect the serviceability limit state.


To carry out the analysis it is necessary to find the section properties. For a continuous beam, the section properties change quite dramatically from midspan, where the concrete flange is in compression, to the supports, where the concrete flange is in tension. At the supports, the concrete flange in tension is ignored.

## 8.1.3 Effective breadth

The concept of effective breadth of the concrete slab in compression comes from the recognition of 'shear lag' effects. Beyond a certain

distance from the web of a beam, the compressive flange is considered ineffective and hence is ignored in the calculations. The determination of the effective width is totally empirical and has no theoretical basis. The effective breadth is dependent on the type of loading, the support conditions and the location of the section in relation to the supports.


An approximate method of finding this value is given in BS 5950: Part 3.1. The effective breadth in the code is a factor of the length  $L_Z$  between adjacent points of zero moment or points of contraflexure. For a simply supported beam  $L_Z$  is equal to the span; for a continuous beam the proportions of span to be used for finding the effective breadth are given in SK 8/2.

#### 8.1.4 Modular ratio

This is another important factor which is required in order to determine the condition of stresses in a composite beam under the serviceability limit state. The modular ratio is dependent on several factors, including the age of concrete at loading, stress state, length of time of applied loading etc. The most important influence on modular ratio is from creep of the concrete under sustained loading, and, therefore, the British Standard code formula allows for a correction of the modular ratio, depending on the ratio of the short- and long-term loads.

## 8.1.5 Transformed section: elastic section properties

In elastic analysis of the section properties the concrete is converted into equivalent areas of steel by dividing the area of the concrete by an appropriate modular ratio. The section then becomes a compound steel section. The neutral axis will lie at the centre of gravity of the compound section where it can also be proved that the tensile and the compressive forces on either side of the neutral axis will be equal when a bending moment is applied, assuming that the plane section remains plane before and after bending. The moment of inertia of the compound section is the sum of moments of inertia of the component parts about their own centroidal axis plus their areas multiplied by the square of the distance of their centroidal axes from the compound section neutral axis. There can be two different cases of section stress distribution under elastic conditions. The neutral axis may lie in the steel section when the section properties are classed as uncracked. When the neutral axis lies in the concrete flange, the concrete below the neutral axis is deemed cracked and is ignored in the calculation of section properties. The derivation of the formulae for the neutral axis and moment of inertia is shown below. Tables 8.1 and 8.2 give values of the section properties for different locations of the neutral axis.



## 8.1.7 Plastic section properties

The fundamental assumption in plastic analysis is that the strain in the steel beam is high enough to allow full plastic capacity to develop, i.e. the stress block is rectangular with design strength  $p_{y}$ . But this depends on the compactness of the web. If the web of the steel beam is non-compact then the stress block is not rectangular because web buckling at much lower rotation of the section prevents the design strength from being achieved in all parts of the section. There are two different methods of finding the plastic section properties, one with a full plastic rectangular stress block for compact webs and another with triangular stress distribution, as in elastic analysis for non-compact webs. The concrete strain is limited to 0.0035 which results in a rectangular stress block with an average stress of  $0.45f_{cu}$ . The plastic analysis is also carried out for two loading conditions, i.e. sagging and hogging moments. For hogging moments the concrete is totally ignored, as in a reinforced concrete analysis, but any tensile reinforcement provided for the purpose of the design of the composite beam may be taken into account provided it lies within the effective width of the flange. The compressive reinforcement in the concrete should generally be ignored in the computations because they are not normally tied in with the steel beam by links going round them to prevent buckling under load.

It should be borne in mind that the plastic analysis is independent of the construction sequence (i.e. propped or unpropped) because at the plastic state the total load is resisted by a total internal assumed stress block, and the effects of shrinkage, creep and locked-in stresses due to the construction sequence do not influence this analysis.

In composite construction, steel decking is generally used. The depth of this decking, when running perpendicular to the beam, is ignored in the calculation. For a solid slab or a slab with participating precast concrete permanent formwork, the total depth of the concrete construction should be taken into consideration. The following derivation of the plastic moment of resistance for different conditions of loading illustrates the principle. For the benefit of designers the formulae are presented in a tabular form for easy reference and application – see Tables 8.3 and 8.4 for plastic moment capacities under different conditions of loading, geometric proportions and slenderness of the elements.







### 8.1.8 Redistribution of support moments


If a frame or a continuous beam analysis is carried out assuming a uniform uncracked moment of inertia based on the section at the midspan of the beam, there is a large overestimation of stiffness at the supports and consequently the support negative moments are large. The redistribution of moment is allowed from the support to the midspan but any redistribution means that a plastic hinge is allowed to form and this hinge must have adequate rotational ductility. For slender sections the rotational ductility is absent; for plastic sections it is assured. Therefore, depending on the initial method of analysis using a cracked or uncracked moment of inertia, and also depending on the classification of the steel beam, various maximum percentages of redistribution may be allowed. Redistribution of moments will inevitably mean a reduction of robustness for serviceability and the deflection or crack control criteria may govern the design. Up to 50% redistribution may be allowed for a special category of composite



beam where only nominal reinforcement is provided in the concrete slab and this reinforcement is not taken into account for the determination of plastic moment capacity for negative moments. In this case, the steel beam should be class 1 plastic. Table 8.5 gives the maximum redistribution percentages.

### 8.1.9 Shear connection






Shear connection is generally by studs. These studs may come readywelded on the beam from the shops or they can be shot fired after erection of the beams. The most modern method is to attach the studs by through-deck welding. The characteristic strengths of standard shear connectors are given in Table 5 of BS 5950: Part 3.1. The strength is dependent on the strength of concrete and the diameter of the stud, assuming a nominal length of the stud. The head of the stud is required to prevent uplift. Failure by shear is essentially brittle in nature. To allow for a level of ductility and also to include a measure of the material factor, the design strength of the shear connector is taken as 80% when the concrete is in compression and 60% when the concrete is in tension. The adequacy of shear connectors must be checked at locations of high shear under concentrated loads, at the points of sudden change in the cross-section of the beam, at numerous points on the tapered section of the beam and also frequently on the span if the concrete flange is large. Normally, however, only two checks are made for the adequacy of shear connectors – one at midspan for positive moment and one at the support for negative moment.

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Partial shear connection is sometimes used to economise on construction costs. This involves reducing the number of shear connectors required for positive moments only. Table 8.3 gives the plastic moment capacities for partial shear connection where the whole compressive flange load of the concrete cannot be transferred by the connectors, and the shear connector resistance  $R_q$  replaces the compressive flange force  $R_c$  or steel beam tensile force  $R_s$ , whichever is the smaller. The number of shear connectors required to transfer negative moment must not be reduced.

#### 8.1.10 Longitudinal shear transfer

The shear connectors transfer shear to the concrete, and the concrete section resisting this shear should therefore be checked for cracking or splitting. The concrete slab resists the longitudinal shear along the length of the beam by shear resistance along the critical shear crack planes. In an internal beam there are many such critical sections on either side of the beam.

The profile sheeting and the transverse reinforcement contribute in carrying this longitudinal shear by dowel action. The British Standard code allows the inclusion of these components in the calculation of total shear resistance along the length of the beam.

### 8.1.11 Reduction of plastic moment capacity due to high shear

As in the case of ordinary steel beams, the composite beam has to be checked with respect to the effect of high shear load and bending moment acting simultaneously. The plastic moment capacity of the section reduces with shear after the shear in the web of the steel section reaches a value greater than  $0.5P_v$ , where  $P_v$  is the shear capacity of the web taking into account any reduction due to shear buckling effects. The total shear in a composite section must be taken by the steel section. The reduction in capacity is due to progressive ineffectiveness of the web in carrying bending stresses when the shear stress gets higher and higher and reaches the maximum value  $P_v$ . When applied shear  $F_v$  reaches  $P_v$  of the section, the contribution of the web towards the plastic moment of resistance of the composite section vanishes.

### 8.1.12 Deflections

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The limit of deflection of beams for imposed loads as per BS 5950: Part 1 is generally l/200. To determine the deflection of a simply supported composite beam, the gross uncracked section properties may be used. For further refinement, if the neutral axis happens to be in the concrete flange, cracked section properties may be used for a part of the beam near the middle. For a continuous beam, the best way to find the deflection due to imposed load is to carry out computer analysis using the incremental loading method. Firstly, put all the dead load on the steel beam for unpropped construction. At this stage the whole beam should be fully elastic. For the composite section find section properties for negative moment and positive moment. Model the beam with assumed points of contraflexure and beam section properties corresponding to positive or negative moment. Progressively load the beam, firstly with permanent imposed loading and then, stage by stage, with further imposed loading in a pattern loading format to cause maximum support bending moment. The first plastic hinges will form at the supports when plastic capacities are reached. Remodel the beam with hinges at the supports until the span becomes simply supported by the formation of hinges at the two ends of the beam. Load this beam until all of the imposed service load is used up. Add the progressive deflection at every stage of loading from the end of the dead load application and this will give the total deflection due to the imposed loading.

The British Standard code allows the use of an approximate formula for finding this imposed load deflection. (Note that plastic hinges at service load for deflection calculations form only in cases of high levels of redistribution of moments.)

### .1.13 Effect of dead load

In a simply supported beam, at service load the maximum fibre stresses can be calculated using the transferred section properties. These stresses must be less than  $p_y$  for steel and  $0.5f_{cu}$  for concrete. When unpropped construction is used, the stresses should be found in three stages and the effects added together. In the first stage for the dead load of wet concrete calculate the stresses in the steel beam, taking the section properties of the steel beam only.

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### 8.1.14 Effect of shrinkage and creep

The second stage is the calculation of stresses in the steel beam and the concrete flange due to shrinkage of the concrete. The concrete flange will try to shrink but the steel beam will resist this shrinkage. This will create a compressive load at the level of the flange of the steel beams. The compressive load on the top flange creates a bending of the composite beam, increasing the tension in the bottom flange of the steel beam and compression in the concrete flange. The shrinkage strain for an internal member in a heated building may be of the order of  $300 \times 10^{-6}$  and for an external element it could be of the order of  $100 \times 10^{-6}$ . This shrinkage strain may be reduced by a factor of 0.5 to take into account the effect of creep.

The curvature of a simply supported composite beam due to the action of concrete shrinkage may be expressed as:

$$\frac{1}{R} = \frac{\varepsilon_{\rm s}(D+D_{\rm s}+D_{\rm p})A}{2(1+\alpha_{\rm e}r)I_{\rm c}}$$

where  $\varepsilon_s =$  effective shrinkage strain in concrete

D =depth of steel beam

 $\alpha_e = modular ratio$ 

 $D_{\rm s} = {\rm depth} \ {\rm of} \ {\rm concrete} \ {\rm slab}$ 

 $D_{\rm p} = {\rm depth}$  of profile sheeting

 $\bar{A}$  = cross-sectional area of the steel beam

$$r = \frac{A}{(D_{\rm s} - D_{\rm p})B_{\rm e}}$$

 $B_{\rm e}$  = effective width of flange of the composite beam.

From the expression M/EI = 1/R the bending moment in the composite section may be found. This bending moment may be used to calculate the stresses in the composite section due to shrinkage. Normally, these calculations are omitted for composite beams in buildings.

The deflection at the centre of the span of the composite beam due to shrinkage is given by:

$$\delta = 0.125 \frac{1}{R} L^2 = \frac{0.125 M L^2}{EI}$$

### 8.1.15 Effect of imposed loads

In the third stage, the stresses in the composite section due to imposed loads and any wind loads should be calculated using the transferred section properties of the composite section.

For composite beams one should use the incremental plastic analysis and the structural model should be changed as the hinges form. The stress checks are only to be carried out at the centre of the spans. For continuous beams where redistribution of moments have been allowed, the objective is to prevent any irreversible permanent deformation/rotation at the centres of spans. The cracking or rotation over the supports may be ignored. The stresses at service load at midspan must be kept below  $p_y$  at extreme fibres of steel beam and at a maximum of  $0.5f_{cu}$  in the concrete flange. The stress distribution at service load in the composite section is assumed to be triangular. For unpropped construction, the same three-stage investigation of stresses should be carried out and the total stress at the point of interest is the sum of the stresses from all three stages.

### 8.1.16 Step-by-step design procedure for composite beams

### Step 1 Select type of beam and slab construction

There are three different elements in the construction of the composite beam. The type, depth, material properties and the method of connection should be decided at the onset of the design process for all three elements. These elements are as follows.

*Reinforced concrete slab:* The depth, grade of concrete and amount of reinforcement will depend on the span of the slab, the imposed loads and also whether the slab is designed as continuous or simply supported. Guidance should be sought from books on reinforced concrete design and construction and BS 8110: Part 1.

*Profile steel sheeting:* If used, the guidance on depth, thickness, material properties and connection system should be obtained from the manufacturer's catalogue. The geometry of the profile sheeting will depend on the span, the loading and the construction method (propped or unpropped).

Steel beam: Generally, equal flanged steel UB sections will be most cost-effective. Grade 50 steel should be used whenever possible. Sometimes for very large span beams castellated sections are used. It should be borne in mind that additional fabrication costs can wipe out the savings in material costs. For unpropped construction in simply supported beams, a span to overall depth ratio of 20 is generally suitable whereas in continuous construction the same ratio could be 25.

### Step 2 Determine loading

The loading on the beam has to be found for the construction stage and for the completed structure. Determine the loading for the construction stage at the serviceability and ultimate limit state. Similarly, determine the loading for the composite stage at the serviceability and ultimate limit state. The serviceability loading at the composite stage for unpropped construction is an additional loading to the stress state of the steel beam after construction. This means that the stress state at the service limit state for unpropped construction should be found by first finding the stress in the steel beam due to construction dead load only (do not consider temporary construction live load) and then adding to this stress the stresses due to other permanent and imposed loads at composite stage.

### Step 3 Determine material and section properties

Modular ratio  $\alpha_e$ 

 $\alpha_{\rm e} = \alpha_{\rm s} + \rho_{\rm l}(\alpha_{\rm l} - \alpha_{\rm s})$

Select design strength  $p_y$  for structural steel section and  $f_y$  for steel reinforcement in the concrete.

Steel reinforcement in the concrete flange for negative bending over support may not be necessary after redistribution of support moments. Before carrying out the cracked section analysis of the continuous composite beam, a check should be made to determine if steel reinforcement is required to resist support moment after the maximum allowable percentage of redistribution. If the bending moment over the support after the maximum allowable redistribution is greater than the plastic moment capacity of the steel beam, then only the steel reinforcement becomes necessary.

Trial area of reinforcement  $A_r$  for negative bending moment, when necessary, may be obtained from:

$$A_{\rm r} \le \frac{dtp_{\rm y}}{0.87f_{\rm y}} \left[ 76\varepsilon \left(\frac{t}{d}\right) - 1 \right]$$

The area of tensile reinforcement should not be so high as to shift the plastic neutral axis far towards the reinforcement, resulting in a large depth of the web being in compression. This may cause problems of compactness of the web, resulting in a decrease of plastic moment capacity.

Determine the location of the neutral axis and the second moment of area. See Tables 8.1 to 8.4 for section properties. Determine section properties for the transformed composite section.

### Step 4 Carry out analysis

There are three basic decisions to be taken regarding the analysis:

- (1) Type of analysis elastic or plastic.
- (2) Redistribution of moments in continuous construction (percentage).
- (3) Type of shear connection full or partial.

The bending moments and shear should be determined for three stages as follows.

- (1) Construction stage: For unpropped construction, the bending moments should be found separately for dead load of wet concrete and for construction-imposed loading, including any stacking, heaping, dumping, plant and machinery etc. The steel beams have to be checked for construction loads, including imposed loads, but locked-in stresses for dead loads of wet concrete alone should be used to check the service limit state stress distribution in the steel beam.
- (2) Service limit state: Analysis must be carried out to find the bending moment due to imposed loads after the concrete has hardened, when the beam behaves compositely with the concrete slab. For propped construction, the construction stage need not be investigated, and the service limit state should consider the combined dead and imposed load on the composite beam after the concrete has hardened and the props have been removed.
- (3) Ultimate limit state: The full combined dead and imposed loads multiplied by appropriate load factors should be used to find the ultimate bending moments and shears. The composite section should be used to check the resistance.
- Note: Recommended procedure for continuous composite beam is to find, by the use of recognised computer software, the bending moment, shear and deflections for unit distributed loading on single spans separately and for all spans under loaded conditions. The model of the beam should include cracked section properties for a distance of 0.15L on either side of the supports. By progressive loading of this model, the pre-determined limits of plastic hinges on the composite beam will be reached. When a hinge has formed, the model should be altered to allow for this hinge in the beam and subsequent loads should be applied on this altered model to find the final bending moments, shears etc. The pre-determined level of the maximum bending moment depends on the percentage of redistribution of support moment allowed.

### Step 5 Check section classification

Steel beam: at construction stage without composite action Check section classification as per Clause 3.5.2 and Table 7 of BS 5950: Part 1. See Chapter 7.

### Composite beam: web



r is called the web stress ratio. It is the ratio of the mean longitudinal stress in the web to the design strength  $p_y$ . Compressive stress is taken as positive and tensile stress is taken as negative.

General rules for flanges of steel beams in compression

- (1) A steel compression flange of a beam connected by shear connectors to a solid concrete slab may be assumed to be class 1 plastic.
- (2) A steel compression flange of a beam connected by shear connectors to a ribbed slab with profiled sheets, where either the ribs are at a maximum inclination of 45° to the axis of the beam or the minimum width of rib is not less than half the width of the flange of the steel beam, may be classified as plastic if it is plastic

or compact according to BS 5950: Part 1, and may be classified as compact if it is semi-compact according to BS 5950: Part 1.

- (3) Use rectangular plastic stress distribution in the steel compressive flange if it is classified as compact or plastic.
- (4) When the steel compressive flange is semi-compact or slender, assume triangular stress distribution, as in elastic analysis.
- (5) If the web or the steel compressive flange is slender, use the stress reduction factors in Table 8 of BS 5950: Part 1.

### General rules for web

(1) Calculate the web stress ratio r using the formulae given below for steel beams with equal flanges.

### Elastic stress distribution

With elastic stress distribution, when flanges are semi-compact or slender or the web is slender, the following formulae may be used to find r for steel beams with equal flanges.

- (4) When the web is slender use the design stress reduction factor as in Clause 3.6 and Table 8 of BS 5950: Part 1.

Step 6 Determine ultimate plastic moment capacities and check shear capacity Use the formulae in Tables 8.3 and 8.4 according to positive moment or negative moment capacity. Check that the section capacities are adequate to resist the effects of the applied loading.

Determine section shear capacity  $P_v$  as per BS 5950: Part 1.

The shear capacity is governed by shear buckling when the ratio d/t exceeds  $63\varepsilon$ .

### Reduction of plastic moment capacities due to high shear



For sections with a compression flange which is semi-compact, or a web or a compression flange which is slender,  $M_{cv}$  should not be taken as greater than the elastic moment capacity.

### Step 7 Check stability of compression flange (lateral torsional buckling) (During construction and as composite beams) The following rules apply:

- (1) The compression flange in a simply supported beam will be deemed to be fully restrained by the concrete slab or by the profiled steel sheet, if used, at the hardened construction stage. Otherwise, during construction, appropriate restraint of the compression flange has to be provided by temporary bracing.
- (2) The compression top flange at the centre of a continuous beam may be regarded as fully restrained by the hardened concrete slab or by the profiled steel sheeting during construction, if used as permanent formwork.
- (3) The compression bottom flange at the support of a continuous beam must be laterally and torsionally restrained at the column where plastic hinges may be allowed to form due to redistribution of moments.
- (4) It is assumed that the hardened concrete slab or the profiled steel sheeting will offer the overall buckling resistance of the bottom compression flange of the continuous beam by providing the lateral restraint at the top flange. The check of this stability should be carried out using the method in BS 5950 Part 1: Appendix G: Design of restrained members with unrestrained compression flange.

Steps to follow to carry out stability check as per BS 5950: Part 1: Appendix G









between torsional restrains to both flanges. The node numbers of these parts are 1 to 5 and the bending moments  $N_1$  to  $N_5$ correspond to these node numbers.  $N_5$  is the bending moment at end 2 of the beam. The plastic moment capacities at the nodes 1 to 5 are designated as  $M_1$  to  $M_5$  respectively.

For sections where an elastic linear stress distribution is assumed, the moment capacity is given by  $M = p_y Z_x$ , where  $Z_x$ is the elastic section modulus.

For sections where full plastic stress distribution can take place, the moment capacity is given by  $M = p_y S_x$ , where  $S_x$  is the plastic section modulus.

- Note: For most applications the factor  $n_t$  may be conservatively assumed to be 1.  $n_t$  is also taken as 1 where there are no intermediate loads between restraints.



Determine the number of shear connectors required due to positive moment, which is given by:

 $N_{\rm p} = F_{\rm p}/Q_{\rm p}$ 

Determine the number of shear connectors required due to negative moment, which is given by:

 $N_{\rm n} = F_{\rm n}/Q_{\rm n}$ 

The total number of shear connectors required over a length from the point of maximum positive bending moment to each adjacent support is:

 $N = N_{\rm p} + N_{\rm n}$ 

For partial shear connection, the number of shear connectors required to resist negative moment  $N_n$  should not be reduced.

Spacing of shear connectors: Method 1 The following steps may be followed.

(1) Find the points on the beam where bending moment becomes zero. These points are at the supports for simply supported

beams and at the point of contraflexure for a continuous beam. The point of contraflexure should be determined after redistribution of moments.

- (2) Find the distance  $l_n$  from the point of contraflexure to the adjacent support and  $l_p$  from the point of contraflexure to the point of maximum positive moment in the span.
- (3) Find the uniform spacing for negative moment, which is given by:

$$S_{n} = \frac{l_{n}}{\frac{N_{n}}{I} - 1}$$

where J is the number of shear connectors in a row perpendicular to the longitudinal axis of the beam.

(4) Find the uniform spacing for positive moment, which is given by:

$$S_{\rm p} = \frac{l_{\rm p}}{\frac{N_{\rm p}}{J} - 1}$$

(5) Find the uniform spacing for combined positive and negative moment, which is given by:

$$S_{\rm b} = \frac{l_{\rm p} + l_{\rm n}}{\frac{N_{\rm p} + N_{\rm n}}{J} - 1}$$

(6) The uniform spacing S is the smallest of  $S_n$ ,  $S_p$  or  $S_b$ . Adopt shear connectors at uniform spacing S on the beam with J numbers on each row. This method is very conservative and no more additional checks are necessary. It is assumed that full shear connection is required. Uniform spacing of shear connectors improves buildability and reduces the overall time and cost, especially if they are shop-welded by semi-automatic machines.

### Spacing of shear connectors: Method 2 The following steps may be followed.

- (1) Find the points on the beam where the negative steel over the support can be fully curtailed, taking into account the recommendations of BS 8110 regarding curtailment. The bars have to extend at least 12 diameters beyond the point where they are not required, provided the full tension anchorage length has been provided from the point of maximum negative moment.
- (2) Find the distance of the point of curtailment from the adjacent support  $l_n$  and find the spacing  $S_n$ , which is given by:

$$S_{\rm n} = \frac{l_{\rm n}}{\left(\frac{N_{\rm n}}{J}\right)}$$

Use this spacing over the support and into the span up to a length  $l_n - S_n$  from the support.

(3) Find  $l_p$ , the distance from the point  $l_n - S_n$  from support to the point where the positive moment is maximum. Find the spacing  $S_p$ , which is given by:

$$S_{\rm p} = \frac{l_{\rm p}}{\frac{N_{\rm p}}{J} - 1}$$

Use spacing  $S_p$  over the positive moment region in the span.

### Spacing of shear connectors: Method 3

After selecting a variable zonal spacing of shear connectors, the beam may be divided into zones. Within each zone, the spacing of shear connectors is kept constant. At all changes of spacing of the shear connectors, the following conditions should be satisfied.  $(N_j \text{ is the total number of shear connectors from the point of interest to the nearest support.)}$ 

For positive moment zones: 
$$N_j = N_p \frac{M - M_s}{M_c - M_s} + N_n$$
 but  $N_j \ge N_n$ 

For negative moment zones:  $N_j = N_n \frac{M_c - M}{M_c - M_s}$  but  $N_j \le N_n$ 

M is the moment at the point under consideration

 $M_{\rm c}$  is the positive or negative moment capacity of the composite section, as appropriate

 $M_{\rm s}$  is the moment capacity of the steel section

### Additional check of shear connectors

Additional checks at points on the span are necessary following method 3. These are needed at points where (1) a heavy concentrated load is applied in the span, (2) a sudden change of cross-section occurs, (3) at the point of tapering of the beam and (4) where the concrete flange is so large that  $M_c$  is more than 2.5 times  $M_s$ .

### Reduction of stud capacity in profiled sheets

### Ribs perpendicular to beam

The stud capacities  $Q_p$  and  $Q_n$  have to be reduced by the following factors when profiled steel sheets are used as permanent formwork. The reduction factor is given by:

For one stud per rib:


### Applied longitudinal shear





### Resistance to longitudinal shear

The resistance to longitudinal shear comes from the potential concrete shear surface (see SK 8/16), the dowel action of any anchored transverse reinforcement in the concrete slab and the contribution from the profiled steel sheeting.





The resistance per unit length of beam is given by:

$$v_{\rm r} = 0.7 A_{\rm sv} f_{\rm y} + 0.03 \eta A_{\rm cv} f_{\rm cu} + v_{\rm p} \le 0.8 \eta A_{\rm cv} \sqrt{f_{\rm cu}} + v_{\rm p}$$

where  $f_{cu}$  = characteristic strength of concrete

 $\eta = 1.0$  for normal weight concrete

= 0.8 for lightweight aggregate concrete

 $A_{cv}$  = mean area of the concrete shear surface per unit length of beam for potential shear failure plane (see SK 8/16)

 $A_{sv} = cross-sectional area of the total steel reinforcement cross$ ing the potential shear failure plane

 $v_{\rm p}$  = contribution of the profiled steel sheeting, if applicable

For profiled sheets with ribs perpendicular to, and continuous over, the beam,  $v_p$  is given by:

 $v_{\rm p} = t_{\rm p} p_{\rm yp}$ 

where  $t_p =$  thickness of profiled steel sheet

 $p_{yp}$  = design strength of profiled steel sheet

For profiled sheets with discontinuity at the top of beams and stud shear connectors welded through the sheet to connect to the beam,  $v_p$ is given by:

### Step 10 Check serviceability limit state

Check deflection and stresses at service loads using the elastic properties of the composite section. For unpropped construction the full stress history has to be considered to include stage construction sequence.

### Deflection

The deflections are to be determined for the serviceability limit state of loading only. For unpropped construction, the deflection due to imposed load is based on the properties of the composite section, but the deflection due to dead load of the concrete slab is based on the properties of the steel beam only. For propped construction all deflections are calculated using the properties of the composite section. Deflection of composite simply supported beams

Deflection due to imposed load may be calculated using the properties of a composite beam with a gross uncracked section.

Deflection of composite continuous beams

$$\delta_{\rm c} = \delta_0 \bigg[ 1 - 0.6 \, \frac{M_1 + M_2}{M_0} \bigg]$$

 $\delta_{\rm c}$  = the deflection of the continuous composite beam at the middle of one of the spans due to imposed loading

- $\delta_0$  = the deflection of the same span due to same loading as a simply supported beam
- $M_0 =$  maximum span bending moment in the same span due to the same loading as a simply supported beam
- $M_1$  and  $M_2$  = the bending moments at the adjacent supports of the span due to same loading as a continuous beam (modified for patterned loading and shake-down effects)

### Determination of $M_1$ and $M_2$ taking into account pattern loading and shake-down effects

### Allowance for pattern loading

Load all spans of the continuous beam with unfactored imposed load and find  $M_1$  and  $M_2$  for the span under consideration. Reduce these moments by 30% for normal loading and 50% for storage loading (except adjacent to cantilevers) to account for pattern loading.

### Allowance for shake-down effects

Shake-down effects are only to be considered if:

- plastic global analysis is used
- elastic global analysis is used with uncracked section properties and more than 40% redistribution of support moments
- elastic global analysis is used with cracked section properties and more than 20% redistribution of support moments

Determine  $M_1$  and  $M_2$  for unfactored dead load plus 80% of imposed loads for normal loading or determine  $M_1$  and  $M_2$  for unfactored dead load plus 100% of imposed loads for storage loads.

If moments  $M_1$  and  $M_2$  exceed the plastic moment capacity of the composite beam at supports 1 and 2, respectively, then the excess moments are called the shake-down moments.

Moments  $M_1$  and  $M_2$  found after the pattern loading correction should be further reduced by these shake-down moments. These finally reduced support moments should be used in the formula for deflection.

Correction of deflection due to partial shear connection

For propped construction:  $\delta = \delta_{\rm c} + 0.5 \left(1 - \frac{N_{\rm a}}{N_{\rm p}}\right) (\delta_{\rm s} - \delta_{\rm c})$ 

For unpropped construction: 
$$\delta = \delta_{\rm c} + 0.3 \left(1 - \frac{N_{\rm a}}{N_{\rm p}}\right) (\delta_{\rm s} - \delta_{\rm c})$$

- where  $\delta =$  corrected final deflection of the composite beam allowing for partial shear connection
  - $\delta_{\rm c}$  = deflection of the composite beam with full shear connection
  - $\delta_s =$  deflection of the steel beam alone subjected to the same loading
  - $N_{\rm a}$  = actual number of shear connectors used for positive moment, which should not be less than  $0.4N_{\rm p}$
  - $N_{\rm p}$  = the number of shear connectors required for full shear connection to develop positive moment capacity of the section

### Step 11 Check pre-cambering requirement

Check the requirement of pre-cambering to counteract the deflection due to dead load of the wet concrete on the steel beam for unpropped construction. The construction sequence must be taken into consideration for continuous beams. All spans may not be poured at the same time and adjacent spans will be affected by stress and deflection according to the construction sequence followed.

### Step 12 Check vibration

The natural frequency of the composite beam used in floor construction should be checked to prevent vibration induced oscillations. The frequency of the floor should be kept above 4 Hz to avoid susceptibility to vibration.

The natural frequency of a single degree of freedom system is given by:

$$f_{\rm n} = \frac{1}{2\pi} \sqrt{\frac{K}{M}} \qquad ({\rm Hz})$$

where K = stiffness of the system in N/mM = mass of the system in kg

This expression can be rewritten as:

$$f_{\rm n} = \frac{\sqrt{g}}{2\pi} \sqrt{\frac{K}{Mg}} = \frac{\sqrt{g}}{2\pi\sqrt{\delta_{\rm st}}} = \frac{15.76}{\sqrt{\delta_{\rm st}}}$$

where

 $\delta_{\rm st} = Mg/K$ 

= static deflection of the system due to gravity load Mg

The natural frequency of a composite beam may be found approximately by finding the deflection  $\delta_{st}$  at midspan due to the service limit dead load, including all permanent loads plus an allowance for imposed load (10-50%).




### 8.2 EXAMPLE 8.1: COMPOSITE BEAM

Design a four-span continuous composite beam to support the floor of a library. The stacking height of books should be taken as 3 m. The live loading on the floor is  $2.4 \text{ kN/m}^2$  for every metre of stacking height. The beams are at 3 m centres. All four spans of the beam are 12 m. The construction of the floor will be unpropped.

#### **Design parameters**

Use trapezoidal profiled sheets for deck construction.

 $560 \div 830 = 0.67$ . This means that with 33% redistribution, the steel beam alone can resist the support moment. There is no need for additional tensile steel reinforcement because the level of redistribution required is less than the allowable level (50%) when elastic global analysis is carried out using uncracked section properties.

The continuous composite beam is designed as unreinforced, and plastic global analysis is used with cracked section properties. The conditions for plastic analysis, as described in Appendix D.3 of BS 5950: Part 3: Section 3.1, are satisfied because all spans are equal, there are no concentrated loads on the spans, and the compression flange and the web of the steel beam at the support are classified as class 1 plastic.







# Composite stage: stability of bottom flange in compression

The worst case of stability of span 2 arises when spans 1 and 3 are fully loaded but spans 2 and 4 are loaded with dead load only. The analytical model allows for fully cracked section properties for the whole of span 2 and half of span 4. This produces the maximum bending moment in span 1 and all of span 2 has hogging moment, creating the most critical stability problem of the compressive bottom flange. By computer analysis the results shown in SK 8/21 are obtained.



SK 8/21 Bending moment diagram when spans 1 and 3 only are fully loaded.


It should be noted that the maximum span moment in span 1 is not governed by the plastic hinge formation at B because the percentage of redistribution of negative moment is very low (see Step 4: 627 kNm vs 755 kNm). The loading condition shown in SK 8/21 produces higher bending moment in span 1 than when the plastic hinge is allowed to form at B. The support bending moments due to this loading condition do not exceed the plastic negative moment capacity of the steel beam. The section moment capacity of the composite beam for positive moments is checked against this maximum moment of 755 kNm



This calculation of deflection allows for patterned loading and has been calculated by the rigorous method using the cracked section moment of inertia of the composite beam. The shake-down effects need not be considered because the percentage of moment redistribution is very small.

# Step 11 Check vibration

Continuous beams have higher stiffness than simply supported beams with the same length of span and the same section properties. This results in higher frequency of vibration of the continuous beam.

The lowest frequency of a composite beam is exhibited when the gravity load is applied in opposite directions on adjacent spans, as shown in SK 8/23. This mode shape is asymmetrical, and the deflection at the midspan of span 1 may be used to compute the natural frequency  $f_n$ , which is given by:

This means that by this approximate method of analysis, the beam is not adequately stiff, and vibration could be a problem. The method is very conservative and the inclusion of half the imposed load for the computation of deflection may be regarded as excessive. It is not necessary to change the beam section to a stiffer alternative.


#### Step 12 Check pre-cambering requirement

The deflection at the midspan due to dead load is small, and the false ceiling under the floor can be adjusted to give a level ceiling. Precambering may be unnecessary.

#### 8.3 COMPOSITE COLUMNS

Composite columns are either concrete encased structural steel sections or hollow structural sections filled with concrete. They offer the following advantages:

- (1) Increased fire resistance of steel column encased
- (2) Increased load-carrying capacity of the steel section
- (3) Reduced slenderness of the steel member
- (4) Increased durability of the steel section
- (5) Increased load-carrying capacity of the confined concrete inside a concrete filled structural hollow section







The concrete in the hollow section is confined, and the strength of the concrete is enhanced due to the Poisson ratio effect. The steel tube is subjected to hoop tension which has little effect on the axial capacity of the steel section. The enhancement of strength of the concrete largely depends on the proportions of the cross-section.

The axial compressive load capacity of a stocky circular hollow steel section filled with concrete is given by (see *Steel Designer's Manual*, Fifth Edition, published by Blackwell Science):



# Chapter 9 Connections in Steelwork

# 9.1 BOLTED CONNECTIONS

#### 9.1.1 Types of bolts

# Grade 4.6 and 8.8 bolts: Reference BS 4190 and BS 3692

The most frequently used bolts are Grade 4.6 and 8.8. Grade 4.6 bolts have a minimum ultimate tensile strength of  $40 \text{ kg/mm}^2$  ( $392 \text{ N/mm}^2$ ) and a minimum stress at yield of  $0.6 \times 40 = 24 \text{ kg/mm}^2$  ( $235 \text{ N/mm}^2$ ). Similarly, Grade 8.8 bolts have a minimum ultimate strength of  $80 \text{ kg/mm}^2$  ( $785 \text{ N/mm}^2$ ) and a minimum stress at yield of  $0.8 \times 80 = 64 \text{ kg/mm}^2$  ( $627 \text{ N/mm}^2$ ).

High strength friction grip bolts: Reference BS 4395 Generally Grade 8.8 bolts are used for this purpose up to a diameter of 24 mm.









BEAM WEB TENSION FAILURE PATTERN





# 9.1.5 Out-of-plane bending moment, direct load and shear on a group of bolts

If the beam end plate and the column flange are thin and flexible, then it can be assumed that all bolts in the tension zone of the moment connection will reach yield or their maximum rated capacity according to mode of failure (modes 1 to 4). On the other hand, if the column flange or the beam end plate is very stiff and cannot bend enough under load to cause yield in all the bolts in the tension zone, then a triangular stress distribution in the bolt group has to be assumed, as shown in SK 9/4. The triangular distribution of loads should be adopted unless:






SK 9/4 Bolt load distribution in beam-column moment connection.





#### Shear capacity of connection

The interaction formula in BS 5950: Part 1 for combined tension and shear on bolts, apart from friction grip bolts, requires the factor 1.4 not to be exceeded. If it is assumed that the applied tension  $F_t$  is equal to the tension capacity  $P_t$  of the bolt, then the applied shear  $F_s$  could have a maximum value equal to  $0.4P_s$ , where  $P_s$  is the shear capacity of the bolt.

The design shear force  $F_v$  should not exceed the shear capacity of bolts in the tension and shear zones combined. The bolt layout in the end plate may be divided into tension zone bolts and shear zone bolts. The shear zone bolts are designed for shear force only and any tension due to moment in these bolts is neglected.



### 9.1.7 Design of stiffeners and haunched ends of beams

- If the column web fails by bearing or buckling due to the load  $F_c$  at the connection, then use column compression stiffeners or supplementary web plates.
- If the column flange fails due to yielding at the connection, use column flange backing plates.
- If the column web or the beam web fails due to local tension (mode 4) at the bolt, use tension stiffeners or supplementary web plates.
- If the column web fails due to web panel shear, use supplementary web plates or diagonal shear stiffeners.
- Note: A haunched beam end helps to reduce the internal forces in the connection geometry. Use haunched ends at connections with high bending moment, axial load and shear force.




ELEVATIONS OF COLUMN FLANCE





SK 9/17 Typical haunched end geometry of beams.


### 9.1.8 Bolted splices

Design philosophy

- (1) Continuity of the member about both axes has to be maintained at the splice.
- (2) The applied moment at the splice is resisted by the flange cover plates.
- (3) The applied shear force at the splice is resisted by the web cover plates.
- (4) The applied axial direct load in compression or tension is resisted equally by the flange cover plates in the case of beams. For columns, the direct load is shared between the flange and the web cover plates in proportion to their areas.
- (5) Additional minor axis bending moment due to lateral torsional buckling (strut action) should be considered for the design of splices (reference Appendix C3 of BS 5950: Part 1).





#### Design philosophy

- (1) Design flange cover plates as members subject to direct compression or tension, with due allowance for holes for the bolts at the splice. (See SK 9/19.)
- (2) Check flange plates for combined direct load and moment due to bending about the minor axis (applied + strut action). It may be assumed that the total minor axis bending moment is carried equally by the two flange plates.
- (3) Also check the existing flanges of the beam or column for tension or compression resistance, making due allowance for bolt holes.
- (4) Bolts are in direct shear or bearing (see section on capacity of bolts). Preferably, use high-strength friction grip (HSFG) bolts at all splices to prevent slippage at the connection (see section on HSFG bolts for slip resistance and bearing resistance).
- (5) The minor axis bending moment in the flange creates in-plane shear on the group of bolts in the splice. This shear should be combined with shear due to direct tension or compression in the flange to find the resultant shear in the bolt.


#### Strut action at the splice (see SK 9/20)

Minor axis bending due to strut action should be considered only when the splice is away from a point of lateral restraint.





#### Bolts in web plates (see SK 9/23)

Check end and edge distances. For a friction grip connection the end distances should be greater than three times the bolt diameter.

In-plane moment on the bolt group on each side of the splice is  $F_{v}a$ , where  $F_{v}$  is the applied shear and a is the distance from the centre of splice to the centroid of the bolt group.

Design the group of bolts to resist the combined action of in-plane moment  $F_{v}a$  and shear  $F_{v}$ .

Find the resultant of  $N_{\rm mi}$ ,  $N_{\rm s}$  and  $N_{\rm d}$  by vectorial combination and check against the capacity of the bolt in shear.

*Note:* The splice plates and bolts may be designed assuming that these elements carry the actual stresses in the components spliced. In deep plate girders the flange splice plates and bolts should be designed to resist the actual flange forces, depending on the bending moment at the splice and the section modulus of the plate girder at the splice allowing for the moment capacity of the web. At the same time, the top row of bolts in the web cover plates should be checked against the combined action of vertical shear and horizontal shear due to average longitudinal bending stress in the web.

## 9.2 WELDS AND WELDING

Electric arc welding is the most common method of connecting metal to metal by fusion. A low-voltage (10-50 V), high-current (10-2000 A) generator is used to create an electric arc between an

electrode and the elements to be welded. The heat generated melts the metal, which then fuses to form a weld. The molten metal is protected either by flux or by inert gas to prevent oxidation and embrittlement.

#### Shielded metal arc welding (SMAW)

The consumable electrode has a core of filler metal with an outer covering of flux. The flux melts during the welding operation to protect the molten metal.

#### Gas metal arc welding (GMAW)

The electrode is a continuous spool of wire acting as the filler metal. Inert gas supplied continuously during the welding process protects the molten metal from oxidation.


#### Submerged arc welding (SAW)


The electrode is a continuous spool of wire and the flux is a granular material fed from a hopper directly in front of the arc. The welding takes place submerged under a flow of granular flux.

### 9.2.1 Types of weld

#### Fillet weld

Two steel faces may be joined by a fillet weld which normally has a triangular cross-section. The strength of the weld depends on the throat thickness which is a multiple of the leg length. The effective throat thickness varies with the angle between the surfaces of steel joined together. When the angle between the surfaces to be joined is less than 60° or more than 120° then fillet welds are not permitted.

## Design rules as per BS 5950: Part 1: Clause 6.6

(1) End returns

Fillet welds terminating at ends of connected parts should be returned round the corners for a distance of at least twice the leg length.

(2) Lap joints

The minimum lap should not be less than 4t, where t is the thickness of the thinner ply joined.

- (3) Single fillet welds A single line of fillet weld must not be subject to bending moment about its longitudinal axis.
- (4) Intermittent fillet welds

Do not use intermittent weld where moisture ingress and rust formation cannot be avoided. Intermittent fillet welds should not be subject to frequent stress changes (e.g. as in a gantry girder or a wind girder). The longitudinal spacing between intermittent runs of fillet weld should not exceed 16t or 300 mm for compression elements and 24t for tension elements, where t is the minimum thickness of the connected ply.


(5) Effective length of fillet weld

The effective length of a fillet weld is its actual length less twice the length of the leg. It should not be less than four times the leg length.

#### Butt welds

#### Partial penetration butt welds

The throat thickness of a partial penetration butt weld should be taken as the minimum depth of penetration. In the case of a V- or bevel weld,




SK 9/25 Full penetration and partial penetration butt welds.

the depth of penetration should be taken as the depth of preparation minus 3 mm. In the case of J- or U-preparation, the depth of penetration should be taken as the depth of preparation. The specified penetration of a partial penetration butt weld should not be less than  $2\sqrt{t}$ , where t is the thickness of the thinner part joined.

#### Partial penetration butt weld with superimposed fillet weld

The capacity of a partial penetration butt weld with superimposed fillet weld should be calculated by reference to its throat thickness as illustrated in SK 9/26.

The vector sum of all loads should be used to determine the stress in the weld using the throat thickness. This stress should not exceed the design strength  $p_w$  of the weld, as given in Table 9.4. Assuming that the angle of bevel preparation is 45°, the force equilibrium at the connection is given by:


#### Full penetration butt weld


The strength of a full penetration butt weld is equal to the strength of the parent material, provided a suitable welding consumable is used. The preparation of a butt weld is very important. The preferred shapes of butt weld preparation are given in Table 9.3. The shape of weld preparation depends on accessibility and the thickness of the metal parts being joined. When joined by butt welds, plates of differing thickness may give rise to additional bending moments if their centroidal axes are not properly aligned. Sometimes the thicker element is tapered to meet the thinner element. The slope of the taper should not be more than 1 in 4.

#### 9.2.2 Defects in welds

#### Undercut

This defect occurs when insufficient weld metal is incorporated. The specification should lay down the limits of undercut acceptable.

#### Incomplete penetration

This happens when the electrode is too large for the geometry of the joint or the wrong welding angle is used, or if there is insufficient current or inadequate backgouging of a root run back to sound weld metal.

#### Slag inclusions

This defect is the result of non-metallic particles from the flux getting trapped in the weld in multipass welding operations. The flux must be removed carefully to avoid this problem.

#### Porosity

The trapping of gas in the weld metal gives rise to this defect.

#### Lack of fusion

Runs of weld may not fully fuse with the parent metal because of incorrect welding practice.

#### 9.2.3 Weld inspection methods: non-destructive testing (NDT)

#### Visual checks

- accuracy of fit-up
- cleanliness of parts to be welded
- preparation
- examination of visible cracks
- interpass cleanliness
- final weld geometry

## Dye penetrant inspection (DPI)

- The size and extent of cracks can be found by applying a liquid dye on the surface, which then penetrates the cracks. The cracks are then made visible by the use of a developer.
- Look for signs of leakage through the weld on the opposite side.

## Magnetic particle inspection (MPI)

• This involves the detection of surface and subsurface cracks in ferro-magnetic materials by magnetising the specimen and applying fine iron particles. These particles are drawn into the cracks because of the formation of secondary magnetic poles at the crack faces.

### Ultrasonic flaw detection (UFD)


• With this technique, flaws are detected by applying ultrasonic pulses from a transmitter probe (frequency range 1-5 MHz) which are then picked up by a receiving probe. The pulses are deflected at points where discontinuities exist.

#### Radiography

• This method of detection of flaws, cracks and cavities involves projecting X-rays through the specimen on to film.

#### 9.2.4 Design of fillet welds

The design strength  $p_w$  of fillet welds made with electrodes complying with BS 639 should be as shown in Table 9.4.

The strength of fillet welds may be taken as equal to the strength of the parent metal if the following conditions are satisfied.

- The welds should be symmetrical about the plate connected.
- Suitable electrodes must be used.
- The sum of the throat sizes should be greater than or equal to the thickness of the plate connected.
- The weld must be subjected to tension or compression only.

The stress in the fillet weld should be checked using the following principles:

- (1) Find the stress in the weld from the vector sum of all loads using the throat thickness and check that this stress does not exceed the design strength  $p_w$ .
- (2) For fillet welds with unequal size legs, check the stress on the fusion line. The shear stress on the fusion line should not exceed  $0.7p_y$  and the tensile stress should not exceed  $1.0p_y$ , where  $p_y$  is the design strength of the parent metal.

#### 9.2.5 Design of butt welds


The strength of full penetration butt welds may be taken as equal to that of the parent metal provided appropriate electrodes have been used, as per BS 639.

Partial penetration butt welds with a superimposed fillet weld should be designed as a fillet weld using the throat thickness shown in SK 9/26.



## 9.2.7 Welded beam-to-column connection


The welds connecting the flanges of the beam to the column may be designed to withstand tensile and compressive flange forces only. The beam-end shear may be designed to be resisted fully by the welds connecting the web of the beam to the column.

The beam-to-column welded connection may be designed using the following principles:

• If the flanges of the beam are to be connected to the flange of the column using a full penetration butt weld, the choice of electrode is governed by the grade of steel in the beam and column to be connected.



SK 9/29 Typical shop welded beam-to-column connection details.




SK 9/30 Typical site welded beam-to-column connection details.

- If the flanges of the beam are to be connected to the flange of the column using fillet welds, the total throat thickness of the fillet welds at the connection should be more than or equal to the thickness of the flange of the beam. Generally do not exceed a leg size of 12 mm for fillet welds.
- If the flanges of the beam are to be connected to the flange of the column using a partial penetration butt weld, with or without superimposed fillet weld, see SK 9/26 for the method of design of the weld.
- If the web of the beam is to be connected to the column using two runs of fillet welds, the total throat thickness of the fillet welds should be more than or equal to the thickness of the web of the beam. For very thick webs partial penetration butt welds may be used.

## Check column flange at connection

The flange force tension T and compression C from the beam are transferred to the flange of the column. (See SK 9/31.)

Because the flange of the column is flexible, the load is transferred over an effective width of flange  $B_{\rm eff}$  which is a function of the thickness  $T_{\rm c}$  of the flange of column. This is a local capacity check where the load path is from the flange of the beam to the web of the column. If the design strength and flange thickness of the column and the beam are different, then further adjustment of the effective width is necessary as per the following formulae:










#### 9.3 NOTCHED BEAMS ~

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BS 5950: Part 1 has no clear guidelines regarding shear capacity of webs with holes for fasteners. It is considered advisable to check the shear capacity of webs of beams where one or both flanges have been notched at the connection. This check should also make due allowance for holes required for fasteners. Two checks are usually necessary at the notched end of a beam, viz. plain shear check and block shear check.

## 9.3.2 Block shear check at notched end of beam

A block tear-out failure can also occur if the connection is towards the top of the beam. Again there are two different methods suggested in the two references cited above. Block shear capacity is the combined shear and tensile capacity of the corner of the beam at the notch. The failure mode could be by shear along the vertical fastener line at the notch and then by a tension failure along the horizontal line from the bottom fastener hole. A triangular stress distribution along the horizontal line may be assumed.

## 9.5 COLUMN BASES


#### 9.5.1 General rules


- (1) The bearing pressure on concrete should be assumed to be an average plastic rectangular stress block in compression with a maximum stress level of  $0.4 f_{cu}$ , where  $f_{cu}$  is the characteristic 28-day cube strength of the concrete. The factor 0.4 corresponds to the reinforced concrete theory of design of sections in direct compression or bending, where a material factor  $\gamma_m$  is taken as equal to 1.5 for concrete. (See *Reinforced Concrete: Analysis and Design* by S. S. Ray, published by Blackwell Science, 1995.)
- (2) The thickness limitation to prevent brittle fracture of base plates in Grade 43A steel does not apply to base plates subject to compression only.
- (3) Base plates in Grade 43A steel should not exceed 50 mm in thickness if it is required to transmit moment to the foundation.
- (4) The pressure on the effective area of the base plate should not exceed the allowable bearing pressure on the concrete (i.e.  $0.4 f_{cu}$ ). The effective area depends on the plastic moment capacity of the base plate, which is determined from its thickness. The effective area in an oversized base plate is found by limiting beyond the column the cantilever overhang, which is dictated by the plastic capacity of the base plate.
- (5) If all contact surfaces between the base plate and the column, including any stiffeners used, are machined to have full and continuous contact, then the compressive forces may be assumed to be transmitted by direct bearing from the column to the base plate. Otherwise, the welds or the bolts connecting these elements should be designed to transmit all compressive forces. The welds and the fasteners should be designed to transmit all shear forces and tensile forces at the connection.
- (6) The thickness of the base plate should not be less than the thickness of the column flange.
- (7) The fundamental assumption in the design of the base plate is that it is rigid enough to distribute the load uniformly over the assumed contact surface. Adequate thickness of the base plate determines this rigidity.

# 9.5.2 Empirical design of base plates for concentric forces

If a rectangular base plate supported by concrete is loaded concentrically by I-, H-, channel, box or rolled hollow section, then the minimum thickness t of the base plate is given by:

$$t \ge \sqrt{\frac{2.5}{p_{yp}}} w(a^2 - 0.3b^2)$$





where t = thickness of the base plate

- a = greatest projection of the plate beyond the column
- b = smallest projection of the plate beyond the column
- w = pressure on the underside of the plate, assuming uniform distribution
- $p_{yp} = \text{design strength of the base plate}$

If a square base plate supported by concrete is loaded concentrically by a solid round or a hollow circular section, then the minimum thickness t of the base plate is given by:

$$t \ge \sqrt{\frac{w}{2.4p_{\rm yp}}} D_{\rm p}(D_{\rm p} - 0.9D)$$

where  $D_p = \text{length of a side of the square base plate} \ge 1.5(D + 75)$ D = diameter of the column


## 9.5.3 Analysis of column-to-foundation connection

Fixed bases transfer moment, shear and direct loads to the foundation. Pinned bases transfer only direct load and shear force. It is difficult to achieve a pinned connection at the base with full rotational freedom. Most bases exhibit a certain degree of fixity. The fixed bases are used in industrial structures with cantilever columns and portal frames with large horizontal loads. Again, full fixity is very difficult to achieve because the foundation is not infinitely rigid rotationally. For most structures the concept of a fixed and pinned base in the analysis still remains valid provided that the designer takes adequate care in the design of the connection of the structure to the foundation and reproduces as closely as possible the assumptions made in the analyses. Assume the X-X and Y-Y axes lie along the centre-lines of the column section (see SK 9/36).

- $X_1$  = the larger side of the assumed trapezoidal contact pressure diagram under the base plate.
- $X_2$  = the smaller side of the assumed trapezoidal contact pressure diagram under the base plate






FIXED BASE WITH STIFFENER

The base plate is designed on the basis of cantilever overhang  $L_c$ . There are three different methods to check if the overhang  $L_c$  produces the maximum stress in the base plate.

Method 1 (See SK 9/37): The hatched area of the total contact pressure surface may be ignored in the force equilibrium calculations. The design of the base plate is based on the overhang  $L_{c1}$ .



The base plate itself should be designed to resist the contact pressure on the concrete. The panels of the base plate between stiffeners and the column may be analysed using the yield-line theory as described in *Reinforced Concrete: Analysis and Design* by S. S. Ray, published by Blackwell Science 1995.

*Note:* When bolt boxes are used with stiffeners, a gap should be maintained between the underside of the bolt boxes and the base plate so as to transmit the bolt tension directly to the stiffeners.

#### 9.5.6 Holding-down bolts

Note: The bolt capacities in Table 9.6 do not include the prying effect, as in Table 32 of BS 5950: Part 1. These are enhanced capacities, including a material factor of 1.25 and a reduction factor of 0.9, to allow for the effects of thread stripping.

The punching shear perimeter is at 1.5 times the depth of effective embedment from the sides of the anchor plate, as shown in SK 9/39. This perimeter is adjusted to suit the location of the bolt in relation to the edge of the concrete foundation, as also shown in SK 9/39. If the shear perimeter zones of two adjacent bolts overlap, then consider the two bolts together as a group.





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The concrete design shear stress  $v_c$  can be obtained from BS 8110: Part 1, corresponding to the average percentage of area of steel in the two orthogonal layers of reinforcement at the top of foundation.

Check  $f_v \leq v_c$ 

For a single holding-down bolt the effective perimeter U for punching shear check is given by:

U = 4(3d + B)

where B =length of side of square anchor plate

Note: The anchor plate for a single holding-down bolt is generally square, of a size and thickness as given in Table 9.7. The design of this plate is based on an average bearing stress of  $12 \text{ N/mm}^2$  on the concrete. A minimum grade of concrete with  $f_{cu} = 30 \text{ N/mm}^2$  is assumed for this purpose.

## 9.5.7 Shear transfer from column to concrete

#### General rules

- (1) Do not use holding-down bolts to transfer shear force to the foundation if they are cast in sleeves.
- (2) Do not use friction to transfer shear force to the foundation in cases of high shear forces and alternating dynamic loads. Transfer of shear forces by friction must only be allowed in the cases where the coefficient of friction used can be guaranteed by tests and the contact pressure is also guaranteed, as in the case of prestressed anchor bolts.
- (3) It is always prudent to transfer shear forces to the foundation in important structures by using shear keys. The shear keys are welded to the bottom of the column base plate and cast in a pocket in the foundation.
- (4) Fully cast-in bolts with no tolerance for erection of columns should normally be avoided but, if used, may be relied on to resist shear forces by dowel action. These bolts are designed for combined tension and shear. The bearing stress on the concrete should be checked assuming the shear is transferred to the top of the concrete in a depth equal to three times the diameter of the holding-down bolt.

## 9.5.8 Rules to determine trial size of base plate

- (1) Allow, generally, 150 mm overhang from the column to arrive at a base plate size rounded off to the nearest 50 mm.
- (2) Choose a trial thickness of base plate without stiffeners using the following rules:
  - thickness of 30-35 mm for 100-125 mm outstand beyond column;
  - thickness of 40–50 mm for 150–200 mm outstand beyond column.
- (3) The bolt spacing should be more than or equal to six times the diameter of the bolt.
- (4) For stiffened base plates the thickness may be reduced by about 10 mm from the recommended thickness.
- (5) The edge distance of the base plate from the centre of the holding-down bolt should be between 2.5 and 3 times the diameter of the bolt.
- (6) Grade 8.8 bolts should be used where large bending moments are transmitted to the foundation.
- (7) The stiffeners, when used, should extend from the column to 20 mm short of the edge of the base plate.
- (8) The depth (vertical height) of the stiffener plate should be two times the outstand from the face of the column.
- (9) The corner of the stiffener plate may be trimmed at a ratio of 2 vertical:1 horizontal.
- (10) The thickness of the stiffener plate should not be less than 10 mm or depth  $\div 16$  (whichever is the greater).
- (11) The stiffener should be designed to withstand compression from the compressive stress block, allowing for buckling effects.
- (12) The minimum area of base plate should be the direct axial column load divided by  $0.4 f_{cu}$ .
- (13) There will be no tension in the holding-down bolts if the following condition is satisfied:

$$e = \frac{M}{N} \le \frac{D}{2} - \frac{N}{0.8f_{\rm cu}B}$$

where D = depth of the base plate

B = width of the base plate

M = applied bending moment about an axis perpendicular to D



#### 9.6 WORKED EXAMPLES

# 9.6.1 Example 9.1: Rigid bolted connection of column-to-roof truss

This example relates to a rigid bolted connection of column-to-roof truss of a 50 m span portal frame structure, as shown in SK 9/40.

Steel is Grade 50 for the roof truss and the gusset plate. Bolts are Grade 8.8.

Diameter of bolt is M20 in clearance holes.

Thickness of gusset plate is 12 mm between the pair of angles. The tensile load of 800 kN is assumed to act along the centroidal axis of the two angles placed back to back.

#### Step 1 Determine capacity of bolt

Effective area of M20 bolts = tensile area =  $245 \text{ mm}^2$ , assuming that threads can appear in the shear plane.








SK 9/42 Load distribution in the gusset plate.

## 9.6.2 Example 9.2: Welded connections of members in a roof truss

The results of the analysis of a roof truss in Example 3.1 have been used to demonstrate the procedure. The calculations shown are for one joint in the roof truss (see SK 9/43). Steel is Grade 43. Strength of electrode to BS 639 is E43.

Design strength of fillet weld is 215 N/mm<sup>2</sup>.



SK 9/43 Geometry of a joint in a roof truss and the internal forces.

Maximum size of fillet weld to toe of angles is limited by the radius on the toe of the angle section. For angle with 5 mm thickness of leg, the maximum size of fillet weld is 3 mm (5–2.4), because the radius at the toe is 2.4 mm.

Capacity of 3 mm fillet weld =  $0.7 \times 3 \times 215 \times 10^{-3} = 0.451$  kN/mm.

### Member 16

Two runs of 3 mm fillet weld are used, one each at the toe and heel of the angle  $60 \times 60 \times 5$ . The internal force (23 kN) may be assumed to act at the centroid of the angle. The force is assumed to be distributed in proportion to the distance of its line of action from the weld runs. The nearer the line of action to a weld run, the more load it carries.

The force on the run of fillet weld at the heel of the angle

$$=23 \times \frac{43.5}{60} = 16.7 \,\mathrm{kN}$$

Length of 3 mm run of weld required at the heel of the angle

$$=\frac{16.7}{0.451}=37\,\mathrm{mm}$$

Available length of weld at the heel is greater than 37 mm.



- (1) Place the cleats as close to the top of the beam as possible to provide directional restraints to the top compressive flange of the beam.
- (2) The cleats should be at least 0.6 times the depth of beam to provide torsional restraint to the beam at the support.

- (3) The cleats should be thin enough to allow the necessary flexibility at the connection. This is required to prevent attracting significant moment at the simple connection. Generally, an 8 or 10 mm thickness of angle cleat should be chosen.
- (4) The spacing of bolts should be such that the bolt heads at right angles should not interfere with each other during the tightening operation.

Cleats used have 10 mm thickness of legs.



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



- (1) The end plate should be relatively thin to allow flexibility at the connection. The assumption in the design is that the joint is theoretically pinned.
- (2) The bolt centres should be positioned so as not to cause too much rigidity about the vertical axis.
- (3) The end plate should be as close to the top flange as possible to give directional restraint to the top flange.
- (4) The length of the end plate should be at least 0.6 times the depth of the beam to give adequate torsional restraint at the connection.
- (5) The partial-depth end plate should not be too thin because the welding distortion may give rise to significant bowing. The thickness should be between 8 and 10 mm.
- (6) The end plate in a simple pinned connection should not be full depth with welds to flanges, as this may invalidate the design assumptions. Sometimes in small beams a full-depth plate may be necessary but the flexibility can be maintained by the choice of thinner plates.











#### Step 12 Design welded connections

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#### Flange of beam to end plate connection

Maximum allowable flange force = area of flange × design strength of flange =  $191.3 \times 16 \times 355 \times 10^{-3} = 1086.6 \text{ kN}$ 

For a full-strength weld, the combined throat thickness of the two runs of fillet weld connecting the flange with the end plate should be equal to the thickness of the flange, provided the electrode strength is comparable. The end plate is Grade 50 and the beam is Grade 50 so, therefore, the chosen electrode is E51.

The thickness of the flange is 16 mm: hence, the equivalent leg length for two runs of fillet weld =  $16 \div 1.4 = 11.43$  mm. Use two runs of 12 mm fillet weld using an E51 electrode.

For the web to end plate connection, use a weld size of equivalent thickness to the web of the beam.

The minimum size of weld to be used is given by:

Use two runs of 8 mm fillet weld to connect the web of the beam to the end plate.

#### Connection of column compression stiffeners to column flange

Assume that  $0.8F_c = 977 \text{ kN}$  (see Step 9) is transferred through the welded connection between the stiffeners and the flange of the column. The contact length is  $2 \times 82 \text{ mm}$  on each side of the flange. The stiffeners are 25 mm thick.

Full-strength weld requires  $25 \div 1.4 = 18 \text{ mm}$  fillet welds

To transfer the load of 977 kN using E43 electrodes and four rows of fillet welds of 82 mm length each, the throat thickness required is given by:



# Chapter 10 Corrosion Protection

## **10.1 PROCESS OF CORROSION IN STEEL**

Corrosion in steel is an electrochemical process in which ferrous ions go into solution. The electrons released from the anode go to the adjacent cathodic sites to combine with oxygen and water. The hydroxyl ions thus produced combine with the ferrous ions from the anode to give ferrous hydroxide. After further oxidation in contact with air this product becomes ferric oxide, or rust. Chemically speaking this reaction may be written as:

 $4Fe + 3O_2 + 2H_2O = 2Fe_2O_3H_2O$ 

It is necessary to have both air and water present to start the corrosion process at the anode. The process may also be explained in electrochemical terms as follows:

| Anodic reaction   | $Fe \rightarrow Fe^{2+} + 2e^{-}$         |
|-------------------|-------------------------------------------|
| Cathodic reaction | $O_2 + 2H_2O + 4e^- \rightarrow 4(OH)^-$  |
| Anodic reaction   | $Fe^{2+} + 2(OH)^- \rightarrow Fe(OH)_2$  |
| Anodic reaction   | $2Fe(OH)_2 + O_2 \rightarrow Fe_2O_3H_2O$ |

The corrosion cells are microscopic, with anodic and cathodic sites very close to each other. The electrons can flow from anode to cathode if the transfer medium is conductive.

#### **10.2 PROTECTIVE SYSTEM**

The way the corrosion protection system is designed to work may be summarised in the following statement of principles:

- The coating should provide a high electrical resistance, making it difficult for the electrons to flow.
- Use of pigments in the coating system affects the anodic or the cathodic reaction. Pigments with zinc act as sacrificial metal at the anodes, whereas the zinc phosphates act as inhibitors at the cathodic sites.
- The coating should be designed to reduce the rate of diffusion of water and oxygen through the coating. The reduction of microporosity of the coating may be achieved by the addition of inert pigments such as micaceous iron oxide (MCO). These materials block the pores in the coating system.

## **10.3 TYPES OF COATING**

- (1) *Air drying:* The protective film is formed by the oxidation of oils in the medium.
- (2) **Polymerisation:** The protective film is formed by the chemical reaction between a resin and a curing agent. Single pack materials require atmospheric moisture as the curing agent.
- (3) Solvent release: The protective film is formed by the release of solvent by evaporation.
- (4) *Water evaporation*: The protective film is formed by the evaporation of water.

## 10.4 COMPONENTS OF A CORROSION PROTECTION SYSTEM

- **Primers:** The first coat to be applied on bare steelwork is the primer. This coat is most important as it is responsible for the corrosion inhibition. Primers consist of a pigment in a binder. The pigments most commonly used are metallic zinc and zinc phosphate. The most commonly used binder is an epoxy resin.
- Barrier coats: These are applied on the primer coat to increase the film thickness. The barrier coats may have micaceous iron oxide as the pigment, which results in a decrease in the microporosity of the film. The pigment is used with a binder which is generally an alkyd or an epoxy. The barrier coats do not have any corrosion inhibitors or sacrificial metal such as zinc, and hence should not be applied on bare metal.
- *Finishes:* The purpose of the finishing coat is decorative and the pigments are suspended in a media which does not require two-part mixing. The finishing coat may also serve the purpose of promoting run off of surface water by being smooth. A finishing coat with chemical resistance may require two-part mixing.

# 10.5 SPECIFICATION OF A PROTECTIVE SYSTEM

The following should be specified:

- (1) *Surface preparation*: to Swedish Standard SIS 055900 or BS 7079: Part A1.
- (2) Application: conforming to the Environmental Protection Act, controlling the emission level of solvents by demonstrating that the volatile organic compounds have emission rates below a threshold level.
- (3) Coating thickness: the coating thickness is specified as a target DFT (dry film thickness). No DFT reading should be less than 75% of the target value.
- (4) *Galvanising*: this should generally be specified for all fasteners because they are difficult to paint.



## Fracture toughness

- (1) Brittle fracture shall be considered when the material is under tensile stress.
- (2) There is no requirement to check brittle fracture if the service temperature does not fall below  $-5^{\circ}$ C for internal elements and  $-15^{\circ}$ C for external elements.
- (3) Limit the thickness in tension elements to control brittle fracture if the expected service temperature range falls outside the stated limits.
- (4) Obtain the value of K from Table 3 of BS 5950 and, corresponding to this value of K, find the maximum thickness of tension elements using different grades of steel from Table 4 of BS 5950.
- (5) Alternatively, the Charpy impact value  $C_v$  in Joules determined from tests at the appropriate service temperature should not be less than:


